



GENERAL HOSPITAL, LAUNCESTON.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1897.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management of the above-named Hospital for the year 1897.

1. On the 15th June Dr. Hallowes resigned as a Member of the Board of Management and Honorary Medical Officer, Dr. L. G. Thompson being elected to the vacant position of Member of the Board of Management.

2. Seventeen Board and forty-eight Committee meetings were held during the year.

3. Messrs. Thrower, Edgell, and Dr. L. G. Thompson retired from the Board of Management during the month of December, and were unanimously re-elected.

4. Mr. H. L. Fletcher, Dispenser, resigned on the 17th May, and Mr. A. G. Horner was elected to the vacancy, and entered upon his duties on the 10th August.

5. Two students have attended the Medical practice and one the Dental practice.

6. Course of lectures have been delivered to the Nurses by the Surgeon-Superintendent on Physiology.

The usual examination of Nurses have been held, and four Nurses have gained the Certificate of the Launceston Hospital Training School for Nurses, one having gained first class honours.

7. The need for some building to be used as a laboratory has been very much felt, the absence of which has prevented the use of the bacteriological apparatus recently purchased. It is desirable that this addition to the Hospital should be obtained as soon as possible.

8. The building of the Nurses' Home has occupied the whole of the year, but is now almost completed, and will be an invaluable addition to the Hospital. The occupation of the Home will greatly facilitate the re-arrangement of the staff, and set free for occupation wards now being used for the accommodation of several members of the staff.

9. The sum of £500 having been collected by the ladies of Launceston, was donated to the Hospital towards the erection of Isolation Wards for Infectious Diseases, to commemorate the sixtieth year of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria. This was supplemented by a Government vote of £850. On the 23rd December the foundation stone was laid by Mrs. R. S. Scott. The erection of these wards will fill a long felt and urgent want, as hitherto these cases have been imperfectly isolated within the main building, and have been the cause of danger to the other inmates, considerable anxiety to the medical officers, and unnecessary expense. It is hoped that they will be completed within the next few months.

10. In the Dental Department the total number of cases treated and operations performed during the past year amounted to 1725, or nearly 800 in advance of those treated during 1896. These figures clearly indicate the great amount of work done by the Honorary Dental Surgeons, the continued usefulness of the Department, and increasing need for skilled dental services among the poorer classes, whose means debar them from obtaining the same outside such a charity.

While it may not be possible to entirely prevent persons other than those really necessitous and deserving from obtaining gratuitous attendance by false representations, every care is exercised to do so, and, in all cases where suspicion is roused, enquiries are made into the applicant's circumstances to prevent abuse of the privileges of the Hospital.

It is also satisfactory to note that a good proportion of the work done is of a conservative and reparative character.

In the "School of Dentistry" the usual clinical instruction has been given, and the following courses of lectures were delivered:—

General Physiology, by Mr. F. J. Drake, M.B., B.S., &c.; Dental Anatomy, Mr. Lucadou-Wells; Dental Surgery and Pathology, Mr. Lucadou-Wells.

On December 20th, 21st, and 22nd, Examinations were held at the Hospital under "The Dentists Act, 1884," 48 Vict. No. 31, when one candidate passed.

11. The following improvements have been carried out during the year:—

New picket fence erected at the Surgeon-Superintendent's residence.

Pavement in front verandah partially relaid.

Dressing-room for out-patients furnished and placed in charge of a Nurse.

New drain laid in front of the building carrying the drainage to the South and connecting with the main drain on the Eastern side of the main building.

The Lodge has been re-papered.

New copper basins have been placed in the lavatories.

The children's wards have been re-furnished with new cots.

Extensive repairs (including renewal of girders) to Operating Theatre.

12. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness to the patients and staff.

During the year several performances were given by private individuals and companies for the entertainment of the patients, and were very much appreciated.

13. The quality of the provisions, &c. supplied to the Hospital during the year has, on the whole, been good.

14. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
