## GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

No. 166.

*Chief Secretary's Office, 23rd May, 1887.*

THE Governor in Council has been pleased, in accordance with the provisions of the Salmon Act, 1865, 29 Vict. No 6, to rescind the Regulations contained in Government Notice No. 5, of 31st December, 1886, and to substitute the following Regulations in lieu thereof.

By His Excellency's Command,

1. No person, except the Superintendent and Inspector of Fisheries, the Salmon Commissioners, or others employed by them, shall use any net for the purpose of fishing in the following waters, under a penalty not exceeding Ten Pounds for each breach of this Regulation:—

In the River Derwent, or any of its tributaries, above a line extending from the mouth of a creek running through land belonging to — Garth, south of One Tree Point, on the western bank of that river, to Tryway Point (otherwise known as Droughty Point), on the eastern bank of the said river.

In the North Esk River, or in the South Esk River, or in the River Tamar, from the Cattle Wharf at Launceston upwards (shrimping nets alone excepted).

In the River Scamander.

In the River Huon, or any of its tributaries, above an imaginary line from East to West, parallel with the northern extremity of South Egg Island.

Provided always, that it shall be lawful for any person during the daytime, between sunrise and sunset, to use set-nets known as "graballs" for the purpose of fishing in the waters of the River Derwent aforesaid below a line extending from a northern point of the Cemetery, at Cornelian Bay, to the southern side of Geilston Bay.

All nets used in contravention of the foregoing Regulations shall be seized and forfeited, destroyed or removed, as each case may require.
