SIR.

In compliance with the provisions of the Audit Act, I have the honour to return to you the several Statements of the transactions of the Treasury for the year 1897, and to make my Report thereon. These-Statements were received by me on the 4th May last, and, after due examination, my certificate was attached to them on the 26th of the same month.

REVENUE.

The following is the usual table comparing the Revenue proper of the year under review with that of the preceding year 1896:—

The Revenue received on account of the year 1897, as particularised in the above table, exhibits an increase upon that received for the year 1896 of £47,043 6s. 0d. The increase from Customs Duties was a general one at all the ports, being roundly, as compared with 1896—at Hobart, £7200; Strahan, £7000; Launceston, £5600; other ports, £3100. The increase in receipt of duties upon Spirits was about £2000; Tobacco and Miscellaneous, £1000; all other goods, £19,900. The Inland Revenue increase is accounted for more particularly by the extra amounts received under the heads of Stamps—about £2700; Probate Duty, £6500; Fees of Departments, £1000; Reimbursements, £860. The Territorial Revenue showed increases from Sales of Crown Lands, £5622; Rent of Crown Lands, £426; Rent under the Mining Act, £722; Fees and Miscellaneous, £127. The Miscellaneous Receipts for 1897 included the amount of £1021 16s. 8d., the forfeited deposit, with accrued interest, of the Australian Rights Purchase Association; this makes up the greater part of the increase over the 1896 Miscellaneous Revenue.

The decreases under the heads of Land Tax and Income Tax are explained for the greater part by the fact that the arrears of rates due for 1895 and collected in 1896, were larger than those for 1896 collected in the year 1897.

The decrease under the heading Interest on Public Accounts, &c. was caused by the periodical reduction during the year 1897 of an original amount of £120,000, bearing interest at the bank.

The small amount received for Bond Rents and Charges is accounted for by the entering of goods for home consumption direct more largely instead of bonding.

The increase in Beer Duty was due to extra consumption, and that for Companies Tax by the payment of amounts by certain Shipping Companies and which had long remained unsettled.

Instalments on Purchases and Rents under the Waste Lands, Crown Lands, and Residence Areas Acts.—Detailed lists, made up to the 31st December, 1897, exhibiting the number of instalments and amounts due by each person under these Acts, have been received from the Lands and Surveys Department, and checked. As compared with the amounts owing at the end of the year 1896 there was a reduction of more than £8000, and, as compared with the arrears at the end of 1895, of more than £13,000. The amount due at the end of 1897 was £36,591 16s. 8d., made up of the sum of £33,833 17s. 8d. on account of Ordinary Selections and Purchases, £2007 10s. for Pastoral Leases and Occupation Licences, and £750 9s. for Residence Areas. There was also a total amount of £1271 7s. 2d. due on account of arrears of interest charged under "The Crown Lands Amendment Act, 1894." There are still many names on the lists against amounts due for a long period, and for which no extension of time has been given by the Governor in Council under the provisions of the Act. The Secretary for Lands has promised that a number of these cases shall be early dealt with, with a view of further clearing the lists of arrears.

Treasury Bills in aid of Revenue.—Bills of the value of £145,000 were outstanding at the end of 1897, £30,000 having been paid off during the year. A further amount of £45,000 in Bills is redeemable during the current year, £50,000 in 1899, and £50,000 in 1900. The Act 58 Vict. No. 41, authorising

the issue of Treasury Bills for £149,800 and referred to in last year's Report as requiring repeal, was repealed during last Session by Act 61 Vict. No. 13.

Local Inscribed Stock.—Under Act 60 Vict. No. 15, £194,425 11s. 6d. was raised during 1897 by the issue of Local Inscribed Stock, making a total of £246,933 5s. 1d. raised under this Act to the end of that year, out of the total amount authorised of £250,000. Under Act 61 Vict. No. 3, a further issue of £250,000 was authorised, and out of this £24,000 was raised during 1897. Thus, £218,425 11s. 6d. was raised during the year, while Stock under Act 59 Vict. No. 6 was redeemed to the amount of £48,276 19s. 11d. during the same period, the balance in hand for stock outstanding at the end of 1897 being £464,956 5s. 2d. as shown by the Treasury Balance Sheet. During the present year, and up to the date of this Report, further amounts have been raised, namely:—under Act 60 Vict. No. 15, £3066 14s. 11d., and under Act 61 Vict. No. 3, £122,424 4s., or together, £125,490 18s. 11d.; and during the same period there have been paid off the further amounts of £29,905 6s. 7d. under Act 59 Vict. No. 6, and £47,025 under Act 60 Vict. No. 15, or together £76,930 6s. 7d. The net amount, £48,560 12s. 4d., added to the amount, £464,956 5s. 2d. outstanding at the end of 1897, shows the amount now in hand and unredeemed for Local Inscribed Stock issued, namely, £513,516 17s. 6d.; there being a further amount available for raising, under Act 61 Vict. No. 3, of £103,575 16s.

Collectors of Revenue, &c.—The following instances of irregularity and negligence have come under notice during the investigation of the Accounts of Public Officers during the past year:—

^{1.} Post Office, Longford.—The Accounts of this Office were locally examined on the 10th July last, when the Office documents were found in much disorder. There was an accumulation of many paid Money Orders and Postal Notes, delayed in transmission to the General Post Office, and these had to be sorted and arranged by the Audit Inspector before he could attempt to balance the Accounts, as the Cash Book and arranged by the Audit Inspector before he could attempt to balance the Accounts, as the Cash Book and Money Order Book were not posted up. The Postmaster had been cautioned on a previous occasion when he was similarly in fault. On this later occasion the Office cash was nearly £20 short, but the Postmaster left the Office and returned producing from his pockets £17 5s. in cheques, and £3 in gold. The irregularity was duly reported, and it is understood the case was dealt with by the Honourable the Treasurer. A memorandum was received from the Secretary to the Post Office to the effect that "the Postmaster at Longford was suspended pending consideration of the case, but he has since been reinstated."

^{2.} General Post Office, Hobart.—A Clerk in the Mail Branch at Hobart was found to have stolen certain letters, and extracted therefrom and cashed several Postal Notes, one of which was clearly traced as having been posted on the 28th July last. The Clerk confessed at a later date that he "took" certain Postal Notes, together with a small amount in stamps and cash. This officer was dismissed. The case was investigated in August last.

- 3. General Post Office, Hobart .- A further case of grave irregularity, discovered in the Post Office at Hobart, was investigated also in August last. A Clerk employed in the Account Branch was reported to have exchanged with the Telegraph Counter Clerk, for cash, stamps to the value of £6, offering to the Counter Clerk £1 for so doing, and it appeared that a similar exchange of stamps for cash had been made by the same Clerks on a previous occasion, the amount then being between £3 and £4. Examination disclosed the fact that adhesive stamps placed upon "press message slips" in payment for messages, from February, 1897, to July, 1897, and to the value of £10 18s. 11d., had been removed from the slips. By an oversight on the part of the Counter Clerk these stamps had evidently been unobliterated, and had been removed by the Clerk in the Account Branch, as the latter subsequently admitted the theft, and was then suspended. It was this Clerk's duty to examine the telegrams and to see that the correct value in stamps was upon them, and that the stamps were properly obliterated. Had he proved successful in establishing the system of collusive fraud which he attempted with the Counter Clerk, a large amount of revenue might have been lost, and the loss remained long undetected. The defaulting Clerk was dismissed, but the £10 18s. 11d. deficiency has not been recovered.
- 4. Lands' Titles Department.—The accounts of this Department were examined during the past week.

 A deficiency in the cash banked and on hand was discovered, the amount short accounted for as at the 21st of the present month being £105 5s. 10d. For this deficiency the Accountant was responsible. visited the Department subsequently, and by payments reduced the shortage to £99 14s. 0d. The Accountant was dismissed on the 23rd instant, but it has been ascertained that on the same day he paid to the bank to the credit of the Honourable the Treasurer the sum of £100. A prosecution in this case has been entered upon by the Government.

Fidelity Guarantee Policies.—The Collectors of Revenue in Departments under the control of the Honourable the Attorney-General and the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Works, and whose offices were specially detailed in last Report, are still unsecured. The Honourable the Attorney-General, however, in reply to a further communication from the Audit Department, stated in December last that he had given instructions for this matter to be attended to. An amended form of Policy submitted by the Colonial Mutual Insurance Company has recently been under consideration, and it is hoped all Collectors necessary to be assured, and not now secured, will shortly be included in the Policies.

Shipping Companies—Duty payable under the Real and Personal Estates Duties Act.—The question of the Duty payable by certain Shipping Companies carrying on business in Tasmania had been awaiting settlement for a number of years, but in September last judgment was delivered by the Supreme Court in favour of the Government, and against the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company, for the full amount claimed, £200. The Company paid the amount into the Treasury, with a proviso that they should participate in any concession made to the several Shipping Companies affected by the judgment. On 26th November last an Executive Minute was issued relinquishing half the amount claimed from the four Companies so affected, the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company included. Of £1550 claimed, £775 was remitted. £100, half of the amount paid in by the Company mentioned, and for which judgment was obtained, was accordingly repaid by the Treasury.

An important correspondence arose in connection with the subjects contained under the three preceding headings, and this, it is thought, should be brought under the notice of Parliament.

On the 16th August last, as directed by the Regulations under the Audit Act, the first three cases of irregularity and negligence referred to under the head "Collectors of Revenue, &c.," were reported through the Honourable the Chief Secretary, for the information of the Governor in Council, and, as invited by the Honourable the Chief Secretary, for the information of the Governor in Council, and, as invited by the Honourable the Premier some time previously, opportunity was taken to comment upon the absence of prosecution, and the consequent risk run of future loss of revenue. This letter was marked by the Acting Premier on the 18th August last, "Perused and returned," and on the 3rd September last it was endorsed by the Clerk of the Executive Council, "Laid before the Governor in Council—No order." On the 15th October, the Honourable the Treasurer issued a Memorandum referring to the Report of the Auditor-General, which had been labeled for the Governor in Council during the Treasurer's absence from the Colony, but which he had marked as perused on the 18th August previously, and he took the Auditor-General to task for he had marked as perused on the 18th August previously, and he took the Auditor-General to task for having "awoke to the discharge of a duty never before acted upon," and in the course of his censure he stated that "the Auditor-General has acted rightly in the said cases, but seriously failed, as did his predecessor on all other and very serious cases, none of which were reported to the Governor in Council." The Memorandum was forwarded to the Auditor-General for his observations by the Honourable the Chief Secretary; and, in a reply of 16th October last, the Auditor-General considers he has satisfactorily answered the Honourable the Treasurer's charges. On the 22nd November a letter was received from the Right Honourable the Premier, in reply to one of the same date, approving of the action of the Auditor as to his Report upon departmental irregularities, and informing the Auditor that a draft circular had been issued for approval of Ministers, directing that any future cases of defalcation or misappropriation shall be placed in the bands of the Law Officers of the Crown for prosecution. This circular addressed to all placed in the hands of the Law Officers of the Crown for prosecution. This circular, addressed to all Heads of Departments, was issued from the Premier's Office, dated 22nd November, 1897. It would have been unnecessary to refer to this correspondence but for further reflections upon the action of the Auditor-General, and in which this matter is involved.

In connection with the remarks contained in last year's Report, under the heading "Fidelity Guarantee Policies," a correspondence arose with the Honourable the Treasurer consequent upon the published report of his reply to a question asked by a Member of the House of Assembly on 23rd November last, to the effect that "the officers alluded to by the Auditor-General collected small sums which they held for a short time, and they were not worth guaranteeing." As it appeared a grave charge to make, that the Auditor was repeatedly pressing upon the attention of Parliament matters of small importance, and thus tending to mislead, the Honourable the Treasurer was asked to kindly remove that impression from the minds of Honourable Members, and it was pointed out that the officers referred to, and whose offices were detailed,

collected in many instances considerable sums of money. The officer who fills the position of Collector of Probate Duties and Collector of Stamp Duties, for instance, collects many thousands of pounds in a year, and occasionally several thousands in a month; the Recorder of Titles, the Deputy-Sheriff, Launceston, and other Collectors referred to, collect large sums annually. The correspondence having been forwarded to the Honourable the Attorney-General, he endorsed it on 3rd December last, "I have given instructions for this matter to be attended to." Notwithstanding this reply the Honourable the Treasurer addressed a memorandum to the Right Honourable the Premier, which the Premier appears to endorse, complaining of this appearing to be another instance in which the Anditor-General persuagrang with his correspondence. of this appearing to be another instance in which the Auditor-General perseveres with his correspondence in the face of the action of Ministers, and the Auditor's letter was returned by the Honourable the Treasurer with the memorandum, "Please learn from these memoranda that, as Ministers find it convenient and advisable to extend the provisions of fidelity guarantee they will do so." On a previous occasion, when the Auditor-General was urging that the Regulation No. 16 under the Audit Act should be given effect to, and it was pointed out that this Regulation does not allow the Treasurer any discretionary power in the matter, with the exception of cases when the collections do not exceed £50 a year, and only then with the authority of the Governor in Council, the Honourable the Treasurer endorsed the memorandum, "The Auditor-General's remarks are unchallengeable."

Upon receipt of the Executive Council Minute Paper which signified the acceptance of half the amount claimed from the shipping companies before referred to, the Honourable the Treasurer was asked if he would kindly inform the Auditor if he had any memorandum of advice from the Law Officers of the Crown with respect to the compromise made, and, if not, under what circumstances the reduced amounts had been accepted. The Honourable the Treasurer required reference to the Act authorising such enquiry, and upon receiving the reply he addressed a memorandum to the Right Honourable the Premier declaring that it is time that the position of Ministers in their relationship with Auditor-General be better understood, and, if need be, redefined, and thinks the Auditor-General is going too far when he enquires as to under what advice the Governor in Council has acted in rebating claims, and must be satisfied with the Minute of the Governor in Council. This latter opinion the Right Honourable the Premier endorsed, and the

Honourable the Treasurer returned the correspondence to the Auditor-General with the reply, "Please to accept the foregoing as my response to your enquiry for further information."

It is regretted exceedingly by the Auditor-General that his view of the relationship which should exist between the Government and himself should differ from that of Ministers, but until, the view of Ministers is endorsed by Parliament, it is respectfully submitted that it is only the duty of the Auditor-General to make any enquiry, or ask for any explanation he may consider necessary, where it appears the interests of the Colony in relation to its revenue or expenditure are concerned.

EXPENDITURE, &C.

Revenue Expenditure.—The Expenditure chargeable to the Consolidated Revenue Fund, 1897, amounted to £785,025 19s. 11d., an increase on the Expenditure of 1896 of £34,782 3s. 4d. As, however, there was an increase of £47,043 6s. in the Revenue of 1897 as compared with 1896, there was a balance of £12,261 2s. 8d. in favour of 1897; this amount, added to the net Revenue of 1896, £47,732 7s. 6d., shows the net Revenue of 1897, namely, £59,993 10s. 2d. The results are more clearly shown in the following table:-

The above Expenditure included the sum of £14,700 0s. 7d., charged to the Revenue and carried to the credit of the Account of the Liquidators of the Bank of Van Diemen's Land, which account had been charged with accrued interest to the 31st December, 1895, and the Revenue credited with the interest as referred to in previous Reports. The Liquidators' Account is, therefore, now closed.

In addition to this excess of £275,579 Os. 9d., there has been issued this year, and to the date of this Report, Local Inscribed Stock amounting to £125,490 18s. 11d., and paid off to the amount of £76,930 6s. 7d., or a net addition since the commencement of the year 1898 of £48,560 12s. 4d.

As pointed out last year, however, it is not clear that the later Acts authorising the issue of Local Inscribed Stock intend the proceeds to be placed as against Revenue deficiencies, but this is apparently assumed in the Treasury Accounts.

Roads under the Waste Lands and Crown Lands Acts.—The expenditure under this head had exceeded the amount provided by the issue of Debentures by £15,072 19s. at the 31st December last, and the excess expenditure had increased to £20,584 4s. 10d. at the end of May, 1898. The absence of provision for excess expenditure on this account was referred to last year.

Expenditure requiring Parliamentary or other provision.—A Return (Appendix A.) is annexed, showing the particulars of amounts authorised and expended under Regulation 19 of "The Audit Act." £100 4s. 7d. of these amounts was expended on account of lapsed votes or arrears of previous years, and £7017 0s. 9d. was disbursed in excesses on votes or for new expenditure. Parliamentary provision is required to cover the amounts. A Return (Appendix B.) is also appended, showing particulars of expenditure which has been made without sufficient authority. Parliamentary provision is required for this expenditure, or amounts transferred to authorised heads. Included in this latter Return is the balance, £100, of a loan of £120 to the Trustees of the Zeehan Public Cemetery. The authority of the Governor in Council, approving of this loan, and which authority was issued on 8th May, 1896, promised that Parliamentary sanction would be sought. This has not been obtained, although the omission was reported last year. The loan, unauthorised by Parliament, to the Strahan Marine Board, and referred to in several previous Reports, has now been repaid to the Treasury.

Public Works Execution Act, 60 Vict. No. 45.—Provision for the votes under Schedule 1 of this Act is still required to the extent of £46,064 8s. 6d., the re-appropriations under Schedule 2 not covering the votes by the amount mentioned. The particulars were given last year.

Public Works Execution Act, 61 Vict. No. 17.—Provision for the votes under Schedule 1 of this Act is required to the amount of £122,897 19s. 5d., the re-appropriations under Schedule 2 amounting to £5320 17s. 1d. only, and the votes to £128,218 16s. 6d.

Authorised Loans to Public Bodies.—Provision is required still for the loans authorised by Parliament, and referred to in last Report, namely:—

£5000 for the Marine Board of Mersey, authorised by 60 Vict. No. 19. £400 for the Road District of Tarleton, authorised by 60 Vict. No. 23. £300 for the Municipality of Ross, authorised by 60 Vict. No. 26.

The following authorised last Session also require provision :-

£1000 for the Town Board of Strahan, authorised by 61 Vict. No. 18. £6000 for the Town Board of Zeehan, authorised by 61 Vict. No. 19. £5000 for the Marine Board of Launceston, authorised by 61 Vict. No. 20.

Miscellaneous Treasury Balances.—The following amounts which have been owing for some years still remain on the Treasury Accounts:—£78 due by the Metropolitan Drainage Board; £442 18s. 5d. due by the Tasmanian Exhibition Association; and £173 0s. 1d. (reduced from £230 1s.) due by the Sawmillers' Association. The sum of £2500 deposited by the Promoters of the Great Western Railway, on Survey Account, has since been repaid under the provisions of the Act.

DEBT OF THE COLONY.

Exclusive of Revenue deficiencies, the Debt of the Colony at 31st December last was £7,781,570, a reduction during the year of £600, that amount having become due for Crown Lands Act Debentures payable by the Public Debts Sinking Fund. At the present date the Debt amounts to £7,776,320, Debentures amounting to £5250 having matured during the current year.

Of this amount £137,909 16s. 2d. was, at the 31st December last, invested in Government securities, the balance, £126, being similarly invested on 5th January, 1898.

From the £18,400 advanced by the Sinking Fund the Treasury paid for Pensions £18,120 0s. 5d.; there was, therefore, £279 19s. 7d. to return to the Fund. There was also due to the Fund on account of Reserves, £5872 15s. 2d., and on account of Rentals from the Mount Cameron Water-race Fund, £29 1s. 3d. These amounts have since been received. On the other side of Account, there was due from the Sinking Fund to the Treasury £600 to meet debentures matured on 30th December, 1897. This amount was paid over on 5th January last.

The aggregate receipts of the Fund to 31st December, 1897, were £432,801 2s. 4d., and the aggregate payments, £284,765 6s. 2d., leaving a balance of £138,035 16s. 2d., as shown above.

The sum of £11,413 15s. 7d. was invested in Government Securities on account of the Assurance Fund, being £4396 2s. 10d. in excess of the balance of the Fund. This excess amount was due to the Treasury, being the balance of advance to satisfy the above-mentioned Judgment. Interest is charged by the Treasury on balances due by the Fund, and the total amount due has been reduced since the end of last year by Fees and Interest paid in to credit of the Fund and transferred to credit of Treasury advance. As pointed out last year, however, it will be necessary to realise upon a portion of the securities held on account of the Assurance Fund in order to properly adjust this Account.

Section 6 of "The Mount Cameron Water-race Act, 1887," (51 Vict. No. 28), provides that all sums of money received in any year from the sale of water supplied by means of or from the said Water-race in excess of the cost of the maintenance and management of such Race, and one moiety of all moneys received as rent for land in connection with the water-supply from the Race, shall be paid to the Public Debts Sinking Fund. In 1897, however, the cost of maintenance, &c. exceeded the receipts for water sold by £52 6s. 10d., and this amount has been charged to the Revenue. On the other hand, the moiety of rents received, £29 1s. 3d., has been paid to the Sinking Fund referred to, in accordance with the provisions of the Act quoted.

The aggregate payments to the Public Debts Sinking Fund from this Account were £5383 9s. 0d., the total charges to Water-race Construction Account being £32,700.

The contributions to the Superannuation Branch of this Fund had been suspended for four years, but were resumed as from the 1st January, 1898. The additions to the Reward Branch of the moiety of fines and penalties mentioned in Section 9 of "The Police Regulation Amendment Act, 1881," (45 Vict. No. 21), which had been suspended also for a period of four years, however, have not been resumed. The Fund has been now established for 15 years. The amount standing to the credit of the Superannuation Branch represents an increase of 65.4 per cent. upon the deductions made from the members of the Force remaining on the books of the Fund.

Fox and Dexter Bequests.—These accounts, received from the Chief Secretary's Department, were examined to 31st December, 1897. The Fox Bequest (£800) was invested in Treasury Bills, £500, and at fixed deposit, £300. The interest earned during the year amounted to £31 16s. 8d., and was distributed as follows:—Boarded-out Children; St. Joseph's Orphanage, Hobart; the Boys' Home, Hobart;

the Girls' Industrial School, Hobart; and the Girls' Industrial School, Launceston. The Dexter Bequest, (£447 4s. 11d.), was invested at fixed deposit. The interest, £13 10s. 7d., was paid to the Boys' Home, Hobart; the Girls' Industrial School, Hobart; and the Girls' Industrial School, Launceston.

Public Bodies' Accounts.

Hobart Municipality.—In the month of August last stock was taken of a large quantity of material in the possession of this Municipality, under the supervision of the Audit Inspector of Stores, and a system of Stock Accounts was instituted, a Storekeeper being appointed by the Corporation. This matter

is therefore on a more satisfactory footing than formerly.

A large amount in City Rates, nearly £7500, was outstanding at the end of the year, and in reply to the Auditor's communication on this subject, His Worship the Mayor replied in April last that very stringent measures have been taken to collect the amounts outstanding for rates, &c., with satisfactory The Accounts continue to be well kept, and in good order, every facility and assistance being rendered to this department.

Launceston Municipality.—The Accounts of this Municipality have continued to occupy a large portion of the time of the Audit staff, owing to the variety of work and supply undertaken by the Corporation.

The sum of £7228 4s. 2d., referred to in last year's Report as standing to the credit of "Water Suspense Account," was transferred during 1897 to the credit of the "General Account," the transfer having been authorised by Section 9 of "The Launceston Water and Light Act, No. 3," 61 Vict. No. 21.

Large sums owing by private individuals, for work done and material supplied, continued to remain on the books, and a considerable sum is owing on account of City Rates. With reference to the rates, it is stated that periodical summonses are issued, and all reasonable endeavours are made to ensure payment; and with regard to other amounts due, it was promised a final notice would be sent out that all unpaid amounts would be placed in the City Solicitor's hands for recovery.

A number of fees for Dog Licences were remitted by the Mayor, and the sum of £165 17s. 11d. was written off an amount of £175 17s. 11d. owing by the Northern Tasmanian Cricket Association for waterdues, partly remitted by the Council and partly by the Mayor, the Association paying £10 only. It had also been brought to notice that electric light had been supplied to the Launceston Technical School for some time past free of charge, and that a similar concession to the Queen Victoria Hospital was under consideration. There there are remissions and concessions being questioned the Town Clock realized no stetutow. sideration. Upon these remissions and concessions being questioned, the Town Clerk replied no statutory authority was known, but that it was customary to allow Municipal Councils a discretionary power in such matters, and that the due exercise of this seems to be about the only point to consider. The Auditor took exception to this view of the matter, and refused to recognise the exercise of any power not sanctioned by law. The late Chief Justice clearly laid down the law with respect to the position of Corporations, in a recent judgment delivered by him. It was pointed out that these Corporations are bodies of trustees for the ratepayers, their powers limited by Act of Parliament, bound to apply funds according to the strict letter of the law, and responsible just as private trustees are.

The question of the investment of moneys belonging to the Police Provident Fund was brought under the Auditor's notice during the year, and the opinion of the Honourable the Attorney-General taken thereon. Shares had been taken up in the Equitable Building Society, and these, the Attorney-General was of opinion, were not within the meaning of "security" as used in the Launceston Police Provident Fund Act, 41 Vict. No. 23, but should more properly be regarded as "speculations;" the total withdrawal value of these shares, on 31st December last, amounted to £4488 15s. 6d. The Town Clerk, writing on behalf of the Council, has promised that no more shares will be purchased, and as those now held mature-

the money will be invested otherwise.

The amounts due by the owners of private streets continue greatly in arrear, several owners never having paid any contribution since the streets were constructed. The scheme provided by law for a Sinking Fund, and ultimate redemption of loans raised for making the streets, will probably utterly fail. Upon this being brought under the notice of the Mayor, the reply is received—"There is little doubt but that your apprehension will be verified."

The position of the Electric Light Maintenance Account was brought under special notice. A credit balance of £109 12s. 2d. at the beginning of the year having been converted into a debit one of £1152 0s. 3d. The reply at the end of the year, and no provision made for a Reserve Fund as contemplated by the Act. of the Town Clerk is to the effect that it cannot be expected that any commercial venture should be of the Town Clerk is to the effect that it cannot be expected that any commercial venture should be remunerative for the first few years; increased burdens on the citizens should be avoided; and it was proposed to allow the deficiency to increase, and to hereafter lessen it by degrees from the process of increased revenue. The Auditor replied:—"It does not seem to me to be sufficient to refer to this matter, or any other under the control of the Corporation, as a 'commercial venture' to justify a largely increasing deficiency to be overtaken by the business of future years; public bodies' actions are not, I think, to be measured in this way, and the provisions of Sections 57 and 58 of 'The Launceston Water and Light Act, 1895, 58 Vict. No. 31, appear to require that sufficient provision shall be made from time to time for the necessary expenditure. The present rating is 4d., while the Act allows a limit of 10d."

The Jubilee Fountain Account shows a debit balance of £133 6s. 8d., but this, it is stated in the accounts, is to be refunded by the Commissioners of the Tasmanian Juvenile Exhibition.

A payment of £20 was made by the Corporation to one Martin Delaney to recompense him for injuries received, notwithstanding a verdict had previously been given in favour of the Corporation in an action brought by Martin Delaney against the Corporation. Exception was taken to this expenditure, and, as the amount was not refunded, a qualified certificate, referring to this payment, was given and published with the annual accounts of the Corporation.

The Auditor is grateful for the assistance given to the Audit Inspectors and himself, and for the unvarying courtesy of the Mayor and all officials in dealing with the various questions raised.

Green Ponds Municipality.—The Council of this Municipality, in anticipation of the Police Centralization Bill passing into Law, distributed the balance of the Superannuation Fund of the Municipality. The amount of the Fund so distributed was £111 4s. 6d., and was paid to three constables in sums of £83 1s. 6d., £21 3s., and £7, for services of 38 years, 16 years, and 4 years respectively.

Richmond Municipality.—The question of the prompt and regular banking of the cash collected in this Municipality has been the subject of much correspondence for years past, and the matter has been the source of great trouble to this Department. It is unreasonable to expect the Audit Department to accept as inevitable that large sums of money shall accumulate in the hands of any official and be kept from the bank, in some instances for a number of months, and this in the face of a large overdraft in the Municipality's Bank Account. This position cannot be allowed for a moment. As satisfactory replies have not been received to questions raised, and as this matter has remained so long unsettled, it being considered of much importance, the recent correspondence which has taken place on the subject is published under Appendix C annexed.

Spring Bay Municipality.—The hope expressed in last year's Report, that a portion at least of the late Council Clerk's deficiency might be recovered, was not realised; and as there appeared no prospect of any payment on account being made, the amount was allowed to be written off the Municipal books, namely, £31 10s. 8d.

Esperance Road Trust.—A special investigation was made of the accounts of this Trust on the 21st October last, and it was then ascertained that there had been omitted from the Rate Book—forming the Roll—an aggregate of 140 properties at least for the years 1893 to 1896, inclusive. It appeared that it was the duty of the then Collector and Secretary to compile the Roll, but the book was signed each year by the Chairman. In connection with the properties omitted, it was found a payment had been made by the Chairman himself of 14s. each in two years, or a total of 28s., and this was not accounted for. After much correspondence no further information as to payments for omitted properties could be obtained, the Chairman and other members of the Trust being at issue. In November last the matter was placed in the hands of the Honourable the Attorney-General.

Leven Marine Board.—Under Acts 60 Vict. No. 45, and 61 Vict. No. 17, provision is made for payment of £200 for "completing East Training Wall, Ulverstone, conditional upon similar amount or proportionally at the rate of £1 for £1 being provided locally." Payments were made by the Treasury under this vote, and upon application being made for information as to how the moneys upon which claim was made were "raised locally," it was found these contributions were paid out of the Marine Board funds. The Honourable the Minister of Lands states this was the intention of the vote, but the Solicitor-General has advised that the Act does not express this intention, and the Minister has promised to obtain the approval of Parliament to pass the payments.

Hobart and Launceston General Hospitals.—The accounts of these Hospitals have continued to be received and examined monthly, and are in good order. The expenditure on account of the Hobart Hospital equalled the revenue, and that for the Launceston Hospital exceeded the revenue. There was consequently no repayment to the Treasury on account of balances.

Launceston Sailors' Home.—This institution was established in August last, and rules and regulations framed. These provide that the Managers of the Home shall be the Collector of Customs, the Master Warden, and the Shipping Master, all of Launceston, and for the time being. The objects of the institution are to provide distressed seamen at the port of Launceston with board and lodging, passage money, and generally to relieve seamen frequenting the port. The sum of £67 10s. 6d., which had remained in the Treasury for many years to credit of the "George Lambert Trust Fund," was paid over to the Managers in August last, and a legacy from the late William Keeler Hawkes, amounting to £518 13s. 9d., was also paid to the Managers by the Executors. Of the total amount received, £586 4s. 3d.), the sum of £500 has been invested in Local Inscribed Stock, and £86 4s. 3d. remains in the Savings Bank, Launceston. Arrangements have been made for an annual examination of this Account by the Audit Department, the Account as above detailed having been audited in April last.

Local Bodies' Accounts examined.—In addition to the various Accounts specially referred to in the foregoing Report, the number of Accounts of Public Bodies examined and passed for the last year was as follows:—Rural Municipalities, 19; Road Trusts, 98; Main Road Boards, 48; Town Boards, 17; Marine Boards, 7; Lighthouse Fund, 1; Cemetery Trusts, 28; Water Trusts, 7; Miscellaneous, 7—Total, 232.

Two instances have arisen since last Report of the formation of Town Board Areas, and severance from or substitution for Road Districts, and certificates have been given in each case, under Section 240 of "The Town Boards Act, 1896," (60 Vict. No. 31), as to the division of funds and liabilities. The Beaconsfield Town Board District was formed out of portion of the West Tamar Road Trust District, but the Burnie Town Board area comprised and replaced the whole of the Emu Bay Road District. In this latter case, therefore, the Burnie Town Board simply takes over the balance on the Accounts of the Road

Expenditure was made by the Hobart and Launceston Municipalities, and by several other local bodies, in connection with the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen. There is no express

statutory authority for such expenditure, but the occasion was one of such an exceptional and so unique a nature that no exception has been taken thereto.

Accounts not passed.—The following Local Bodies' Annual Accounts have not been received, although overdue and repeatedly applied for:—South Glenorchy Road Trust, East Mersey Main Road Board, St. Helen's Cemetery Trust, and Southport Village Settlement Accounts. The following have been received, but are under query:—Zeehan Town Board, Zeehan Cemetery Trust, Portland Road Trust, Portland Main Road Board, Southport Road Trust Accounts.

Grants in Aid to Road Trusts and Town Boards.—The Road Trusts passed for participation in the Grants authorised under Act 61 Vict. No. 15, number 42, the amount payable being £4998 9s. 2d. The Town Boards similarly passed number 13, the amount payable being £2001 10s. 10d. This distributes the £7000 provided for under the Act. The Road Trusts of Lisle, Montagu, and Welsh, and the Town Board of Beltana, have been included as entitled to the highest scale of payment under the Act,—namely, 9d. for every shilling raised. It not being clear, however, that section 5 of the Act applies to these as entitled to the highest rate, the Honourable the Treasurer has promised that Parliament will be asked to amend the Act to give effect to the authority issued for payment of the 9d. per 1s. in these cases.

The advances, amounting to £2800 as last referred to have been made from the votes mentioned in an earlier part of this Report, as have also the sums of £800 to Strahan Town Board, and £2000 to Zeehan Town Board, these advances having been made since the beginning of the year 1898. The greater part of the sum of £12,318 14s. 3d. above mentioned as "available for Local Bodies" appears available for reappropriation. Since the beginning of the year 1898 the Hobart Marine Board has repaid £6361 7s. 9d. off their loan of £12,000. This further increases the amount to the credit in the Local Public Works Loans Act Account.

The Glenorchy Water Trust is still the only public body in arrear with the interest payable under "The Local Public Works Loans Act, 1890," the amount now due being £1324 18s., of which £909 18s. 5d. is owing to the Consolidated Revenue, and £414 19s. 7d. to the Sinking Fund under the Act.

SPECIAL INSPECTIONS OF ACCOUNTS.

Public Works Department.—A considerable portion of the time of the staff of the Audit Department has been taken up during the past year in the investigation and examination of the Accounts of the Public Works Department. For several years past attempts had been made to obtain through the Department a reconciliation of the account "Contracts for Public Works" operated on through the Treasury. In October last the reconciliation was at length effected by the Audit Department, twenty-nine years of entries having to be traversed and closely investigated. A large number of adjustments were found to be necessary. A system of Account has now been instituted in the Public Works Department, which will be subject to periodical audit, and the reconciliation of balances kept up closely.

A special examination was made as to the position of the votes of the Governor in Council, and the expenditure, under Waste Lands and Crown Lands Acts. Many weeks were occupied by several Audit officers in comparing the Registers kept in the Public Works Department with the plans prepared by the Lands and Surveys Department, and with Returns. It was necessary to make a large number of adjustments in order to supply omissions, and place entries under the proper parishes and towns. A number of items of excess expenditure were found to have been made on roads in various parishes, &c., amounting in all to £8161 19s. 1d. The Secretary for Public Works has promised that a larger margin will in future be kept to cover contingencies—such as forfeiture of lots—and he reports that all excess votes have been ear-marked, and expenditure will be kept within the limits of the amounts available.

At the request of the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Works, notified through the Honourable the Chief Secretary, a special Report was prepared by the Statistician and the Auditor-General in November last upon various suggestions made by the Secretary for Public Works for modifications in the keeping of Accounts. These dealt with the questions of showing aggregate expenditure under heads of particular works in the ledgers, the identification of roads by numbers, and so showing them on the plans, the grouping of roads and expenditure under electoral divisions, unexpended or unused balances, and other matters. It is hoped that the suggestions made and approved will result in improving the records and account-keeping of the Department.

Examinations as to the position of other accounts have been made, but these need not be specially referred to here. The Secretary for Public Works has cordially co-operated with this Department in the desire to make improvements.

In order to assist the Audit Department the Surveyor-General has consented to keep the Registers showing the purchases and selections under the various headings, and to afford facilities to the Public Works Department for the obtaining of any information required. This will help to relieve the Audit Department of an amount of checking-work. These Registers are to be kept from 1st July, 1898.

Local Inspections.—The number of Accounts examined locally during the year 1897 were:—At Public Départments and Offices, 95; Post Offices, 68; Local Bodies, 176; Total, 339.

INSPECTION OF STORES.

The Inspector of Stores and Secretary of Board of Tenders, with assistant clerks, have been busily employed during the year in inspecting Stock Accounts of Institutions, Railway, Defence, and other Departments, as well as those of the Hobart and Launceston Corporations, which have been lately added to this officer's duties. As Secretary of the Tender Board, the obtaining of supplies for the Public Service has assisted to fully occupy his time and attention.

The Railway Stock Accounts have been examined and passed. The total value of stock shown on the books at the end of the year was £46,944 4s. 7d., ordinary stores value being £11,973 17s. 10d., and undistributed renewals, £34,970 6s. 9d. These latter show a reduction in value of £5258 17s. 9d. as

compared with that on the Accounts of the previous year.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Mount Lyell and Strahan Railway.—In last year's Report it was stated that the cost of this railway to the end of 1896 was passed at £117,871 11s. 6d., subject to the question of allowance for law charges, amounting to £1135 0s. 7d. The opinion of the Honourable the Attorney-General was received in August last, to the effect that the charges referred to were not "construction work" under the Act. This fixes the cost of construction to 31st December, 1896, as £116,736 10s. 11d. Further statements of expenditure, it has been arranged, will be received for examination after completion of the line to

The Emu Bay Ruilnay Company.—The Accounts of the construction of the new line of railway by

this Company being subject to audit by the Audit Department, it has been arranged to shortly receive a portion of the Accounts for examination. The Secretary of the Company reports that statements are being prepared in order that an instalment of vouchers may be sent as soon as possible.

The Mount Dunuas and Zechan Railway.—This line of railway is being worked by the Government Railway Department, under the Memorandum of Agreement which forms a schedule to the Act 56 Vict. No. 25, under which the Company allows the Government £9 5s. per day, and repays all cost of renewals. Operations are being carried on at a considerable loss to the Company, and an amount of £587 8s. 4d. was owing the Government on the 31st May ultimo, and the indebtedness will probably increase each month.

West Coast Coach Service.—The net cost to the Treasury—£183 14s.—reported last year, has been provided by Parliament for this service. The horses and stores which last year remained on hand have now been sold or distributed to Departments. A further loss of £26 4s. 9d. has resulted, and for this amount Parliamentary provision is necessary to close the Account.

Tattersall's Consultations.—The Accounts kept in connection with these "Consultations" became Tattersall's Consultations.—The Accounts kept in connection with these "Consultations" became subject to the Audit Act by No. 5 of the Regulations issued by the Governor in Council under "The Suppression of Public Betting and Gaming Act, 1896," 60 Vict. No. 7, and which were gazetted under date 19th May, 1897. Under these Regulations the Accounts of 40 "Consultations" have been examined by this Department to date. These have been found in good order and the "Consultations" fairly conducted and the proper proportion of money distributed when claimed. There remains, however, a large amount of undistributed money on the Accounts. Twenty-one (21) "Consultations" Accounts were examined on account of the year 1897, and of these £7462 5s. 4d. remains unclaimed. The remaining nineteen (19) Consultations belong to the year 1898, and for 17 of these £5251 12s. 11d. remains unclaimed. The undistributed moneys in connection with the recent "Waterloo Cup" and "Rosehill Cup" are not included in the above amounts as they are of such recent date, only a small portion of the Cup" are not included in the above amounts, as they are of such recent date, only a small portion of the prizes being yet paid.

Auditor-General's salary.—The arrears of salary due to the Auditor-General for the year 1895 have not yet been paid. Reference is made to the correspondence on this subject published in previous Reports, and it is most respectfully requested that Parliament will so deal with this matter as to relieve the Auditor from the responsibility of making further reference or report with relation thereto.

Conclusion .- Although a large amount of extra work has been undertaken by the Audit Department during the past year, the audit of the various Accounts under its control is well up to date. The staff is thoroughly efficient, and the members have not hesitated to give up much of their spare time in order to keep the work from getting into arrear. During the absence of the Auditor through illness, and from other causes, this has been especially the case, and it is thought only right to make this acknowledgment of the continued loyalty and zeal of the Chief Clerk and the other Officers of this Department.

RICHMOND MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTS.

Audit Department, Hobart, 1st June, 1898.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to state that, in accordance with your instructions, I proceeded to Richmond yesterday for the purpose of examining the Richmond Municipal Accounts, and now beg to report as follows: — Upon demanding cash to be produced, the Council Clerk stated that it was necessary for him to go to his private residence for same, as it was a very unusual thing for the cash to be kept at the office, and he refused to allow me to accompany him to his house for the purpose of checking the amount, and after an absence of about half an hour he returned with £110 18s. 8d., made up as follows:—

It was pointed out that the office is the proper place for cash to be kept, especially as there is an iron

safe therein, apparently for that purpose.

The matter of keeping the cash at the Council Clerk's private residence was brought under the notice of the Warden, who stated that this was being done with the knowledge of the Council. The Warden's attention was also drawn to the large accumulation of cash, from time to time, with a view to some arrangements being made for sending the amounts to the Bank more regularly, and he promised that this matter would be brought under the notice of the Council, if reported to him in writing. The omission to bank cash has caused a large overdraft, which would be considerably reduced by payment to the Bank of £110 18s. 8d. referred to, which the Council Clerk informed me could not be done until next Monday, as he did not care to risk sending sums of money through the Post Office, but promised that bankings would be made more regularly in future. Upon my arrival at Bellerive this morning, I met Mr. Martin, and asked him if he had brought up the cash for the purpose of banking the same, and his reply was, No! that he had come up to visit a sick friend.

Rates amounting to £47 19s. 1d., Dog Licences, £4, Fines and Fees, £1, and Fees Court of General Sessions, 16s., paid in May, 1898, were not entered in Cash Book, but this has since been done, and Council Clerk's Cash Book has been totalled up for May, 1898.

The following Fines and Fees (Magisterial) were found to have been uncollected, and it appears that

proper measures are not taken to see that Fines and Fees are paid, viz.—Fines £1 18s., and Fees £2 19s.

No bankings of cash have been made between the 29. 1. 98. and 8. 4. 98., and £6 5s. 8d. was banked on 28. 4. 98, but since that date no bankings have been made until the 26. 5. 98, or more than a month, when £63 19s. 6d. was paid to bank.

The Assessment Roll and Rate Book have not yet been made up for current year, although Rates are g collected. The Council Clerk promised that this would be done, and Roll forwarded for examination being collected.

The following are the particulars of amounts paid to bank during the current year :-

I HAVE the honour to request your earnest attention to the accompanying Report of the Audit Inspector. Some difficulty was experienced in obtaining the Statement of Accounts of your Municipality for 1897 for examination, and they were the last of all to be received out of the Whole of the Municipalities.

Upon questions being raised upon the accounts, the replies of the Council Clerk with respect to the investigation of many waves to uncertainfectory that it was thought desirable to send an Inspector to

irregular banking of moneys were so unsatisfactory that it was thought desirable to send an Inspector to examine Accounts at the Council Chambers. After allowing for £20 in transit to Bank there was still a balance of cash amounting to £110 17s. 3d. to account for, and, referring to the Report, I am led to

1. Why was not this cash kept in the iron safe at the Council Chambers? In former years one of the reasons for retaining cash on hand by the Council Clerk was that there was a strong iron safe in the Council Chambers, and it was securely kept there.

2. Why was the Audit Inspector not allowed to accompany the Council Clerk to his private residence to take account of his cash stated to be there? The fullest investigation should have been courted, and the Audit Inspector should have had assistance rendered him by the Council Clerk to perform his duties instead of being opposed.

3. The large sum of £110 18s. 8d. produced, after some absence of the Council Clerk, consisted in part of £61 in notes, and £15 15s. 1d. in cheques. The delay in bankings is excused, among other reasons, on the plea that large sums in coin accumulate from ratepayers paying small amounts. How does this agree with the £76 15s. 1d. being in notes and cheques?

4. £20 sent by the Council Clerk's daughter to bank yesterday—why was not the remaining

£110 17s. 3d. sent at the same time?

5. The Council Clerk was seen at Bellerive yesterday-why not have taken the opportunity to

bank this large sum then?

6. £58 12s. 8d., cash on hand at 31st December last.—The banking of this was not cleared up until the 15th April last, thus:—£9 5s. 11d. on 1st January, £25 9s. 9d. on 29th January, £20 on 8th April, and £3 17s. on 15th April. How can this irregularity of banking be explained away?

7. No banking took place between the 28th April and 26th May last, when £63 19s. 6d. was paid in; then £20 was paid in yesterday, still leaving, as before stated, £110 17s. 3d. to be banked.

8. For years past the method of banking the cash has been most unsatisfactory at Richmond Municipality, and the Council Clerk has from time to time promised greater regularity, but the promises have not been least.

have not been kept.

9. No trouble whatever in this respect is experienced with the other Municipalities, even where there is no local bank, and the excuse that money must accumulate for a long period, until it is brought to town,

is not a valid one.

10. The Cash Book, for many amounts collected in May, had not been posted; the Roll and Rate Book have not been made up, although £206 19s. 5d. of this year's Rates had been collected, and the preparation of Roll and Rate Book should precede collection. Explanation requested.

11. Attention is drawn to the Magisterial Fees and Fines due from 8th October, 1896, to the end of 7. Why not collected?

12. The Municipality's Account showed an overdraft of £144 14s. 3d on 31st May last, largely owing to the non banking of the moneys referred to above, and it is trusted that the Council will take measures to ensure the alteration of the present method of dealing with the Municipality's cash, frequent and prompt bankings being made, and payment of interest saved. It is earnestly hoped that the Council will not make it necessary for me to mention this correspondence in my Annual Report to Parliament.

SIR, I HAVE the honour to forward, under separate cover, Council Clerk's Cash Book, Bank Pass Books,

and Board of Advice Cash Book, as requested.

Re banking of cash,—The Warden handed me your remarks upon Audit Inspector's report, and this matter will be laid before the Council on Saturday next and reply forwarded; but I may state that the Warden strongly represented the matter to the Treasurer, and that that gentleman has agreed till the end of the year to take it over fortnightly, and by so doing I trust will obviate any further friction with the Audit Office—a friction which, as I am entirely blameless in the matter, is annoying to me. I read your remarks to Mr. Nichols, and suggested that he should certify to you that it was no fault of mine, but he said that it was well known to the Warden and Councillors that he never had up to date taken either notes, gold, or silver, and desired me to send you a minute of the Council on the subject. Mr. Nichols took over the cash to-day, as will be seen by his receipt in cash book. I may also state that I have never promised that I would bank more regularly. I have said that I would endeavour to get the cash banked more regularly, meaning by cashing cheques as I have been doing during the Treasurer's recent illness, the bulk of those sent down being cheques cashed for people having no connection with rates: and I never saw any reason why I saould accept a responsibility which the Treasurer declined.

A letter was read from the Auditor-General in reference to the banking of Municipal moneys by the Treasurer

The Warden said that the Council would recollect that the matter had been before the Council before, and the Council had expressed itself as being quite satisfied with the manner in which the money had been banked by the Treasurer, Mr. Councillor Nichols, and had thought he was justified in not sending gold, notes, or silver through the post, and he (the Warden) had written to the Auditor accordingly; but the Auditor-General had again written about it, and so he (the Warden) would now submit it again to the Council to see if any Councillor could see a way out of the difficulty. For his own part, he was quite satisfied with the existing state of things, especially as the Council Clerk had ample security; but if any Councillor chose to accept the responsibility of carrying out the Auditor's wishes, no doubt Mr. Nichols would resign in his favour. would resign in his favour.

All the Councillors present concurred with the views of the Warden, and refused to take the Treasurership, and it was finally moved by Councillor Ogilvy, and seconded by Councillor Brain, that the following Resolution be forwarded to the Auditor-General by the Warden:—"That the Council regrets that it cannot carry out the Act in accordance with the request of the Auditor-General, inasmuch as they are unable to obtain the services of a Treasurer who will undertake the responsibility of receiving cash from the Collector at other times than when he can at once place the same in the bank." from the Collector at other times than when he can at once place the same in the bank.

Carried unanimously.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd instant, remarking upon irregularity of banking, &c. in this Municipality, together with Audit Inspector's Report.

In reply, I have the honour to state that they were laid before the Council on Saturday last, but there

being only two Members present beside myself, it was thought advisable to let the matter stand over till the next meeting, when due consideration will be given to it.

In the meantime, I may state that the Councillors present (one of whom was the Treasurer), including myself, consider that no blame is to be attached to the Council Clerk in the matter of the non-bankage of moneys. The Treasurer always refused, with the full knowledge of the Council, to take coin or notes from the Collector, unless at such times as it was convenient for him to take such cash with him to Hobart.

I may also state that, since the visit of the Audit Inspector, I have strongly represented the matter to the Treasurer, who has agreed, until the end of the year, to take over the cash in accordance with the Act, and so end all friction between the Audit Office and Municipality of Richmond.
