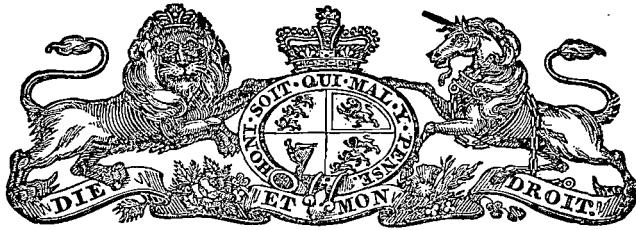

## FINANCIAL STATEMENT of the Hon. DAVID LEWIS, Colonial Treasurer.

[Made on the 19th September, 1879.]

MR. SPEAKER.

ON the 23rd of April last I had the honor to lay before this House my first Statement as to the financial condition of the Colony. I then endeavoured to press upon Parliament and the country the great necessity that existed for immediate steps being taken to provide Ways and Means sufficient to meet the expenditure authorised under Votes of Parliament; and the Government succeeded in passing measures through this House designed to accomplish that result. These measures, unfortunately for the financial credit of the Colony, did not command favourable consideration in the other branch of the Legislature; an early prorogation being forced upon the Administration without provision having been first made to supply the necessities of the State.

I find myself therefore in this position, that the funds provided are quite inadequate to meet the payments sanctioned by Parliament. Replenished the Revenue must be, and that by additional taxation, however unpalatable. This, I think, will be admitted on all sides, although the House may not be prepared to join as one in any particular scheme for raising the amount required to balance the Revenue and the Expenditure.

The House must not forget that our position is much changed of late years, inasmuch as we are now called upon to provide for Railways and Public Works which the Colony demanded, and which as a matter of course we must now make provision for. The development of other interests has also forced upon the Government the necessity of providing increased facilities for keeping pace with the wants of the people, all imposing further burdens upon the Colony. Notwithstanding this, up to the present time, we have put off the evil day from Session to Session, and neglected to impose further taxation to meet the increasing and extraordinary calls made upon the Treasury.

I have had a Return prepared showing the responsibilities incurred by the Colony to secure the benefits of Railway communication, which Return I have embodied in this Statement for the information of the House :—

It is my desire, in bringing the financial condition of the Colony under the notice of the House, to confine myself as closely as possible to the Money question, pure and simple, and not to use a word calculated to wound the sensibilities of any Hon. Member; I shall therefore avoid travelling beyond matters having a direct bearing upon the all-important subject of £ s. d. I propose, therefore, to proceed at once to the consideration of the financial operations for the year 1878.

### 1878.

You will find on referring to my Statement of the 23rd April last (Paper No. 124, of Session 1878-9), that I then expected at the close of the year 1878 to have an estimated surplus of £866 17s. 2d. ; but, since making that Statement, claims have been received on account of the service of the year 1878, turning the probable surplus into an estimated deficiency of £1314 11s. 10d., to be carried forward to the year 1879. (*Vide* Appendix A.) This of course, it will be understood, is exclusive of guaranteed Interest paid to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company for the period ending 31 December, 1878, amounting to £73,544 15s. 10d., with which I propose to deal separately.

The Supplementary Estimates for the year 1878 are printed and attached herewith for your information—Appendix B. ; and, when the proper time arrives, I will furnish any particulars which the House may desire to have with respect to the several items contained in the Estimate.

Having disposed of the year 1878 as briefly as possible, by a reference to the only points I need allude to to enable me to bring forward the figures as finally adjusted for the year, I will now pass on and ask your attention to the prospects for the year 1879.

### 1879.

With regard to the estimated Revenue for this year, as shown by the printed Ways and Means laid before you during the last Session of Parliament, I do not think that we need apprehend any diminution of the sum stated; I hold the opinion that in the main the total of the Estimate will be received. I know that some Hon. Members take a very gloomy view of the probable receipts to be derived from Customs, because the collections for the year 1879 up to the present time show a decline as compared with the year 1878; but they must not lose sight of the fact that the year 1878 was an unexceptionally good year, and that there is no falling off in the estimate of Customs Duties made by my honorable predecessor and adopted by the present Administration for the current year.

Trade in general throughout the world has been passing through a severe crisis. This undoubtedly has had the tendency of making importers cautious in their dealings; but I hold to the belief that, as confidence is restored, and our stocks are reduced, a more healthy tone, commercially, may be expected to follow. I believe the Customs Revenue will improve, because the consumption of dutiable articles must necessarily increase in consequence of the steady influx of those who are now actively engaged in developing the natural resources of the Colony.

But the House is well aware that the Ways and Means from existing sources are quite insufficient to meet the Liabilities of the Colony for the year 1879,—

The estimated Revenue fails to cover the Expenditure by £43,513 10s. 5d : and it will be my duty to draw the attention of the House to these figures presently.

This state of affairs was foreseen by the present Administration, who had the honor to submit to Parliament during last Session proposals, in the shape of new taxation, to provide the requisite funds to sustain the financial credit of the Colony. The measures submitted ultimately passed through this House after careful revision; but, unfortunately, they did not meet with favourable consideration in the other branch of the Legislature. This I regretted, because I knew, from an intimate knowledge of the pecuniary liabilities of the Government, that the delay which must follow would create very great inconvenience, and must prove injurious to the best interests of the Colony.

I did my duty on behalf of the Government by pressing the requirements of the Treasury upon the attention of the House and the country : and the Executive cannot be fairly charged with the responsibility of creating the large bill for arrears now presented to you, which they used every exertion to provide for during the Session of Parliament held early this year.

The question of providing the necessary Ways and Means cannot be longer delayed : the requirements of the Public Service are pressing, and call loudly for immediate adjustment ; therefore it is my duty to submit to you proposals calculated, in the opinion of the Government, to secure that end.

Parliament having limited Supplies for the Public Service to Eight Months of the current year, it will be necessary for me to obtain the approval of the Legislature to a further Appropriation Bill.

I will not here state how the Government propose to deal with the probable deficiency for 1879, but will proceed at once to direct your attention to the year 1880, and inform you how we stand in respect to the estimated Revenue for that year from existing sources, and what our prospects are in regard to Expenditure.

### 1880.

You will find on reference to Appendix D. that I have estimated the probable Revenue for the year 1880, from existing sources, at £376,460.

1st. The amount from Customs Duties, you will observe, I have inserted at £210,000, being the same as the estimate for the current year,—because up to the present time the receipts for 1879 do not show such a decline as to make me apprehensive for the year 1880.

2nd. The other branches of the Revenue have undergone careful examination, and are set down at sums which I have every reason to think will be realised.

But the estimated Revenue for 1880, as in the case of 1879, will not be sufficient to meet our financial necessities ; a state of things which, I feel sure, the House is alive to, although that does not relieve me from the task of placing the fact upon record.

The ordinary Estimates of Expenditure for the year 1880 are printed herewith for your guidance (Appendix E.), and they show that the probable ordinary expenses of Government for the year will reach the sum of £404,964 12s. 10d., making a difference between the regular annual Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure of £28,504 12s. 10d., which amount, it must be understood, is exclusive of items of an extraordinary character, that are more generally regarded as matters of policy, and which should therefore, for the sake of convenience, be dealt with when the recommendations of the Government for settling our difficulties are put before you at a later period.

I will indicate for the information of the House, as briefly as possible, where the principal alterations have been made in the Estimates of ordinary Expenditure for the year 1880, as compared with the provision made for the year 1879 by my honorable predecessor, and by subsequent votes of this House for the service of the year 1879.

In the Customs Department, both at Hobart Town and Launceston, ample provision has been made to afford every accommodation to the public in its dealings with the Bonding Warehouses at the two ports, the Warehouses being now under the management of the Government.

The Postal Department shows signs of expansion, chiefly in the cost of Conveyance of Mails,—Inland Mails being taken at £10,500, Postal Communication with Great Britain £4250, and Conveyance of Intercolonial and English Mails between Launceston and Melbourne £4000. The cost of each branch is gradually becoming more expensive, and the demands for increased postal facilities more numerous. Whilst speaking of the Postal Department I take the opportunity to inform the House that the Government a short time since entered into negotiations with the Tasmanian Steam Navigation Company with a view to securing a mail service between Launceston and Melbourne which would ensure regular transmission of all mails, intercolonial and bi-monthly European; and the Government accepted an offer made by the Company to perform the service required by the Colony for a fixed annual subsidy of £4000, the same to take effect on and from a date to be agreed upon by the Government of Victoria and the Peninsula and Oriental Company for commencing the Bi-monthly European Mail Service; the contract with the Tasmanian Steam Navigation Company being, as in the case of that made between the Government of Victoria and the Peninsula and Oriental Company, for a term of eight years.

The Electric Telegraph Department has been reorganised in a manner which ought to render it efficient. In passing, I may say that, as some two or three years must elapse before the proposed new Post and Telegraph Offices can be constructed and made fit for occupation, I have caused temporary repairs to be effected to the office in Macquarie-street, as I considered it necessary to alter at once, at a small cost, the disgraceful state of affairs which a personal inspection of the building presented.

The Education Vote, like other branches, is on the increase.

The Defences of the Colony show a reduction, the provision for the Permanent Artillery Force having been struck out, and separate provision made for the Magazines.

The total Judicial Vote has an upward tendency, which my honorable friend the Attorney-General will be prepared to fully explain.

The Charitable Institutions show a reduction as compared with 1879, and have undergone a careful examination by my honorable colleague the Colonial Secretary, who will deal with the question when the proper time arrives.

The vote for the Magistracy has been increased in consequence of the rapid growth of such places as Bridport, Beaconsfield, and Lisle.

The proposed Police Expenditure does not show any marked change after providing for the additional protection which new places are found to require.

The total expenditure for Gaols has been increased by a sum of £300. A considerable part of this amount is required to pay the Gaoler of the Hobart Town Gaol that portion of his salary formerly paid by the Imperial Government as pension, but which has now been withdrawn.

The vote for Roads, Bridges, and Surveys stands precisely as it did in the Estimates submitted by my honorable predecessor, namely, £26,876. This sum provides for the maintenance of main lines of road and aid to Road Trusts, &c.

Under the head of "Miscellaneous" new items will be found, such as expenses in connection with a residence for the Commodore of the Australian Naval Station, who purposes residing in Hobart Town and making the port his head quarters during a portion of the year; expenses in connection with the Melbourne Exhibition, &c., with such alterations in the amount of the other sums usually asked for under the head of Miscellaneous as circumstances require.

The Schedule of Interest has been corrected to date, and provides £2000 for new Bills.

Members of the House will not be surprised to hear that the accounts I have the honor to submit disclose, financially, an unsatisfactory state of affairs, and are such as to demand serious consideration. It must be apparent to every Hon. Member that it will not be right to allow matters to drift further into arrear by postponing taxation to provide additional Ways and Means.

The Government propose to deal with the deficiencies in the following manner:—

To adjust the accounts for 1879 the Government will ask Parliament to assent to a sum of say £43,000 being raised by the issue of Treasury Bills, bearing interest at the rate of Six per cent. per annum, with the proviso that they shall be redeemed by annual instalments of £8600 for the next five years, the first instalment being payable twelve months from the date of issue, which would be, assuming the Treasury Bills are sold within the next two or three months, late in the year 1880. This will necessitate provision being made in the estimate of liabilities for that year to meet the amount. I think this is the most desirable way of adjusting the account, as we have gone so far through the year 1879 that it is now impossible to raise the amount required by further taxation on account of the delay which must take place before any new scheme, likely to be acceptable to the Colony, can be put into operation, and any return from it made to the Treasury.

Before I submit the proposals of the Government for meeting the deficiencies of the year 1880, I think it will be convenient for me to state what course the Executive intend to take with regard to the accumulated interest paid to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company for the period ending 31st December, 1878, amounting to £73,544 15s. 10d. This debt has accumulated under extraordinary circumstances; and after earnest consideration the Government have resolved to submit for the approval of the Legislature a proposal to capitalise the amount by issuing Debentures—the proceeds of such Debentures to be used to recoup the Treasury the amount advanced to meet this claim, which Parliament directed to be paid without providing the Treasurer with the necessary funds to meet such a heavy drain upon the moneys at his command.

Should this proposal meet with the assent of the House, the amount will be included in a Loans Bill to be negotiated in the London Money Market.

This brings me to the question of Taxation. That we must submit to be taxed, in addition to our present burdens, I think all will admit, although we may be divided in opinion as to the form it should take.

The measures which the Government obtained the assent of this House to during last Session were for the imposition of a Property and Income Tax of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. each, estimated to yield, after deducting the cost of collection, £36,000, which, added to the Ways and Means as then stated—£375,892 17s. 2d.—made together the sum of £411,892 17s. 2d., showing probable surplus of Revenue over the estimated Expenditure, as given at the same time, amounting to £158 16s. 2d.

Circumstances have materially changed since April last. Now there is a positive deficiency to deal with, which we then hoped to provide against by additional taxation. This was not done; therefore I have had to frame my Estimate of Expenditure for 1880, making provision for the interest upon the Treasury Bills proposed to be issued to pay off the probable deficiency brought forward—the first instalment of such Bills falling due during the year—the interest upon the settlement of the Main Line Railway claim before referred to, and the interest upon a further 4 per cent. Loan for Public Works, &c. These additional heavy charges compel me to recast my Estimate of Revenue and increase the amount to be obtained by a Property and Income Tax, the Government still holding the opinion that a Property and Income Tax is the most just and equitable way of obtaining the assistance required by the Consolidated Revenue Fund. I shall, therefore, take an early opportunity to submit a notice that a Property Tax of Eight Pence in the Pound, and an Income Tax of Eight Pence in the Pound, be levied and collected for the year 1880 to enable me to meet the country's obligations; say,—

Many schemes for raising revenue have been suggested to me since the proposals of the Government were submitted to Parliament during the Session of 1878; but those schemes, to my mind, did not possess elements making them fair and equitable: raids upon particular industries cannot in justice be entertained; nor do I think it right that the tax-gatherer should pounce upon enterprise the moment that it appears to be carried on profitably to those engaged in manufacturing and producing articles within the Colony.

I have been urged to seek refuge from the storm by resort to further taxation through the Customs; but this mode of obtaining additional revenue is played out. What we

require is a fairer distribution of the taxation of the Colony. If we go to the Customs for assistance, we shall increase the cost of living to every home far beyond the amount contemplated by the advocates of this mode of obtaining additional revenue, because the consumers will be called upon to pay not only the extra duties but the increased price placed upon importations by importers and retailers of dutiable goods.

The working classes and people of small means already bear their share of the country's burdens through the Customs, and ought not to be called upon to carry the weight which, in my opinion, should be borne upon the shoulders of those better able to support the Treasury Chest. Rather than add to, it is my desire to relieve the Customs Duties; but I cannot do so at the present time in the face of the responsibilities which I am called upon to meet as Colonial Treasurer.

Our taxation which now falls lightly upon the richer classes must be readjusted,—so that accumulated wealth shall bear its due proportion of the amount principally required to pay for Railways and Public Works, which have enhanced the value of property and contributed largely to promote the best interests of the Colony.

My honorable friend the Minister of Lands and Works intends to submit to the House certain proposals in regard to further Public Works to be executed, including the purchase and completion of the Mersey and Deloraine Railway; but, as he will take an early opportunity to bring his recommendations under the notice of the House, I merely refer to the matter in passing.

The expenditure of the balance of the amount appropriated by Parliament under the Public Works Act, 41 Victoria, No. 10, is being proceeded with, and it is expected that the whole of the available funds will be exhausted by the close of this year.

The House will remember that, in April, I stated that a certain sum would be required to defray the cost of Public Works already recognised by Parliament, a list of the items being supplied at the time. These sums were placed in a Bill during last Session and passed by this House, but laid aside in the other branch of the Legislature. I therefore bring the amounts forward again corrected to this date (Appendix F.). The total sum is, say, £11,700, which I intend to ask the House to provide for by a Loans Bill,—the funds to be raised in the Colony at 5 per cent.

The Government have lately sold in one parcel 5 per cent. Debentures representing £65,000 at a satisfactory price.

During the years 1880 and 1881 moneys will have to be raised to pay off Debentures falling due, amounting to £141,900 in the two years. It appears to me, that as the Government must send to England to obtain funds for further Public Works, &c., the sums required for various purposes should be included in one Loans Bill, and Debentures forwarded to London for negotiation at 4 per cent. This course I shall ask the House to take, and, as far as I am able to judge at present, the Bill will be this :—

I recommend this on the part of the Government in full confidence that such a Loan would meet with ready sale in the London money market at a price satisfactory to the Colony. The advices received by the Executive from the Bankers for the Colony in London are most assuring in regard to the result likely to attend an effort to negotiate a further 4 per cent. Loan for the present Administration.

Any funds raised under this Loans Bill in anticipation of immediate requirements will be placed upon fixed deposit, and the amount of interest received therefrom be duly brought to account.

On the 17th June, 1879, the following Motion, then standing in my name, was withdrawn by leave of the House:—

*Mr. Colonial Treasurer* to move—That in the opinion of this House it is desirable that notice be given to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, both in London and Tasmania, that in accordance with the 17th Section of the Contract between the said Company and the Government of this Colony, for the construction of a Main Line Railway between Hobart Town and Launceston, it is the intention of the Government of Tasmania to take advantage of its rights under the section referred to, and acquire possession of the whole undertaking in the manner provided for by the said Contract.

I hope at an early date to re-submit the question, in order to take the sense of Parliament as to the expediency of giving the notice contemplated, as the Government still consider it of paramount importance that the whole undertaking should ultimately become the property of the Colony. Until the Legislature has expressed an opinion upon the subject, as Finance Minister I cannot move in the matter; nor would I advise Parliament to delay other Legislation, necessitating resort to the London Money Market, pending the settlement of the question of purchase of the Main Line Railway.

My predecessors at the Treasury will bear me out in the assertion that the position of Colonial Treasurer is one surrounded by many troubles, and is by no means a bed of roses: the difficulties ahead are very great, and are such that most men decline the responsibility of the office. I am not surprised at this, because the Treasurer must be a man ready to meet the country's wants without being provided with the necessary funds. Additional taxation is a question which cannot be approached without encountering a large amount of opposition both from friend and foe; because, in whatever direction one's attention be turned, those affected thereby discover that of all interests the one in which they are most concerned is the last that ought to be touched. In saying this I do not make a charge against one side of the House or the other; I merely wish to show that any scheme of a Colonial Treasurer, calculated to place his Public Banking Account upon a footing elastic enough to meet the liberality of Parliament in its authorisation of expenditure, requires many considerations before he launches it. The Legislature must not forget

that the country's liabilities have been created by Parliament ; and that it is owing to Parliament not having provided the Ways and Means that the Colonial Treasurer for the time being is compelled to report that the Revenue does not cover the Expenditure.

Our local Institutions evidently have faith in the Colony's ability to pay its way, for they have never ceased to afford every assistance to the Treasury in its hour of need. But is it right to allow the public credit to rest upon such a slender support—support which the Banks might be compelled at any moment to withhold on account of a concentration of their strength being required in another direction ? Any curtailment of the accommodation extended to the Treasury would prove most injurious to the financial credit of the Colony. I therefore appeal to the Legislature to assist me in placing the finances of the Colony upon a sound footing, and to relieve the Treasury from the embarrassment that attends the working of the Department in its endeavour to sustain the public credit with insufficient funds.

I have endeavoured to place before the House a plain and straightforward statement respecting the financial position of the Colony, and the mode in which I propose to grapple with the difficulties that surround us : having done this, I will conclude, Sir, by moving—That you do now leave the Chair, and that the House resolve itself into Committee of Supply.

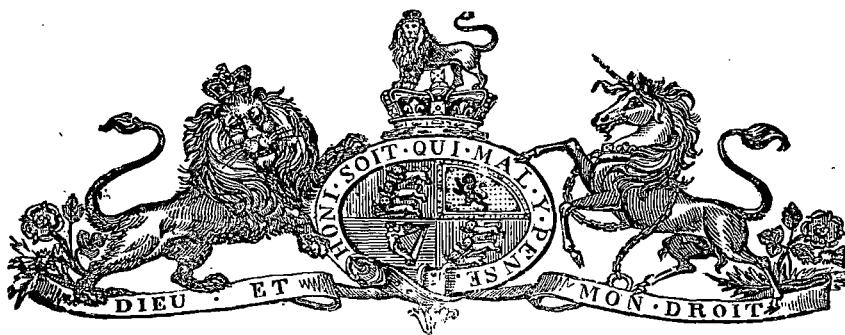
