

## ANNUAL REPORT for 1876.

I HAVE the honor to lay before the Government the Annual Report for 1876.

The number of cases treated in the Hospital during the year was greater than it had been for some years past. The increase was owing principally to the admission of a large number of cases of infectious disease, which were treated in the old building at the back of the Hospital.

The amount received from paying patients has very considerably decreased.

At the Dispensary the number of patients treated was nearly 300 more than in the previous year.

At the beginning of the year a system of female nursing was introduced. Great difficulty has been experienced in obtaining the services of efficient under nurses, and changes in the staff have been of constant occurrence; but, notwithstanding these drawbacks, the nursing is a great improvement upon the former system of male nursing.

## STATISTICAL REPORT of the Surgeon Superintendent.

During the past year there were admitted into Hospital 1150 patients, of whom 719 were males and 431 females.

There were remaining under treatment at the commencement of the year, 75: so that the total number treated during the year ending 31 December, 1876, was 1225. Of these, 1001 were discharged, 116 died, and 108 remained under treatment.

Seven persons died on the day of admission, 12 on the day after, 12 on the second day, 2 on the third, 7 on the fifth, and 4 on the sixth day.

Of the patients admitted 107 were self-supporting, 15 were either wholly or in part chargeable to Imperial funds, and 1103 were Colonial paupers.

The number of out-patients treated during the year was 6945; the number of prescriptions was 9594.
