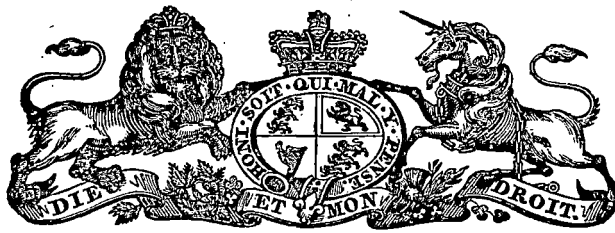

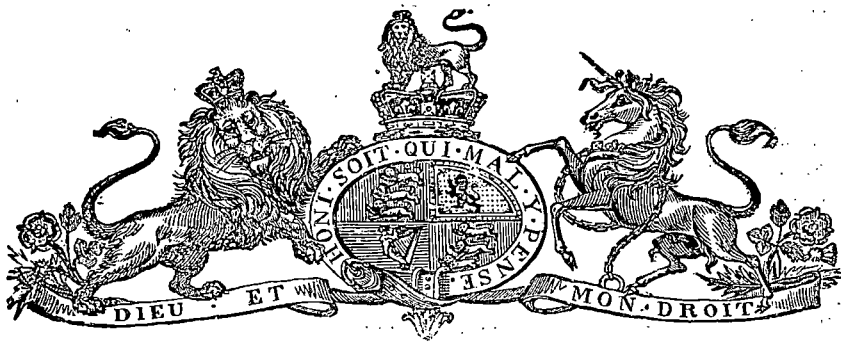
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HOSPITAL FOR INSANE.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THE number of Patients received into the Hospital during the past year has been somewhat less than during the previous year; and to the same extent the number under treatment at the termination of 1873 has been reduced.

This trifling reduction, however, does not warrant the conclusion that the maximum of Insanity in the Colony has been reached, and a permanent process of reduction begun.

The mortality in the past year has been above, and the number of cures effected below, the average of former years.

These results cannot be attributed to any special cause, but must be regarded as fluctuations which occur in all similar Institutions. Although the number of deaths has exceeded the average of former years, the health of the inmates generally has been good.

The management of the Hospital and the condition of the Patients have been as satisfactory as usual.

The whole cost of maintaining the Hospital during the year amounted to £7050 14s. 8d., or 1s. 5d. per diem for each Patient. Of 312 Patients treated during the year, 37 were wholly or partially self-supporting, 35 chargeable to the Imperial, and 240 to the Colonial Government.

Both the cottages appropriated to the better class of Patients, male and female, have been fully self-supporting.

The buildings of the Hospital are all in a satisfactory condition,—all necessary repairs having been effected by the labour of the Patients.

*RETURN of Work performed by Patients in co-operation with the Carpenter and Painter in the Hospital for Insane, New Norfolk, from 1st January to 31st December, 1873.*

*Buildings, &c. erected, and new work.*—Bridge over Lachlan Rivulet, 64 feet long by 4 feet wide, two pigsties and yards, cover to weigh-bridge, part of upper paddocks newly fenced, willow fence planted along millrace, cowman's hut shingled.

*New Articles made by Carpenter.*—Four wheelbarrows, one winnowing fan, four gratings to wash-house, two gratings for sink, cook-house, quantity of handles for axes, hoes, rakes, and other tools, four wood-horses, 27 coffins.

*Repairs by Carpenter, &c.*—Gates and fences at farm, gates and fences Female Division, fence in cells' yard, females, new building and garden trough at millrace head to allow irrigation, horse-cart, dray, bull-cart and wheels to each, culvert in road leading to farm, stable, wood-horses, chairs, forms, close-stools, mangle, wood couches, tables, floors of laundry, mess-rooms, dormitories, cells, and corridors.

*By Painter, Glazier, Bricklayer, &c.*—80 squares of glass put in; children's cottage, new building, latrines, rooms in Female Division, back yard, corridor, front gate lodge, female gate-keeper's lodge, cook-house, posts in front, bath-room, lavatory, whitewashed and coloured; tile-drain laid from weigh-bridge, foundation of weigh-bridge built, drains in front, back, and Female Divisions cleaned out, fire-places and water-pipes kept in thorough repair, front verandah painted, the chimneys throughout kept swept, the whole of the outer walls coloured inside and out, several of the buildings coloured outside, tin spouting made and fixed to verandah boys' cottage.

*N.B.*—No carpenter on staff from January 1st to September 25th.
