



PARLIAMENT OF TASMANIA.

LAUNCESTON WATER AND LIGHT BILL, 1893, [No. 1]:

PETITION AGAINST PASSING INTO LAW.

Presented by Mr. Rooke, September 22, 1893, and ordered by the Legislative Council to be printed.



To the Honourable the President and Members of Legislative-Council of Tasmania, in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Ratepayers and Owners of Property in the City of Launceston,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH:

- 1. The Ratepayers were totally unaware that such a Bill as the Launceston-Water and Light Bill was contemplated until it was placed before Parliament.
- 2. Your Petitioners desire to protest most earnestly against the repeal of the present Water and Electric Lighting Acts.
- 3. Your Petitioners consider the present rating powers of the Council areample, and earnestly protest against any increased rating powers being given to the Council.
- 4. Before any increased rating powers shall be authorised, your Petitioners-respectfully submit that the consent of the Ratepayers shall be obtained by a majority of two-thirds of the voters at a pell to be taken for that purpose.
- 5. Your Petitioners respectfully submit their opinion that the proposed Bill is-unnecessary.

And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c.
