

ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

REPORT FOR 1873.

Laid upon the Table by Mr. Chapman, and ordered by the Council to be printed, July 21, 1874.



Electric Telegraph Department, 16th June, 1874.

Sir,

I have the honor to forward the Annual Telegraph Report for presentation to Parliament, which, compared with the Returns of former years, presents the following very gratifying results:—

- Tasmanian Land Line Business.—The Report for 1873 showed an increase over 1872 of 3213 Telegrams and £159 12s. in Receipts. 1874 shows an increase on 1873 of 3162 Telegrams and £156 5s. 6d. in Receipts.
- 2. Tasmanian Land Line Business derived from Intercolonial Business.—1873 showed an increase on 1872 of 298 Telegrams and £13 0s. 1d. in Receipts. 1874 shows an increase on 1873 of 1803 Messages and £111 5s. in Receipts.
- 3. Intercolonial Business.—1873 showed an increase on 1872 of 298 Telegrams and £227 0s. 2d. in Receipts. 1874 shows an increase on 1873 of 1803 Messages and £705 in Receipts.
- 4. Total Business.—1873 showed an increase on 1872 of 6352 Messages (free and paid) and £386 13s. 2d. in Receipts. 1874 shows an increase on 1873 of 5126 Messages and £913 7s. 9d. in Receipts. Making an increase of 11,478 Messages and £1300 0s. 11d. in Receipts in the two years ended 30th April, 1874.
- 5. As stated in last year's Report, the value of the Public Service Telegrams, added to the Paid Business, again places the income of the Department very greatly in excess of its expenditure. The number of Messages in this section shows but a small increase (167) on last year,—the indiscriminate, and in many instances most unnecessary, use of the Lines having been prohibited by the Government, to the great convenience of Paid Messages, the prompt transmission of which has hitherto been most seriously affected by Messages of unnecessary length and of but small importance, which, as stated in the Government Notice, should properly be forwarded in the ordinary way through the Post Office. It is impossible to over-estimate the great advantages secured to Paid Business by the introduction of this prohibition.

As stated in my Report for last year, to enable comparative statements of business to be presented, it has been necessary to adopt the twelve months ending 30th April as the financial year of the Department; the 1st of May being the anniversary of the establishment of Intercolonial communication in 1869, and of the adoption in 1870 of a reduced Tariff from 2s. 6d. for 10 words and 2d. each additional word to 1s. for 10 words and 1d. each additional word on the Victorian Lines; a similar reduction having been made on the Tasmanian Lines since 20th May, 1869. (Appendices A. and B.)

Comparative statements for the ordinary financial year ending 31st December are furnished as before (Appendices C. D. E. F.).

Seventy Messages were transmitted between Europe and Tasmania during the twelve months ending 30th April, 1874, at a cost of £906 15s. 6d.; but this in only a small degree represents the actual European business transacted, many Telegrams being sent to and from Tasmania through cipher agencies in Melbourne.

It is satisfactory to record that, out of the 39,606 messages transmitted, only some eight or ten complaints of errors or delays have been officially registered. There may have been others, but they have not been brought under my notice officially, and we cannot, therefore, be expected to take cognizance of them. In one of the Reports of Sir W. O. S. Brooke, F.R.S.; Superintendent of Telegraphs in India, he states:—"105,893 messages contained 2,342,812 words, of which 1982 were erroneous, being one word erroneous in 1182. The true wonder is so few mistakes occur. The sufferer by such blunders generally appeals to the press, and cites his case as a specimen of the bad working of the Department. The conclusion is not just. Nothing is heard or known of the 1182 words which have been sent correctly, while loud indignation is naturally expressed for the one error in that number." Mr. Charles Todd, C.M.G., Superintendent of Telegraphs, South

Australia, writing on this subject, says:—"It must be remembered that every message has to run the chauce of being sent incorrectly by the transmitting operator, who at a busy instrument has ofteu no opportunity of previously reading the messages he transmits, which, by the by, are frequently badly written; and secondly, of being wrongly rendered by the receiving clerk, who writes it at dictation of the instrument, the utterances of which are affected by the state of the weather, &c. * * * * One operator at a busy station will, with every care, be certain to make mistakes through the pressure of business. Another operator, who may perhaps be really less careful and painstaking, yet, having less to do, and more time to do it in, will be, from that circumstance, more exempt from errors." Errors, delays, &c. should be officially reported to me, and they will always be promptly enquired into. It is manifestly most unfair for persons to complain outside the office without first affording us an opportunity of giving an explanation which might exonerate the Department from all blame.

The Lines have been maintained in remarkably good working order throughout the year, at a saving of nearly One hundred Pounds under the amount voted for repairs, &c. The internal arrangements of the offices have been greatly improved by the erection of modern instruments of the very best description, in place of old ones of comparatively obsolete pattern which could no longer be relied on.

During the past twelve months several of our most experienced operators have left us to join the Telegraph Departments in other Colonies at salaries which our own Department is not able to offer. Possibly on the opening of new Lines opportunities may arise for combining the local Post and Telegraph Offices, and so juniors may be promoted as Station Masters, and the services of well-trained operators be retained in this service.

I may perhaps be permitted to place on record that, on my recommendation, wire of smaller gauge will be introduced on the new Circular Head, Sorell, Fingal, and other Lines, which will result in a saving to the Colony of some thousands of pounds.
