



THE Dietary Scale on the 1st January, 1861, with the various alterations that have since been made in it:

SCALE A .- For Children 8 years and upwards.

Daily rate. Meat. 8 ounces. Potatoes, 8 ditto. Bread, 1 pound. Tea, 2 drams. Sugar, 1 ounce. Milk, 3 pint.

Rice, ½ ounce on soup days, Mondays & Saturdays. Salt, ½ ounce. Sundays.

Currants, 1 ounce.
Suct, ½ ditto.
Flour, 4 ditto, in lieu of portion of the bread.

SCALE B .- For Children from 6 to 8 years of age. Meat 6 ounces, remainder as in Scale A.

SCALE C .- For Children from 3 to 6 years of age.

Meat. 4 ounces. Potatoes, 6 ditto. Bread, 12 ditto. Tea, 2 drams. Sugar, & ounce.

Milk, 1 pint.

Rice, On soup days 2 ounces of each.

Butter, ½ ounce.

The ingredients for pudding on Sundays to consist of the same as in Scale A.

SCALE for Male Servants.

Flour, 20 per cent., 13 pounds. Meat, 3 ditto. Vegetables, 3 ditto.

Tea, 3 ounce. Sugar, 4½ ounces. Salt, ½ ounce.

SCALE for Female Servants.

Flour, fine, 13 pounds. Meat, 3 pound. Vegetables, 3 ditto. Tea, 4 ounce.

Sugar, 4½ ounces... Milk, ½ pint. Salt, ½ ounce.

The latter article being issued at supper time.

Scales A. and B: 1st 6 months, on Fridays—4 ozs. maccaroni, 20 grains spice. 3 pint milk, in lieu of Meat: and Vegetables. The above was changed from 1st July, to 4 ozs. oatmeal, 1 oz. sugar, and 3 pint milk, and 1 oz. cheese.

INFORMATION required respecting the QUEEN'S ORPHAN SCHOOLS.

WHETHER the sum of £4000 voted last Session of Parliament has been wholly or in part expended? The whole of the vote has been appropriated.

How, and in what manner? In payments made, and contracts entered into on account of new Infant Asylum. Bricks for same as hereinafter set forth. Also, in carrying out alterations and repairs to buildings generally as set forth in Appendix A.

What works have been commenced and are now in progress? Works in progress—New Infant Asylum.

What works have been completed and paid for? The several works set forth in Appendix A. B. and C.

What works have been contracted for? (if any.) Those enumerated as contracted for in the Appendices hereto attached: also the New Infant Asylum, and the bricks for the same.

The Name of the Contractor, and the Amount to be paid for them? Joseph Miller's, contract for bricks, £1350; R. Wiggins' contract main building, £5995; Foundations estimated at £666 9s., £6661 9s. Drains, according to size, per yard; viz.—9 inch 3s. 6d., 12 inch 4s. 6d., 18 inch 5s. 6d.

Other works not contracted, whether paid for or not? The cost of them, and by whom performed? Appendix A B and C give the particulars required by these interrogatories.

The Amount of all Moneys paid on account of unfinished works? The only work on hand unfinished is the New Infant Asylum, and the amount paid on account of contract is £1958.

To whom, and where paid? Robert Wiggins (instalment) £1350; Joseph Miller £608.

And the probable or estimated cost to complete them? £6653, including contingencies, drains, cartage, &c.

An account of the expense of the newly-erected fence, whether put up by contract or otherwise? The fence was put up by contract. Its erection cost £137 5s.

By whom erected? By the Contractors who furnished the lowest tender—John Smith, William Flack, and the laborers employed by them. Names of laborers unknown to this Department.

The entire cost of the work? £137 5s. and £17 17s. 6d. for paying fence with coal tar.

Whether the timber or material, or any of them, were obtained from the Imperial Government? Yes; from Port Arthur.

If so, the quantity, the price, and how or through what channel paid for? Quantity in fence—421 rods of post and arris rails buttened over. The timber was supplied as stated, and the Director of Public Works understood it was not to be paid for by the Colony.

The Names of the persons employed to put up the said fence? John Smith and William Flack, and the workmen employed by them. Names of workmen not known at this Department.

Whether any of the work was sublet? Smith left the work, and it was completed by Flack his co-mate.

If so, by whom and to whom? As before stated—Mr. R. Shoobridge performed the cartage and supplied the nails under an agreement made with the Contractors.

Has any Member of the Board ever had any direct or indirect interest in the supply of any article to the Establishment or any of the Works? Mr. Shoobridge supplied lime to main buildings for whitewashing and repairs, and performed cartage and supplied nails to Contractors for fence as before stated. As regards articles to the Establishment, I am unable to answer,
