Notices of Motion

TASMANIA

163 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges with immense concern that the Arctic is on fire, the first glacier has melted in Iceland and we are in a climate emergency.
- (2) Understands that the Amazon rainforest is burning as a result of illegal land clearing, primarily for beef production.
- (3) Recognises that the Amazon, Arctic and forests around the planet are in large part, the lungs of the earth,
- (4) Accepts the 8 August 2019 report from the International Panel on Climate Change, that notes the critical part forests play in mitigating emissions and storing carbon
- (5) Further understands that business as usual is not an option for current and future generations, and that all jurisdictions and communities have an obligation to make significant changes in the unfolding climate emergency.
- (6) Celebrates the 20 African countries that have joined together to plant a giant wall of trees that will run 7000 kilometres across their continent to stop the spread of the Sahara Desert.
- (7) Further accepts the protection of existing carbon-sequestering forests are critical to a safe climate.
- (8) Calls on the Liberal and Labor Parties to heed the science and recognise their moral responsibility to support the ongoing protection of the 356,000ha of high conservation value, carbon banking forest set aside under the Tasmanian Forest Agreement. (4 September 2019)

165 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges 3 September 2019, was Merchant Navy Day, which is commemorated on the anniversary of the sinking of the first British merchant vessel during World War II, and in 2019 it falls on the 80th anniversary of when Australia entered the Second World War.
- (2) Further acknowledges that the Merchant Navy Day illustrates the important contribution mariners have made to Australia's economic growth and prosperity in peace time and in war.
- (3) Notes that the Merchant Navy of the whole British Empire, which included the Australian Merchant Fleet, suffered proportionately the highest casualties of any of the allied services in the Second World War.
- (4) Further notes that thirty thousand two hundred and forty eight British Empire merchant seamen who served at sea under the red ensign lost their lives doing so with the Australian Department of Veterans Affairs nominal roll recording 3,500 Australian merchant seamen serving in World War II in Australian registered ships.

- (5) Recognises the Tasmanian Seafarers' Memorial, located in Triabunna, on Tasmania's East Coast, which honours the lives of all Tasmanian seafarers who lost their lives at sea, including those who served in the armed forces. (4 September 2019)
- **166** The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that National Stroke Week 2019 is taking place from 2-8 September 2019.
 - (2) Further notes that the theme for National Stroke Week in 2019 is "F.A.S.T. Heroes" recognising the everyday heroes who have spotted the signs of a stroke and called an ambulance straight away.
 - (3) Further notes the F.A.S.T. test helps us to remember the stroke signs we need to watch out for and what to do if you suspect somebody is having a stroke:—
 - (a) Face has the person's face dropped;
 - (b) Arms can they lift both arms;
 - (c) Speech is the person's speech slurred and can they understand what is being said; and
 - (d) Time calling 000 as soon as possible is critical.
 - (4) Congratulates the Stroke Foundation for their outstanding work to provide support for people living with stroke and raising awareness of stroke both locally and nationally.
 - (5) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Government's strong investment in boosting access to stroke services and support, including \$440,000 of funding provided to the Stroke Foundation in 2018 and the new stroke telemedicine service which will commence later in 2019 thanks to the recruitment of full time neurologists to service the North and North-West. (5 September 2019)
- **167** The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises Women's Health Week, which takes place from September 2 -6, with the theme of movement Put your best foot forward for your health.
 - (2) Notes the two biggest barriers for women not maintaining a healthy lifestyle is 'lack of time' and 'health not being a priority'.
 - (3) Further notes that Women's Health Week serves as a timely reminder to all women that they need to look after themselves, inside and out.
 - (4) Supports the Tasmanian Women's Strategy 2019-2021, which focuses on four priority areas financial security, leaderships and participation, safety and health and wellbeing.
 - (5) Acknowledges the Hodgman Liberal Government has taken strong action on this issue, including investment of \$435,200 to Women's Health Tasmania to improve health and wellbeing outcomes for Tasmanian women, especially women vulnerable to poorer health. \$398,100 was also allocated to The Link Youth Health Services to provide an implement services which improve the health and wellbeing of young people, noting that young women represent the majority of service clients.
 - (6) Encourages individuals, communities and workplaces to get involved by sharing our health messages, hosting an event and encouraging as many women as possible to sign up to the week. (3 September, 2019)
- 168 The Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises that the Government has a duty to protect those who protect us.
 - (2) Notes that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government makes no apology for taking strong action to protect people from the scourge of drugs and violence.
 - (3) Further notes Labor's track record of siding with the Greens when it came to the Hodgman majority Liberal Government's strong action to protect Tasmanians by cracking down on serious organised crime and outlaw motorcycle gangs, even against the advice of Tasmania Police and the Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission.
 - (4) Further notes that just like the Greens, Labor opposed and continue to oppose guaranteed prison time for assaults on off duty police officers.
 - (5) Further notes that Labor together with the Greens opposed and continue to oppose protections for our frontline workers and oppose guaranteed prison time for criminals who assault our frontline workers.
 - (6) Further notes that Labor just like the Greens, consistently opposes guaranteed prison time for serious child sex offenders.

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- (7) Further notes that Labor, like the Greens, has no policies to support the police in their role to protect the Tasmanian community.
- (8) Would welcome the Government bringing forward new legislation to guarantee prison time for assaults on frontline workers and serious child sex offenders. (5 September 2019)
- **169** Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House condemns the Hodgman Liberal Government for its reckless mismanagement of wildlife in Tasmania that is driving species towards extinction. (5 September 2019)

- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)

11 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the

potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.

- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs *Rylah*)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio." (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

12 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

13 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.

- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)
