

February 1st, 1901.

SIR, I HAVE the honour to submit the Sixth Annual Report of the Launceston Benevolent Asylum for the Year ending 31st December, 1900.

Admissions and Discharges.

The daily average of inmates for the year was males, 125; females, 41; total, 166; of whom 164 were chargeable to the Colonial Government, and 2 to the Imperial Government.

Expenditure.

The total expenditure was £2216 19s. 3d., of which £2000 was contributed by the Government.

t. The balance was received from maintenance fees, labour of inmates, and other sources. The annual cost per head to the Government was £11 13s. 5d., the gross cost amounting to

£13 7s. 1d., and the daily cost 7⁵d. The buildings have been thoroughly repaired and put into a sanitary condition, and will continue in good order, with a triffing outlay, for many years to come, cement drains having been built round the dormitories, which were required to carry off all surface drainage.

A new cement floor has been laid down in the lavatory, and proper attention has been given to the drainage of the same.

Cement dadoes, varying from 4 to 6 feet high, have been added to the interior walls of the buildings, and in due time will be painted, which will add very much to the appearance and comfort of the sleeping apartments.

The amount of cost per head appears somewhat larger this year, but, when deducting the cost of repairs, amounting to £161 19s. 6d., and the amount of duty paid on provisions, it will be noticed the actual cost to the Government is very small, being £9 16s. 101d. each.

£229 5s. 2d. having been expended in providing new Waverley blankets, bedding, clothing, &c., expenditure under this heading will not be so heavy next year.

The conduct and health of the inmates have been very favourable throughout the year.

The inmates have received the usual birthday and Christmas extras, also extras in the form of roast beef, pudding, and tobacco, on the return of the troops to Launceston, and on occasions of successes of H.M. troops in South Africa.

Their spiritual well-being has received careful attention from the City Missionary (Rev. Mr. Bowe), Captain Ditcham, and the Rector of Trinity Church.

Various religious denominations have provided enjoyable teas, in addition to a large quantity of agreeable and useful donations from many friends of the inmates.
