



ANNUAL REPORT for 1885.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management, giving particulars regarding the government, condition, and cost of the above-named Hospital for the year 1885.

- 2. Messrs. Stanfield, Birchall, and Maddox retired in accordance with the Hospital Act, but were re-elected to their positions as Members for the year.
 - 3. Thirteen Board and forty-eight Committee meetings were held during the year.
- 4. Attention was called to the defective drainage of the premises, by the visitation of fever, on members of the Staff. It was deemed prudent to abandon the old barrel drain, and in lieu of it a sewer composed of earthenware pipes was laid down; simultaneously asphalt was placed round the foundations of all the buildings. In addition to the alteration made in the drainage system improvements were effected in the drying room of the laundry. The Minister of Lands and Works, together with officers of his department, visited the Hospital during the year, and formulated a scheme of improvements which must eventually improve the hygienic conditions of the Buildings. A sum of money having been voted by Parliament in furtherance of this scheme, the Board look forward anxiously to the realisation of the completed works.
- 5. The Board desire to express their regret at the death of Miss Pitman, one of the most promising nurses, who died early in the year of typhoid fever.
- 6. A slight improvement was effected in the dietary of patients, and colonial port wine was substituted for foreign.
- 7. The ladies connected with the Christian Mission Church, who inaugurated a Flower Mission, have most punctually and zealously visited the patients, and have helped to make the wards cheerful and bright. The Board are also under obligations to other ladies who have forwarded flowers and fruit regularly.
- 8. The patients have on several occasions been entertained by different citizens, who arranged concerts for their amusement.
 - 9. Attention was directed to the fact that Chinamen rarely pay fees when admitted as patients.
- 10. A Samaritan fund having been established in connection with the Hospital, deserving persons receive pecuniary aid when leaving the Institution.
- 11. Consequent on the resignation of the Superintendent of the Selby Police, the House Steward was appointed Collector for the Institution.
- 12. Prescriptions were made up for the Industrial School, and for those patients who were unable to present themselves at the Dispensary and who were attended gratuitously by a Medical man. The Chairman of the Benevolent Society must in every instance certify to the indigent circumstances of the patient.
- 13. The Board have much pleasure in recording its indebtedness to the gentlemen who comprise the Honorary Consulting Staff; they have always cheerfully given their services when called upon to do so. Dr. Crowther resigned his position on the staff, and Dr. Hallowes was appointed in his stead.
- 14. The work of the Hospital having increased of late years, the appointment of a House Surgeon is deemed necessary.
- 15. During the absence of the Surgeon-Superintendent from the Colony in August, Dr. Pike officiated as Acting Superintendent.
- 16. A perusal of the returns furnished herewith proves that the year has been a noteworthy one. Compared with the year 1884, very many more patients were treated, the receipts were greatly in excess, daily average number of patients greater, average duration of stay in Hospital shorter, average cost of each occupied bed less, and the mortality less, during the year 1885.
- 17. The thanks of the Board are due to the Surgeon-Superintendent and the Lady Superintendent for the manner in which they discharged their duties, and their ready willingness to do anything to improve the working of the Institution.
- 18. Cost of alcoholic foods, reckoned upon daily average, is a fraction less than 1d. per diem. Number of persons who received such foods, 712.
