

## NEW TOWN CHARITABLE INSTITUTION.

### REPORT FOR 1894.

SIR.

I HAVE the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report of the New Town Charitable Institution for the year 1894.

Strength.

The number of inmates on the books during the year was—Males, 689; females, 274 = 963, or 93 less than in 1893.

The actual number of inmates on the 31st December last was 538, or an increase of 23 on the corresponding date of the previous year.

The highest number of inmates at any one time was 594. Compared with 1893, this shows an increase of 19. The lowest number was 495, or a decrease of 8 compared with 1893.

The average daily number during the year was 549.03, being an increase of 7.33 on the previous year.

Admissions.

The number admitted during the year was 448, or 90 less than the previous year.

## Discharges.

The number discharged was 313, as against 419 in 1893.

#### Mortality.

The number of deaths during the year was 112, or 11.63 per cent., as against 122, or 11.55 per cent. in 1893. The average age of those who died was 74.46 years, the maximum age being 97 and the minimum 25 years. The average age of the 11 oldest was 88.90. Thirty-two averaged over 80 years of age.

Fuller particulars under this head will be found in the tables in the Appendices.

#### Expenditure.

The gross expenditure for the year was £5955 18s. 3d., being £657 8s. less than in 1893. The receipts from all sources were £619 3s., being £164 15s. 7d. more than the receipts for 1893. The net expenditure was £5336 15s. 3d., as against £6158 18s. 10d. for 1893, or £822 3s. 7d. less. The cost per head on gross expenditure was £10 16s.  $11\frac{3}{4}d$ ., as against £12 4s. 2d. in 1893. The cost per head on net expenditure was £9 14s. 5d., as against £11 7s. 5d. in 1893. During the year Customs Duties were paid on tea, sugar, tobacco, and spirits to the extent of £262 10s., thus adding 9s. 7d. per head to the cost as compared with former years.

#### Repairs and Improvements.

The repairs and improvements necessary were mainly executed by inmate labour. Of the sum of £26 i9s. 7d. expended under this heading, nearly the whole of that sum was for material, timber, &c.

#### Garden.

43,789 lbs. of vegetables, valued at £73 6s., were raised and used in the Institution, and £31 0s. 6d. worth were supplied to the Gaol and the General Hospital. and the second of the second o

## Farm.

Farm.

The annexed Return, marked E., will show the operations of the Farm for 1894. It is pleasing to note that the working of the Farm has resulted in a profit of £187 2s. 8d. for the year.

## Religious Services.

The Chaplains, Lay Preachers, Sisters of Charity, Flower Mission, Christian Endeavour Society, Ladies' Reading Committee, Salvation Army, and others have, as usual, been most zealous in attending to the spiritual wants of the inmates during the year.

## Entertainments, Treats, &c.

Entertainments were given during the year by the Orpheus Club, City Band, and others, and

were greatly appreciated by the inmates.

The usual extras of roast beef and plum pudding were given by the Government on Queen's Birthday and Christmas Day; and the Cascade Brewery Company kindly sent a hogshead of ale on the latter day. The Hon. F. W. Piesse, M.L.C., and Mr. J. Bowman subscribed the sum of £1 and £2 respectively for the purchase of fruit, and donations, of fruit, &c. were received from Ven. Archdeacon Mason, Messrs. Gould, Jacobs Bros., Piesse, and R. Walker and Co.

The proprietors of the *Mercury*, *Church News*, and *Monitor* have kindly supplied free copies of their publications; and books, periodicals, &c. have been presented by Mrs. C. E. Davies, E. Mulcahy, Esq., M.H.A., J. Bowman, Esq., Captain Ross, and other friends of the Institution.
