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

WE have the honor to forward to you the Annual Report of St. Joseph's Orphanage and Industrial School.

We have the pleasure of stating that everything during the present year has been as satisfactory as in the preceding years. Five girls have been apprenticed, four are going on well, and the fifth had to be transferred at the desire of the Governors, and she is giving satisfaction to her present employer. The girls formerly apprenticed are doing their duty to their masters, who are well satisfied with them.

During the year twelve children have been admitted, six from Government and six supported by relatives.

A room has been added to the laundry at the cost of $\pounds 205\ 15s.\ 5d.$, to be used as an ironing and mangling room. It is provided with a gas-stove, which we hope will be more economical, and add to the comfort of those employed in the laundry. Whilst the room was building the usual washing could not be done, which will account for the decrease in the receipts for that item.

The receipts for the dairy are exclusive of an abundant supply of milk for the children, who usually have it for breakfast.

The increase in the prices of food and fuel has made it very difficult for those who have the charge of the Institution to make the receipts meet the expenditure. Miss O'Reilly, of Mount Huon, kindly presented a valuable cow. To Mr. D. Sexton we are indebted for several tons of wood, and other kind friends have been liberal in their donations. A legacy of £30 was left by the late Mrs. M'Leod, and one from Mrs. Hart of £5.

Most of the younger children had the whooping-cough in the winter, but by the judicious treatment of Drs. H. and G. Butler they got over it without any injury to their general health.

A Bazaar was held in March, which realized £300, and enabled us to pay off some of the debt due on the Institution.


