

ANNUAL REPORT, 1898.

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Jenico William Joseph, Viscount Gormanston, G.C.M.G., Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THE Council of the University of Tasmania, in conformity with the provisions of "The Tasmanian University Act," has the honour to report, for the information of Your Excellency in Council, the proceedings of the University for the year 1898.

I.—Public Examinations.

Junior Public Examination.

The Eighth Examination under the Regulations for the Junior Public Examination was held at Hobart and Launceston, and also at Ulverstone, Longford, Devonport, Deloraine, and Franklin, as Local Centres, under Local Committees. The Examination lasted from the 21st to the 28th November, both dates inclusive, and was under the following Examiners:—Professors A. M'Aulay, M.A.; J. Macfarlan, M.A., LL.B.; Rev. H. D. Atkinson, B.A.; Messrs. C. J. H. Chepmell, M.A.; J. B. Waldron, jun., M.A.; W. Walker, B.A.; F. M. Young, B.A.; S. M'Burney, Mus. Doc.; W. H. Jones; Lt.-Col. Cruickshank, R.E.

One hundred and forty-three candidates presented themselves. Ninety-four passed; twenty-nine being placed in the First

Class, and sixty-five in the Second.

Twelve also entered for single subjects under the Regulations providing for the same.

Junior Exhibitions.

On the result of the foregoing Examination, the Council awarded to the five following candidates Junior Exhibitions of the value of £20 per annum each, tenable for three years from the 1st January, 1899, at the Institutions mentioned after their names:—

Senior Public Examination.

The Eighth Examination under the Regulations for the Senior Public Examination began at Hobart and Launceston on the 21st and ended on the 29th November. Candidates were also examined at the Local Centres of Ulverstone, Longford, and Devonport.

Thirty-six candidates presented themselves, of whom twentyeight satisfied the Examiners. Of these ten were placed in the First Class, seven in the Second, and eleven in the Third. Six also entered for single subjects under the Regulations providing for the same.

University Scholarships.

The Regulations provide that, on the result of each Annual Senior Public Examination, two Scholarships, each of the value of £25, tenable for three years from the first day of January immediately following that Examination, shall be awarded to candidates who shall have fulfilled all the conditions prescribed.

The Board of Examiners for the Public Examinations reported the two following candidates as first in order of merit on list of candidates qualified for Scholarships under the Regulations:—

Class Lists.

Class Lists of the Senior and Junior Public Examinations were published on Commemoration Day, and will appear in the Calendar.

The total number of candidates examined, including the 18 who entered for single subjects, was 197.

II.—Examinations for Degrees.

Ordinary Examinations.

On the 10th, 11th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, and 18th November there were held the Ordinary Examinations for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws. The Examiners were the Professors of the University, with the following coadjutors for the B.A. and B.Sc. subjects:—Professors Bensly, M.A. (Adelaide); E. J. Nanson, M.A. (Melbourne); H. Laurie, LL.D. (Melbourne); Orme Masson, D.Sc. (Melbourne); W. F. Ward. A.R.S.M.; M. W. MacCallum, M.A. (Sydney); E. J. Trechmann, M.A., Ph.D. (Sydney): and, for the Law subjects, Professor W. H. Moore (Melbourne).

For the Bachelor of Arts Examinations there were in all 16 condidates. 6 from Hohest 10 from Laureseten, of these 12

For the Bachelor of Arts Examinations there were in all 16 candidates—6 from Hobart, 10 from Launceston; of these 12 passed their several Examinations. One also subsequently passed the Supplementary Examination in Mathematics III., thus completing his course for a Degree. For the Bachelor of Science Examinations there were 4 candidates from Hobart, who all passed.

For the Bachelor of Laws Examinations there were in all 10 candidates examined—5 from Hobart and 5 from Launceston—7 of whom satisfied the Examiners.

Thirty-ore candidates in all presented themselves for the Degree Examinations. The names of the candidates who passed, and the classes in which Honour candidates were placed, are set forth in the class lists annexed to the Report.

One candidate again entered in English under the Regulations for admission to Examination in single subjects, and satisfied the Examiners, thus qualifying for a Certificate of having passed the complete course of three Examinations in this subject. Two candidates also entered in the single subject of Logic, of whom one passed, and four others in compulsory subjects, all of whom passed.

III .- MATRICULATED STUDENTS.

IV.—DEGREES CONFERRED.

On Commemoration Day, 15th December, the Annual Meeting of the University was held in the Town Hall, at which Your Excellency was unfortunately unable to be present as Visitor and give your usual address. The annual November.

V .- LECTURES DELIVERED AT THE UNIVERSITY.

The number of Lectures delivered at the University throughout the Academic year averaged 50 in each week. The number of Students attending under the University Professors and Instructors at Hobart and Launceston was, in the last term, 38.

VI.—TEACHING AT LAUNCESTON.

The University Professors have continued to pay weekly visits to Launceston to deliver lectures and give students assistance and direction in their several courses of study. Additional teaching was giving during the year by Mr. H. C. Kingsmill, M.A., and Mr. A. W. B. Perceval, B.A., who were appointed in 1895, the former giving instructions in Mathematics weekly, under the Professor in that subject, and the latter in Modern Languages, also weekly. The number of students at Launceston was, in the last term, 16.

VII.—THE COUNCIL.

The Chancellorship became vacant early in the year through the lamented death of Sir W. Lambert Dobson, K.C.M.G., the Chief Justice of the Colony. For 35 years he was a zealous member of the former Council of Education, and sometimes its President. When the Council of Education was dissolved and in its stead the University was established, it was felt that he was the fitting man to be its Chancellor, and when his term of office expired he was twice re-elected. His loss will long be regretted throughout the Colony, and especially by the University over which he so ably presided.

The Rev. George Clarke, who had been Vice-Chancellor since the inauguration of the University, was, on the 21st

The Rev. George Clarke, who had been Vice-Chancellor since the inauguration of the University, was, on the 21st February, unanimously re-elected to that office, and held it till elected Chancellor on the 16th May. Mr. J. B. Walker was elected Vice-Chancellor on the 18th July, in succession to the Rev. George Clarke.

Council Elections.

Two Members of the Council vacated their seats under the operation of Section Four of "The Tasmanian University Act," namely, The Hon. G. T. Collins and Mr. T. Stephens, M.A. In the place of the former the Members of the House of Assembly elected the Rev. J. B. W. Woollnough on the 1st November.

The seven Members retiring at the end of the year in accordance with the provisions of the Act were re-elected on the following dates, viz.:—

XIII. PARLIAMENTARY APPROPRIATION.

The sum of £4000, fixed by the Tasmanian University Act for payment out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Council of the University, has never been received since the year 1892. It was reduced by special legislation to £2500 for the year 1896, and also for 1897. For 1898 the reduction was slightly lessened, the appropriation for the year having been fixed at £2900, and for 1899 it is £3200, a sum which is still inadequate for the performance of the work which the University ought to do, and which the Council is anxious to undertake. The additional instruction requisite in connection with the Mining Course will of itself involve considerable addition to the annual expenditure.
