

LAUNCESTON GENERAL HOSPITAL.

ANNUAL REPORT of 1874.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Report of the Launceston General Hospital for 1874.

The total number of Patients, both indoor and outdoor, during 1874 was less than in the previous year, owing, as I believe, so far as the outdoor cases are concerned, to the greater care and discrimination exercised by gentlemen having the power of recommendation.

The average daily number in the house was greater than in 1873, and the total expenditure of the Establishment somewhat more, though the daily cost per head was a fraction less than in the previous year.

Of the Patients admitted, 46 were Self-supporting, 3 were wholly or in part chargeable to Imperial Funds, and 320 were Colonial Paupers.

The sum of £209 18s. 8d. was received from and on account of the Self-supporting Patients during the year.

There were admitted to Hospital during 1874, 369 Patients, of whom 279 were males and 90 females.

There remained under treatment at the close of 1873, 52 Patients, so that the total number treated during the year was 421; and of these 311 were discharged cured or relieved, 48 died, and 62 remained under treatment.

The mortality was less than in any year since 1857.

Dr. A. J. Macqueen having obtained permission to resign the position of House Surgeon, Dr. R. W. Murphy was appointed in his room from 1st September.

The statistical information appended will speak for itself.
