

# COUNCIL OF EDUCATION.

REPORT FOR 1871-72.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Treasurer, and ordered by the House to be printed, June 25, 1872.



ANNUAL REPORT of the TASMANIAN COUNCIL OF EDUCATION for the Year 1871-72.

To His Excellency Charles Du Cane, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

1. In conformity with the provisions of "The Tasmanian Council of Education and 22 Vict. No.21. Scholarship Act," we have the honor to submit this our Twelfth Report embracing the Section 30. proceedings of the Council between the 1st May, 1871, and the 30th April, 1872.

- 2. The Honorable F. M. Innes was re-elected President for the year ending 30th President. June, 1872.
- 3. We caused an Examination to be held in the month of June, 1871, of Candidates Exhibitions to for Exhibitions to Superior Schools. Eleven presented themselves for examination; and, on the recommendation of the Examiners, Exhibitions of the value of £20 each Gazette were awarded to Alfred Doran, pupil of the Rev. J. R. Buckland, Hutchins School, Notice, 20 Hobart Town, and Morton John Cecil Allport, pupil of W. W. Fox, Esq., Horton June, 1871. College, Ross.

The Examiners in closing their Report on the Examination observe :-

During the past year the Council has raised the standard of qualification for an Exhibition from 528 marks to 600, the latter number being the half of the maximum. This standard was reached by five boys, and the two foremost, Alfred Doran and Morton John Cecil Allport, obtained 1071 and 816 marks respectively. We recommend them for the two Exhibitions offered by the Council, and certify that they are, in our opinion, well deserving of the honor.

Besides those who have attained the highest standard, five others have obtained the number of marks qualifying them for the mention of their names in the Table.

The number of Candidates, which has very much fluctuated, was small as compared with the experience of several preceding years, but larger than at some former Examinations. The establishment of a Preliminary Examination has probably produced the effect which was intended in diminishing somewhat the number of Candidates. Few boys, or none, now offer themselves except those who are at least likely to acquit themselves creditably, though they may be outstripped by other competitors.

Alfred Doran, who has distinguished himself so highly at this Examination, has obtained a larger number of marks than has been reached at any former Examination. Three years ago he was awarded one of the Exhibitions conferred by the Board of Education, and last year gave proof of steady industry, as well as of great natural ability, by attaining the third place among the competitors for the Exhibitions of the Council. If he perseveres, there is every reason to hope that the highest honor which our System of Education provides,—the Tasmanian Scholarship,—succeeded by distinction at a British University, will be attained by him hereafter. We are of opinion that his career already reflects honor on the schools in which he has been trained.

4. The Twelfth Examination for the Degree of Associate of Arts was held in Degree of September, 1871; M. H. Irving, Esq., M.A., Head Master of Wesley College, Associate of Arts, Gazette Melbourne, being Examiner in all the subjects except Drawing, which was confided to Notice, 26 Henry Hunter, Esq. Thirteen Candidates presented themselves, all of whom passed Sept., 1871. the preliminary Examination, and eleven succeeded in obtaining the Degree, eight being placed in the First Class, two in the Second Class, and one in the Third Class.

To the Senior Associate, George Wilson Waterhouse, in addition to the Council's Gold Medal, were awarded the First Prize of Books of the value of £10 for Mathematics, Prize of Books of the value of £7 10s. for Latin, Second Prize of Books of the value of £5 each for English, Greek, and French. To Charles Caleb Williamson, placed in the First Class, were awarded the Council's First Prize of Books of the value of £10 each for English and French, and Prize of Books of the value of £7 10s. for Latin. To Frederick Scott Aldred, placed in the First Class, was awarded the Council's First Prize of Books of the value of £10 for Greek; and to Charles William Butler, who was also placed in the First Class, were awarded the Council's First Prize of Books of the value of £5 for Natural Philosophy, and a Second Prize of Books of the value of £5 for Mathematics.

#### The Examiner in closing his Report observes:-

On adding together the marks obtained in the several subjects, it appeared that of the thirteen Candidates two had failed to obtain the Degree; that one had reached the standard for the Third Class, two that of the Second, and that no less than eight had got beyond the number of marks required for a First Class; and accordingly on the evening of Monday, 11th September, the following Class List was published:—

From the foregoing Table it will be seen-

1st. That the average of First Classes, 8 out of 11, or 73 per cent., is far greater than the average hitherto obtained, 32 out of 73, about 44 per cent.

2nd. That the general average of marks obtained by the Candidates who passed—viz. 2430—exceeds that of previous years by 345. And

3rd. That the total, 3303, obtained by George Wilson Waterhouse, the Senior Associate, but junior Candidate of the year, exceeds the average of all past Senior Associates by upwards of 650 marks, and is slightly above the number attained by Hogg in 1864, hitherto supposed unapproachable.

It is gratifying to note that of the eight First Classes of the present year no fewer than 6 have attained the standard which the Council has fixed for 1872.

That so many should have done so well, proves that Teachers and Pupils have alike been doing their best to obtain the honors and the prizes which the Council's Scheme of Examination holds forth, that the experience of past years has not been forgotten, and that the warnings and fault-findings which have so often been seen in the Examiners' Reports have not been fruitless.

Tasmanian 5. The Examination for the Tasmanian Scholarships in September last was conscholarships ducted by M. H. Irving, Esquire, M. A. Three Candidates presented themselves.

One—John William Henry Geiss, A.A. 1869—reached the standard prescribed by the Gazette Notice; 26 Sept., 1871. University.

The Examiner, in his Report, observes:-

One only of the three Candidates has satisfied the conditions prescribed by the Council, having obtained in all 2164 marks, of which 1122 were gained in Classics.

Another Candidate, whose papers bear the motto "Arcturus," is little short of him in number of marks, but has just failed to attain the minimum fixed both in Classics and in Mathematics, having obtained in the former 865 out of 900 required, and in the latter 718 out of the necessary 750.

6. On the recommendation of the Examiner, M. H. Irving, Esq., M.A., a prize of Composition. Books of the value of £5 for Latin verse composition was, for the second time, awarded Gazette to John William-Henry Geiss, A.A. 1869, and Tasmanian Scholar of 1871.

7. The first Examination for the biennial Scholarship of £100 per annum for three Gilchrist years, offered by the Trustees of the Gilchrist Educational Trust to the youth of this Colony, was held in August last, and conducted under the supervision of the Council in accordance with the regulations laid down by the Home Authorities. Three Candidates presented themselves, and the papers worked by them were forwarded under seal to the authorities in England through Your Excellency. The following communication, notifying that Mr. Edwin Hughes, A.A. 1868, had been awarded the Scholarship, was forwarded to the Council:-

University of London, Burlington Gardens, 12th December, 1871.

WITH reference to the Matriculation Examination recently held in connection with this University under the direction of the Colonial Authorities in Tasmania, I have the honor to inform you that of the three Candidates who presented themselves at that Examination, one (Mr. Edwin Hughes, of the High School, Hobart Town,) has passed; and as he has been placed next to the fifteenth Candidate in the original Honors List, the Gilchrist Scholarship will be awarded to him. The other two Candidates (Nos. 640 and 642), though fairly proficient in other subjects, are reported by the Examiners as having failed in Natural Philosophy only.

8. We have much pleasure in stating that arrangements have been concluded with Matriculation the Senate of the University of Melbourne for permitting Local Examinations to be held Melbourne Melbourne in Hobart Town for Matriculation of Students at the above University.

The first Examination was held on the 14th November last, when two Candidates presented themselves.

The Registrar of the University reported that the Candidates Charles Mayne Maxwell, A.A., 1871, and Edward Pitfield, A.A., 1867, passed the Matriculation Examination, and transmitted Certificates to that effect to the Candidates through the Council.

9. During the last Session of Parliament an Act was passed amending the Tasmanian Female Council of Education and Scholarship Act so as to extend its operations (except as relates a Scholarship) to Hamala Candidates.

55 Vict. No. 16. to the Tasmanian Scholarship) to Female Candidates.

In accordance with the powers given us by that Act we framed the following Regulations for the Examination of Female Candidates, which have been approved by the Governor in Council.

Gazette Notice, 2 April, 1872.

#### REGULATIONS.

- 1st. An Examination shall be held annually, similar in its general character to the one appointed for the Degree of Associate of Arts.
- 2nd. The successful Candidates shall be placed in three Classes, each Class being arranged alphabetically.
- 3rd. They shall also be arranged in two Divisions in each subject. Those who pass with credit, in the first Division; those who simply pass, in the second.
- 4th. The subjects of Examination shall be divided into two Divisions.

- 5th. Candidates must pass in each of the subjects in List 1, and one of those in List 2.
- 6th. Candidates shall be held to pass with *credit* who attain a Standard of Marks to be from time to time fixed upon by the Council.

Latin Prize Essay. Gazette Notice, 7 May, 1872.

- 10. Under the provisions of the 32nd Section of the Tasmanian Council of Education and Scholarship Act we have accepted from a private person the offer of a Prize of Books of the value of £5 5s. to be awarded for the best Latin Essay on the following subject:—
  - " Quantum adjumenti literarum studium ad rempublicam administrandam afferat."

Tasmanian Scholars. 11. We have pleasure in recording that Mr. George Frederick Archer, who gained the Tasmanian Scholarship in 1867, was admitted to the Degree of B.A., University of Cambridge, in January last, and that his name appears in the Classical Honor List of the year.

We received with much regret the intelligence of the death of Mr. Samuel Clayton Robinson, Tasmanian Scholar of 1869, which took place at Edinburgh on the 2nd December, 1871, in the midst of a very promising University career.

Financial Statement. 12. We submit a Statement of the Disbursements of the Council between the 1st January and the 31st December, 1871, the termination of the financial year; together with a Supplementary Statement of Payments between the 1st January and the 30th April, 1872. The total expenditure under every head for the year 1871 is shown to have amounted to £1115 0s. 9d., being £250 12s. 7d. less than the sum voted by Parliament.
