# MUNICIPAL POLICE:

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Secretary, and ordered by the House to be printed, September 30, 1879.



Office of Inspector of Police, 10th September, 1879.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward my Annual Report on the Police of the Municipalities, for the information of His Excellency the Governor.

The general state of efficiency does not suffer by comparison with former years.

Crime has increased to a considerable extent during the year ending 30th June, 1879. Fluctuations in the number of offences from year to year are not always to be easily accounted for. There have been variations in the value of labour. The high wages occasioned by the demands of the mining districts have not been maintained. A period of great prosperity to the labourer is being followed by one of depression and difficulty. To this fact, taken in conjunction with the unsettled habits engendered by roaming about in search of work, may be partially attributed the increase in offences which has marked the period referred to.

As anticipated in my last Report, a greater sense of the importance of maintaining a sufficient Force has been exhibited in several Municipalities. The increased expense, however, is borne by the General Revenue. The Rate of Nine Pence in the Pound is insufficient for the support of the Police, Municipal or Territorial. I am of opinion that a uniform rate should be levied. At present it is a delusion to suppose that each Municipality maintains its own Police. If it were really so, great economy would prevail, even to the danger of efficiency. The moment the cost reaches Nine Pence in the Pound, further expense becomes general, not local; and one encouragement to economy is removed. Although the leaning towards greater liberality is apparent, I have not yet had to complain of extravagance in any important instance.

Opinions have differed as to what matters may be legitimately charged to Police Account. To remove some doubts on the point I obtained an authoritative decision as to the meaning of the term "Cost of the Police" in the Resolutions of Parliament, Session 1867. In accordance with the instructions then received, I have restricted the charges to those items bearing directly upon the pay and maintenance of the Force.

The variation in amount of pay received by the Police in different Municipalities is not regulated by any intelligible standard: in some instances it is below, and in others above, the Territorial limits.

If I were able to say that I considered the Territorial pay to be ample, I could check any excess upon the amounts received by the Government Police being disbursed from Public Revenue to the Local Police of similar rank.

I have sometimes noticed what appeared to be a disposition to underrate the independence and authority of the Superintendents. This course, I need scarcely say, is calculated to impair discipline. The Superintendent should have the immediate government and superintendence of the Constables under his charge. Fit officers to be entrusted with this power should be selected; and they should be permitted to discharge their duties without undue interference.

The Force of this Municipality, as I pointed out last year, had undergone reduction from the strength of former years. It has now been increased by the appointment of six additional Constables, and I trust arrangements will be made for removing grounds for the complaints which had become frequent.

A disturbance of an exciting character occurred during the year. The Municipal Force was not sufficiently prepared to preserve order unassisted.

Seven Constables had resigned, and one had died during the year. Six publicans were proceeded against under the Licensing Act, and four of them fined.
