

LAUNCESTON GENERAL HOSPITAL.

ANNUAL REPORT for 1877.

26th March, 1878.

Sir

I HAVE the honor to submit the Report of the Launceston General Hospital for 1877.

The proceedings of the past year have been uneventful, and the Institution working satisfactorily, but kitchen accommodation has been severely felt. Some very much needed repairs have been effected, and the whole of the interior of the building is being thoroughly cleansed and whitewashed, prison labour being made available for the purpose.

The extensive grounds around the Establishment have been levelled and laid out, shrubs being planted and grass sown, and this, when completed, will add considerably to the appearance of the building from without, prison labour having also been utilised for this purpose.

The number of admissions exceeded that of the preceding year, the daily average, 57, being somewhat greater, while the total expenditure was considerably less, and the daily cost per head was 2d: less.

The number of Outdoor Patients, 798, is nearly the same as last year; and in reference to this Department I fear the charity is in many cases abused by persons who should be well able to pay for medical advice and medicine elsewhere, considering the facilities offered by Provident Clubs and the high rate of wages earned by the working classes; but every precaution is taken for the detection of abuse, and many glaring cases have been refused.

The receipts from Paying Patients is larger than last year, viz., £283 16s. 2d., and as far as practicable this class of Patients has been encouraged, by giving them a separate ward.

Of the Patients admitted, 457, 346 were males and 111 females, the average daily number in Hospital being 57.

There had remained at the close of the previous year 51 Patients, so that the total number treated in 1877 was 508; and of these 389 were discharged, cured or relieved, 73 died, and 46 remained under treatment.

The majority of those who died were admitted in a hopeless state, being very old men; and of the 73 deaths, the average age was 53 years.

Of the Patients admitted, 100 were Self-supporting, 2 were wholly or in part chargeable to Imperial Funds, and 406 were Colonial Paupers.
