

REPORT FOR 1877.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Treasurer, and ordered by the House to be printed, July 16, 1878.



### PENAL ESTABLISHMENT, LAUNCESTON.

SIR,

I have the honor to forward herewith the Annual Report and Returns for this Establishment for the year 1877.

Officers.—One Warder was fined for misconduct; one was discharged for allowing a Prisoner fully committed for trial to escape; one Constable resigned.

Prisoners.—During the year one Prisoner escaped from the Gaol and one from the Male House of Correction: both were recaptured by the Police. The number of Prisoners tried before the Magistrates during the year was five: two for absconding, and three for breaches of prison discipline.

Visitors.—I annex copies of minutes recorded by the Visiting Justices and various strangers who have visited the Establishment during the year.
