

Presented by Mr. Sherwin; and ordered by the House to be printed, 30 July, 1863.



To the Honorable the House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the undersigned Inhabitants of Launceston and its Vicinity.

HUMBLY SHOWETH:

That they view with feelings of deep regret the attempt made to increase the public burdens by a Stamp Tax, which they regard not only as uncalled for, impolitic, and unjust, but fraught with evils inherent in and inseparable from it.

That your Memorialists are convinced that the Revenue derivable from the present Tariff and other sources will be fully adequate for the estimated Expenditure of the Government; and for this reason, in addition to others already submitted in Petitions now before your Honorable House, they earnestly protest against the introduction of Stamp Duties, and humbly pray that your Honorable House will not allow such a system of Duties to become Law.
