

Sir,

As the three years for which, under authority of the Governor in Council, you were appointed the Agent-General for Tasmania in England, expire at the end of October next, the time has arrived to consider the arrangements which will be necessary to provide for the future control of your Department.

The position of Agent-General is one of such importance that the Government do not propose to take any definite step without consulting Parliament, which, it may be anticipated, will be sitting when the question must be decided.

At the same time, I shall be glad to be informed whether you are desirous of having your term of office extended for another three years, a course which I have much pleasure in stating would afford Ministers an opportunity, of which they will be glad to avail themselves, of giving practical expression to the high estimation with which they regard the energetic and very efficient manner in which on all occasions you endeavour to promote the welfare of the Colony, and the dignity and zeal which guide your actions as their representative.
