

Monhend, Burgess, 17th December, 1859.

SIR, AGREEABLY to previously expressed expectation, I have the honor to transmit to Your Excellency, through the Honorable the Colonial Secretary, original Petitions from 123 duly qualified resident proprietors and occupiers of property within the District limits, to cause the Police District of Port Sorell to be declared a Rural Municipality.

In reference to the numerical expression of opinion favourable to District Municipality, I have the honor to remark, that the exceedingly defective state of the Property Valuation Roll of 1858, under which the signatures, now respectfully submitted for Your Excellency's perusal, were obtained, has greatly diminished its force; and that had it been deemed desirable to have suppressed the object until the new Valuation Roll had been constructed, I am led to believe additional signatures to the extent of 70 or 75 would have been tendered.

As it is, I have felt it my duty to withhold the *rates* of several Electors in the collective documents, who, although they will severally become duly qualified in the valuation now in course of preparation, have not yet been submitted to a Sessional Bench of Magistrates for revision.

I am further called upon to explain, that several of the signatures in the Petition numbered one were obtained by me as far back as December, 1858, and then limiting the proposed Municipality to the *Road* District, instead of the Police District, which would have the effect of leaving a few miles of the Port Sorell *Police* District outside to Emu Bay.

Conceiving this to present a difficulty to Her Majesty's Government connected with Police matters, united to a strong desire on the part of the residents west of the Leven River to be

I AM not in receipt of any further information on the subject of the Municipal Petition, although, as you observe, it has been submitted to the consideration of the Executive Council beyond the period required by the Act.

I had, however, previously apprised the Executive that the Counter-Petition contained unauthorised names, as well as names of persons not rated at twenty pounds, as required by the same Act.

As regards the concluding paragraph of your note, I have not taken, nor shall I take, a single step to procure the office of "*Warden*;" but after the active part I have undisguisedly taken, in the event of a Municipality, should I be proposed and elected to the office of either Councillor or Warden, I will not shrink from an effort to effect that economy I believe to be the duty of a Local Council, even though it should involve a "*Wardenship with a £150 salary*!" which, without itinerating the duty, I think as much as a Rural Municipality could sanction.

The latter office could only suit a person without occupation, and of private income equal to domestic requirements, (in moderation) without the salary; and it is only under those circumstances I would accept either a Police Magistracy or a Wardenship on the terms, for either of which I am not without friends who deem me qualified.

Sir,

In reference to your letter of the 4th instant, to which I would not reply until to-day, after conferring with those with whom I have hitherto co-operated on the subject of a Rural Municipality for the Police District of Port Sorell.

I am informed that, "in consequence of the conflicting representations of the views of the Ratepayers who have petitioned for, as well as those who are against, the District being created a Rural Municipality, His Excellency is at a loss to conclude whether he would be responding to the matured opinions of a majority."

I am instructed to convey to His Excellency in Council the deep feeling of regret of the original Petitioners in favour of self-government, that His Excellency in Council should attach to a minority the consideration which by the Municipal Act is due only to a majority,—a course they cannot but view as a departure from a well-defined rule of action.

Your letter further informs me, that "the Government will await a representation which shall convey to it the genuine and decisive opinions of the Ratepayers at the present time."

I am directed to remark, that the two months allowed for opposition afforded ample time for canvas and expression of any adverse opinions, limited as, it may be seen, that opposition was to a small portion only of the extreme Eastern boundary of the District, where two gentlemen held considerable influence over the outward actions of a certain number of the Ratepayers; and that the decision of the Government arrives when those originally adverse had, in the unusual delay of five months, subsided into a cordial desire for co-operation in a measure they had looked upon as already decided by the 4th section of the Act,—a decision well calculated to re-open the disunion which recently characterised the District.

It is no longer a problem on the one hand that the counter Petition embodied many defective points, and would not bear the test of a scrutiny; several signatures were ingenuine; more deficient in the twenty pound qualification; and others being unauthorised, to wit— B. W. Thomas, and others whose signatures will now appear in a supplementary Petition of new names, which will forthwith be forwarded.

On the other hand it is contended, that the original Petition not only embodies a majority of the influential and respectable Ratepayers, but is genuine, and all save four qualified to sign.
