

Audit Office, 19th July, 1862.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to return herewith your Comparative Statements of Expenditure under the General and Local Estimates, respectively, for the year 1861; which have been carefully examined, and compared and reconciled with the Books of this Department.

- 1. These Accounts are so fully detailed that, for the most part, the entries sufficiently explain the nature of the expenditure; but there are a few items included in them which seem to call for some observations from me,—the first to be noticed being the sum of £334 charged against Contingencies for the Service of Outports in the Customs' Department. In this expenditure is comprised the salary of £280 received by Mr. Friend, the Landing Waiter at Port Frederick; which office, having now existed for three years, may be considered as an established situation, and should therefore I submit, be shown separately upon the Estimates as a "Salary," and not be charged as hitherto against the vote for Contingencies. This course is adopted with the inferior appointment of Tide Waiter at £100, for the same Port; and the omission of the Landing Waiter at £280 suggests, consequently, an inadvertence in compiling the Estimates.
- 2. In the Department of Public Works the expenditure is not shown, nor is any estimate given of the sums paid for local supervision on the erection of Buildings, or of the cost of drawing Plans and Specifications, and other Clerical duty performed in the Public Works' Office in connection therewith: all such charges being distributed amongst the disbursements under the several Works and Buildings executed or erected during the year, and the expenditure upon which is only exhibited in gross sums, no details being given in the published accounts. It appears to me that there is a disadvantage in this arrangement, as precluding Parliament from ascertaining as in other cases, the total expense of the Department, whilst the only convenience resulting from it is to show a closer approximation to the exact cost of any Work or Building, by apportioning to it arbitrarily a part of this or that person's salary whose time may have been occasionally occupied in connection with the work. I do not think this attempt at exactness, which cannot be perfect, counterbalances the disadvantage I have indicated; and I therefore respectfully suggest an alteration in the present mode of dealing with this matter, which might be readily effected by adding to the Estimate of the Fixed Establishment of Public Works for next year, such a sum under the term "Temporary and Provisional," as may be deemed sufficient to cover the Salaries for that period: the expenditure of which could then be separately shown in the annual accounts.
- 3. An error has crept into the Education Department, in consequence of the Storekeeper, in his Account of Issues for 1861, having charged against the Fixed Establishment the sum of £212 6s. 5d. for School Books Materials and Stationery supplied in that year, instead of entering the amount as he ought to have done, to the debit of the Vote for "Education" under General Service in the Local Estimate: the effect being to make the Department itself erroneously appear in excess of the Estimate, whilst the Local Expenditure is comparatively reduced, and indeed exhibits sufficient balance of its Vote unexpended to cover the amount.
- 4. Under the head of Public Buildings, exclusive of the establishment, will be found four items amounting together to £10,294 7s. 9d., which have been expended without any Vote of Parliament; and there are, of course, many other amounts throughout the Accounts which are either in excess of the Estimate, or represent expenses incurred without the object having been sanctioned by any Appropriation Act. Under the present mode of taking Supplementary Votes of Parliament long after the expenditure has been disbursed, these numerous excesses are quite unavoidable; and it appears to me that such an arrangement is a grave defect in our financial system, as it does not afford the opportunity to the Legislature of dissenting from any unestimated outlay until the amount is actually expended; and, it may be, that the public money has been spent for a full twelvementh before Parliament becomes officially cognizant of the fact. I therefore respectfully submit for your consideration that this, to my mind, unsatisfactory mode of dealing with excesses over the Estimates should be altered, and that the system which obtained prior to the introduction of Responsible Government should at once be reverted to. The course I am now

recommending is, that the Supplementary Estimates for any year should be submitted to Parliament during the currency of such year; and for example, that as regards the present year, all excesses already ascertained, as well as all that can be anticipated by careful Estimates from the Head of each Department, should now be embodied into Supplementary Estimates, and the Votes taken during this Session. The very word "Estimate" implies an anticipated expenditure, and not an expense which has been actually incurred and settled. The Supplementary Appropriation Act too, passed annually, will on perusal be found to be a distinct contradiction in terms, for it professes to authorise the Treasurer to pay away certain moneys, which in reality he had done long before the Bill passed. These points seem to support my position in the matter, which I trust will receive favorable consideration.

- 5. The Comparative Statements are properly confined to those services and charges which appear on the Estimates, or to such other disbursements as are more immediately allied to the class of expenditure so provided for; as distinguished from the Loans' Bills, Advances, Open Accounts, and other special transactions. These are, however, all shown in the general Cash Account of the year; but are, for the most part, only dealt with in round sums. It may not, perhaps, be out of place for me to offer a few remarks and suggestions on some of the items referred to: the first in magnitude being the Loans' Bills, under which were expended in 1861 from General Revenue, between Twenty-four and Twenty-five Thousand Pounds. This expenditure is comprised in 13 entries, varying in amount from £5,000 downwards; and it appears to me that the information afforded in the Accounts is very inadequate to the extent of the disbursements. Under the Fixed Establishment the most minute details are furnished, where in fact there is but little room for any extravagance; whilst in these wholesale transactions, the particulars given are as limited as they can be. I submit therefore to your consideration that separate Statements of Expenditure under the Loans' Bills should be prepared, exhibiting the various heads of expense, clas-ified in such convenient form as the nature of the case may admit of; and if the Statements could be accompanied by a brief Report upon each work from the pen of the Director of Public Works, they would be I think satisfactory documents to lay before Parliament. At least, they would enable Honorable Members to form an opinion as to the judgment displayed upon the manner in, or the object on, which the money had been laid out, and the advantages accruing to the Public from the outlay.
- 6. The transactions with the Immigration Commissioners are large, but they are restricted as far as the Treasury is concerned, to simple exchanges of money without any cognizance of its final application; the Treasury, in fact, being merely bankers in this business. Accounts in detail, supported by Vouchers are however rendered by the Secretary from time to time to this office, showing the Receipts and Expenditure in the Colony; but I have not yet received any Accounts of the Agency in London, though long since applied for. I am now informed, by the Secretary to the Commissioners, that those Accounts are in course of preparation, and that I may expect shortly to have them furnished. If on examination they appear to call for any particular observations from me, I will address you in a separate Report upon the subject.
- 7. The Amount remitted to the Agent-General in London during 1861 was considerable,—amounting indeed to £11,351 18s. 1d. I therefore submit to you, Sir, whether it would not be desirable to lay before Parliament either an Abstract or Copy of the Agents' Accounts-Current for the year.

I am not aware of anything further that I need remark upon in connection with this portion of the Public Accounts, reserving myself for a separate Report upon the Land Fund; but I think it due to your Accountant, before closing this Letter, to offer my testimony to the very creditable manner in which the Books of your Department are kept.

MINUTE.

I AGREE with the Auditor in the principles he has laid down in paragraph 4; but would observe that the practice which he animadverts on existed prior to my accession to Office (25th April, 1857), the first Estimates I had to submit to Parliament having been Supplementary Estimates of Expenditure in 1856 and preceding years, amounting to £61,916 11s. 2d., including no less a sum than £24,329 10s. 11d. on Works and Buildings, Roads and Streets.



STR.

In returning your detailed Statement of Expenditure from the Land Fund for the year 1861, including arrears paid up to 31st March last, and exhibiting a minute comparison with the various items voted by Parliament upon the Estimates for that year, I have the honor to offer a few remarks for your consideration, and for the information of Parliament, agreeably to the 22nd Section of the Audit Act.

1. Under the head of Survey Department will be found a large excess upon "Surveys of Land by Contract,"—being in fact more than 50 per cent. over the original Estimate of £7,000.

I think that where such an excess occurs upon so large a sum, a brief explanation from the Head of the Department, who may be deemed responsible, to show why it was not anticipated and provided for, should accompany the Annual Accounts when laid upon the Table of the House of Assembly.

I take occasion here to observe that this item of Expenditure does not appear to me properly to belong to the "Contingencies" of the *Fixed* Establishment, the expense of which is thereby unduly augmented, tending to mislead persons who are not acquainted with the details. I would therefore recommend that this charge be in future placed under a distinct head, exclusive of the Establishment.

2. There is also another entry under this Department which I consider still more out of place; namely,—"the Expense of Surveying Guano Islands in the Straits," £947 14s. 2d. This Expenditure being of a special character, and not included in the authorised Estimates, more particularly requires a prominent position in the Accounts.

In my routine of duty, I addressed a Query to you upon a portion of this outlay, under date 7th November, 1861,—to which however, I have not been favored with any answer. (No. 366.)

I therein suggested that the heading of the Account was not appropriate to the object, adding, that I considered the Expenditure should form a separate item in the Public Accounts, and be provided for on a Supplementary Estimate. I also applied for the authority of the Governor in Council to sanction the outlay upon the Survey in question, observing that it had then considerably exceeded the Surveyor-General's original calculation of the anticipated cost, (£500) but no such authority has yet reached me; and I avail myself of this circumstance to record, with all deference to the Executive Powers and after due reflection, my opinion that in every case where the Vote is exceeded, the Auditor should be furnished, not merely with the written approval of a Minister, but with the autograph authority of the Governor in Council; but especially should this be the case when the expense incurred is of a nature not contemplated by any Act, Vote, or Resolution of the Legislature; by affinity to which the principle of an Expenditure, though not absolutely provided for, may be considered as having, by implication, received the indirect sanction of Parliament.

I beg further to say, that I consider it of importance that the authority indicated should, whenever possible, either precede or accompany the *very first Account*, however small, of any proposed outlay, and be supported by a careful estimate of the whole anticipated Expenditure.

Such documents would be satisfactory to the Auditor, as bearing the nearest approach to an Estimate sanctioned by Act of Parliament.

3. The amount appropriated in aid of Road Districts for the year 1861 was £9,533 13s. 10d. The details of this sum are not shown, nor do I think it desirable, especially in this instance, to encumber the Comparative Statement with over many particulars, which would make the document itself too voluminous and tedious, thereby defeating the object of having the Accounts so compiled as to render them clear, simple, and sufficiently concise for convenient reference by Honorable Members; but I, nevertheless, would beg to recommend that in this and kindred cases separate Statements, giving full details, should be attached as Appendices to the main Account, for the information of those gentlemen who may desire to investigate them.

- 4. On the Vote for the Main Line of Road, the Expenditure was £12,859 14s. 11d. The suggestion offered upon the preceding entry applies equally, and indeed with more force, to this expense, which might be distributed in detail under the various heads of Contract, Materials, Labor, Salaries, &c., so that Parliament may be acquainted, not merely with the total amount disbursed, but with the manner in which this considerable sum has been appropriated. In this case too, I think a brief Minute by the Director of Public Works of what has been effected in the way of repairing and improving the Main Line of Road, with its bridges and culverts, should accompany the detailed. Accounts.
- 5. Under the same division of Service appears the sum of £2,013 9s. 9d., expended on the foundation of the proposed Survey Office, which although shown as an excess over the Estimates, may be considered to have received the sanction of both Houses of Parliament, by Resolution No. 15 of 22 September, 1859. This is an illustration of my meaning in a former paragraph, when I alluded to the principle of an Expenditure having been indirectly approved by Parliament; and the same remark applies, indeed, to every excess over an actual Vote; from which Vote it may fairly be inferred that, in granting the first Supply, Parliament has affirmed the principle.
- 6. Interest on Debentures.—The last item under this head shows an excess of £1,923, because provision was not made for the Interest falling due under the Act 23 Vict., No. 34, in the published Estimates.
- It is, I think, almost a question whether in this instance, the Expenditure might not have been credited with an equal sum under the Act quoted, upon the authority of which the Debentures were sold, and the public became liable for the Interest that has been paid. But I only mention this view incidentally, for on the whole, I incline to the opinion that wherever a direct Vote has not sanctioned an expenditure, it is safer and better that the outlay should be shown as an *Excess*, and be provided for on a Supplementary Estimate.
- 7. The next item to which I solicit attention is the sum of £2,000, expended for the purpose of displaying Tasmanian products at the Grand Inter-national Exhibition recently opened in London. There was no provision made by Parliament for this expense in 1861, though the sum of £1,000 was granted towards the same object by the Appropriation Act, 25 Vict. No. 28, for the Service of 1862. This grant has however been absorbed during the present year, together with £200 more, making in all an expenditure of £3,200 upon this important undertaking. The disbursement of this large sum of money was entrusted to certain gentlemen appointed to be Commissioners for managing the business, and who elected one of their body to be the Chairman, under whom was employed a paid Secretary, to carry out the details. To these Officers of the Commission pecuniary advances were made from time to time, as they demanded means; with the understanding that the usual detailed Accounts would be rendered by them of the distribution of the moneys so advanced. Some Lists of Payments were accordingly furnished, but they were not of such a nature as to pass audit, without the requisite supporting Vouchers. I addressed, in the course of duty, two or three Queries and Observations to you, calling for proper Accounts and Vouchers; the last of which queries I forward herewith, bearing a reply dated 20 February last, (No. 394) from the Honorable Colonial Sceretary (with whom, as Minister, the Chairman corresponded), to the effect that the Secretary would not be in a position to comply with the Auditor's request until the business of the Commission was finally closed, which it was understood would be very shortly; but I beg to state that, up to the present moment, after, a lapse of Five Months, the required Accounts and Vouchers have not yet reached me.

I need hardly point out to you, who are aware of it, but it is proper that Parliament should also know, how extremely inconvenient it is to my Department to have Accounts kept open for so long a period; the mere duty of looking up unsettled transactions every now and then occupies much time, and where an Office like mine is working with a reduced staff as compared with former years, it becomes I submit, incumbent upon every person having dealings with the Public Funds to assist, by promptitude in complying with the just and legal requirements of the Department, rather than to retard its operations by indifference to the proper and reasonable requests which my duty calls upon me to make.

I do not wish it to be understood that I apply these remarks particularly to the case under notice, for it may be that the gentlemen alluded to have good reasons, which they have not thought necessary to explain, for further delay in furnishing proper. Vouchers, as called for in my Queries; but the circumstance presents a convenient opportunity, of which I avail myself, to solicit through you the attention of Parliament to a suggestion I venture to offer, that, when its sanction is granted to the outlay of Public Money upon any special object of a nature likely to be entrusted to an honorary body of gentlemen for appropriation and disbursement, a condition should be appended to the Grant, to the effect that the due requirements of "The Audit Act," and General Regulations affecting the Receipts and Expenditure of Public Money, shall be as strictly complied with as in any ordinary case.

8. The next prominent item which calls for any notice from me is the sum of £4,036 1s. 2d. expended under the head of "Maria Island," for purchase of stock and crops, supervision and labor.

This amount should, I submit, be shown in a detailed Account of Distribution, under appropriate heads, as an Appendix to the Comparative Statement; and it might probably be an improvement, in this particular instance, to give in the form of an Account Current all the transactions both of Receipts and Expenditure, so as to show at once to Parliament the result of the operation; with the addition of such explanatory notes and information as may be appropriate to the occasion.

On this subject, I take the liberty to refer to paragraph 4 of my letter of the 19th instant, on the General Expenditure, respecting the mode of dealing with Supplementary Estimates, as I think the observations and suggestions therein contained apply with much force to this case, in which the Expenditure was determined on by the Executive so early in 1861 as the month of February, whereas the Session of Parliament was not closed until the end of January, 1862, thereby affording ample time to have obtained Legislative sanction to the transaction, by a Supplementary Vote within the year, if the existing practice had not been opposed to such a course.

Having disposed of the Comparative Statement, I beg permission now to refer briefly to the Land Fund Cash Account for the year 1861, and to reiterate the suggestion I offered on the General Revenue, to the effect that detailed Accounts should be submitted to Parliament of the Expenditure under each of the Loans' Bills.

- 9. The principal Expenditure from the Land Fund was under the 24 Vict. No. 39, which exhibits the sum of £5,619 19s. 11d., spent in the year 1861 upon Roads to open up Crown Lands; and, in addition to this, the further amount of £4,173 12s. 11d. has been issued from the Treasury on the same account, during the half-year ended 30th ultimo. The entire management of this business, and the consequent control of the funds, have been delegated to a Board consisting chiefly of Public Officers. A greater latitude is enjoyed by this Board, in regard to the disposal of its funds, than would be allowed to any Head of Department in the ordinary course of things. At the same time, I may observe, that sufficient Vouchers are generally produced before payment is made from the Colonial Treasury, although the expense may have been previously incurred upon the responsibility of the Board; and therefore, to a great extent, the usual requirements of the Audit Office are satisfactorily complied with. But, seeing that the appropriation of the funds entrusted to the Board was conducted without the Governor's preliminary decision upon the expediency of any proposed outlay, it appears to me that the case requires something more than the mere details of Account, which I have suggested generally for the Loans' Bills; and I therefore respectfully submit, that a Minute or condensed Report from the Chairman, or the Surveyor-General as an active Member of the Board, should accompany the Account, to explain the objects of the various sums expended,—the localities,—and the manner of conducting the operations,—together with such other information as may tend to show the advantages of the Expenditure on each Road or Work, and the Board's reasons for undertaking it.
- 10. The only payment which I have to notice, as having been made from the Treasury in the year 1861 upon an imperfect Voucher, was the sum of £102 12s. on Account No. 56 of October, for Survey Fees claimed by Mr. Alfred Arthur Hull; and its imperfection consisted in the want of a Certificate by the Surveyor-General, who declined for reasons stated by him in a voluminous correspondence, to attach the usual Certificate to that Account,—which however, I may add, received upon consideration the sanction of the Government, and was accordingly paid.
