SECOND READING SPEECH

THE HON GRAEME STURGES, MINISTER FOR INFRASTRUCTURE

Traffic Amendment (Road Rules Consequential Amendments) Bill 2009

Mr Speaker,

I move that the Bill now be read a second time.

I am pleased to present to the House today the *Traffic Amendment* (Road Rules Consequential Amendments) Bill 2009.

The Bill is administrative in nature as its purpose is to consequentially amend references to the *Traffic* (*Road Rules*) *Regulations 1999* in the *Local Government* (*Highways*) *Act 1982*, *Motor Accidents* (*Liabilities and Compensation*) *Act 1973* and *Taxi and Luxury Hire Car Industries Act 2008*.

Section 31A of the *Traffic Act 1925* currently provides that the Governor may make regulations prescribing rules on nationally consistent road traffic matters. The rules that provide for traffic matters are currently contained in the *Traffic* (*Road Rules*) *Regulations 1999*.

On commencement, the *Traffic Amendment Act 2009* which was passed by Parliament earlier this year to facilitate the remaking of the *Road*

Rules will change the statutory basis by which the Road Rules are made. The amended section 31A provides that the Governor may make rules on road traffic matters As such, the Road Rules will in future be contained within rules rather than regulations.

A review of the Tasmanian Legislation database has shown that three Acts - the Local Government (Highways) Act 1982, Motor Accidents (Liabilities and Compensation) Act 1973 and Taxi and Luxury Hire Car Industries Act 2008 - refer to the soon to be repealed Traffic (Road Rules) Regulations 1999 in full rather than by reference to its short title Road Rules.

It is therefore proposed to replace references to the *Traffic (Road Rules) Regulations 1999* in the aforementioned Acts with a reference to *Road Rules*, by its short title. By changing the references these Acts will correctly refer to the *Traffic (Road Rules) Regulations 1999* as they currently stand and will also correctly refer to the *Road Rules 2009* when they come into place upon the commencement of the *Traffic Amendment Act 2009*.

The Acts Interpretation Act does not allow existing references to the Traffic (Road Rules) Regulations 1999 to be "saved" because the statutory basis of the new Road Rules has changed. Mr Speaker the amendments under this Bill while highly technical in nature are necessary to ensure the correct application of the legislative provisions concerned and I therefore commend the Bill to the House.
