Notices of Motion

TASMANIA

- 27 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that Anzac Day will be occurring on 25 April 2019, marking this year the 104th anniversary of the landings at Gallipoli in 1915.
 - (2) Notes that Tasmanians were among the first to land on the shores of Gallipoli on that first Anzac Day and have served in all branches of the Australian Defence Force since with courage and distinction.
 - (3) Further notes that other significant anniversaries will occur in 2019 including the 75th anniversaries of the D-Day Landings and the 80th anniversary of the start of the Second World War.
 - (4) Commends those brave men and women who have served or are currently serving our country on operations across the Globe.
 - (5) Further notes that Dawn Services, Main Services and parades will be held all over Tasmania this coming Anzac Day and thanks members of the RSL (Tasmania Branch) and other ex-service organisations who work tirelessly to honour those who served, particularly in Anzac Day commemorations.
 - (6) Encourages all Tasmanians to attend and pay tribute to the service and sacrifice of those who have served, lest we forget. (11 April 2019)

28 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the official opening of the North Esk Irrigation Scheme on 25 March 2019 by Federal Minister for Agriculture and Water the Hon David Littleproud MP and the Hodgman Liberal Government.
- (2) Notes that the \$30.4 million North Esk Scheme will assist the Hodgman Liberal Government in meeting its target of increasing the farm gate value of Tasmania's agricultural sector to \$10 billion a year by 2050.
- (3) Acknowledges that the Scheme:—
 - (*a*) has involved the construction of a 5,580 ML dam, 59.3km of pipeline and a pumping station;
 - (*b*) has been made possible by \$18.9 million in Federal funding, \$4.5 million from the Tasmanian Government and \$7 million from farmers; and
 - (c) can deliver 4,685 megalitres of water to 57 irrigators in the Evandale, Nile, White Hills and Relbia areas.
- (4) Further notes that access to this irrigation water will enable scope for high-value enterprises such wine grapes, dairy, cropping, horticulture and livestock finishing, plus, value-add existing enterprises and expand production.
- (5) Further notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government has committed \$70 million to advance Pipeline to Prosperity, which was recently been added to Infrastructure Australia's Infrastructure Priority List which—if fully implemented—will see almost \$500 million invested across the State into another 10 potential irrigation schemes,

creating thousands of jobs and return an estimated \$114 million each year to the agriculture sector, and the economy more broadly. (11 April 2019)

- 29 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that Precision Agriculture plays a vital role in contributing to the growth of the Tasmanian agriculture sector through better technology, improved knowledge and irrigation infrastructure, increased yields and the achievement of greater efficiencies.
 - (2) Records this is the fifth year of the annual Precision Agriculture Expo, conducted by the Tasmanian Agricultural Productivity Group in collaboration with the Tasmanian Institute of Agriculture and partners and this event highlighted new technologies and advancements designed to improve efficiencies in agricultural systems.
 - (3) Acknowledges advancements of precision agriculture has seen technology, machinery, transportation and logistics play a larger role in the supply chain resulting in new job opportunities.
 - (4) Further notes by encouraging innovation and investing in the agriculture sector, the Hodgman Liberal Government underpins its bold AgriFood Plan that aims to grow the farm gate value of the State's agricultural industry to \$10bn a year by 2050.
 - (5) Further notes the effective collaboration between private enterprise, primary producers, contractors and the Government will also help grow stronger and more resilient rural and regional communities.
 - (6) Recognises precision agriculture is changing the way the agricultural sector operates, resulting in increased job opportunities in technology, machinery and logistics and this Expo highlighted that through collaboration, education and innovation Tasmania can reach its full agricultural potential.
 - (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for supporting the delivery of this highly successful Expo with funding of \$60,000 over four years through the Strategic Industry Partnership Program. (30 April 2019)
- **30** The Minister for Racing to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Expresses its sincere condolences to the family and friends of Longford's Mick Burles, a renowned Tasmanian racehorse trainer.
 - (2) Recognises the contribution Mick Burles made as a respected member of the Tasmanian racing community.
 - (3) Notes the feats Mick Burles achieved with cult hero horse The Cleaner, a winner of 19 races and almost \$1.4 million in prize money.
 - (4) Further notes that Mick Burles and The Cleaner made history in 2014 when they became the first ever Tasmanian horse and trainer combination to compete in a Cox Plate. (30 April 2019)
- **31** The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government is open to considering changes to section 194K of the Evidence Act 2001 (Tas) to ensure it appropriately protects the rights of all victims of sexual assault.
 - (2) Further notes that, as is the case in any law reform, it is imperative that the right balance is struck between protecting all victims of sexual assault and the public interest in open justice.
 - (3) Further notes the immense courage of rape and sexual assault survivors to speak about their experience, and the Government's willingness to consider reforms that facilitate those that wish to be identified, to do so more readily.
 - (4) Recognises that some members of the community have expressed concerns that this provision does not currently strike the right balance, and therefore the Government looks forward to hearing the views of stakeholders and community members in response to the Government's recently released Discussion Paper. (30 April 2019)
- **32** The Minister for Environment to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Congratulates the many staff and volunteers of the Orange-bellied Parrot program for their tireless work this breeding season that has resulted in 81 captive born fledglings and 44 captive adult breed birds being released in 2019.

- (2) Notes that this Orange-bellied Parrot program is benefiting significantly from the increased funding that the Hodgman Liberal Government has provided, which is allowing a number of new breeding initiatives to be trialled.
- (3) Further notes that the \$2.5 million new purpose built captive breeding facility at Five Mile Beach, funded by the Hodgman Liberal Government, is nearing completion and has already increased captive breeding capacity by 50 per cent for the most recent season.
- (4) Further notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to doing what it can to help save the Orange-bellied Parrot, and ensure that we have a wild population of this endangered bird continue to breed at Melaleuca, in the heart of the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area. (30 April 2019)
- **33** Dr *Woodruff* to move—That the House:—
 - Acknowledges that the Hodgman Liberal Government has supported:-
 - (*a*) current stocking levels of salmon in Macquarie Harbour;
 - (b) expansion of fish farm operations into Okehampton Bay;
 - (c) enlivening of a decade old fish farm lease in Norfolk Bay;
 - (d) exploration of fish farm expansion off King Island; and
 - (e) large scale expansion of salmon farming into Storm Bay.
 - (2) Calls on the Labor Opposition, ahead of the Federal Election, to articulate their policy on, and support for, the aforementioned. (30 April 2019)
