Notices of Motion

206 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Aurora Energy continues to be a great supporter of the network of Neighbourhood Houses, through their Community Grants Program.
- (2) Further notes and congratulates Aurora Energy for their Community Grant initiative which offers eligible community-based organisations with up to \$5,000 towards a project or program that can demonstrate its support for vulnerable Tasmanians.
- (3) Acknowledges Aurora Energy's Community Grant support of the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House's 'Healthy and Happy' program.
- (4) Congratulates Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House for this unique program which provides the local community with education and practical advice on healthy eating to alleviate the common long-term health conditions relating to lifestyle diseases.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House for their 33 year dedicated service to the Fingal Valley in pursuit of their mission to build the community, support people and families and enhance participation choices. (17 October 2019)

207 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Tasmanian Manufacturing, Minerals and Energy Council (TMEC) has again stepped up and are leading the way on mental health and wellbeing in the workplace with their 2019 Better with Balance Trans-Tasmanian Challenge endurance event from 13 24 November 2019.
- (2) Acknowledges that all workplaces have a role to play in supporting the mental health and wellbeing of employees.
- (3) Further notes TMEC believe the Trans Tasmanian Challenge will help to raise awareness of the importance of work life balance and healthy lifestyles in Tasmania.
- (4) Further notes that the Tasmanian Government is supporting health and wellbeing through the 'Healthy Tasmania 5 Year Strategic Plan'. This plan focuses on improved lifestyle choices that can help reduce the burden of chronic conditions like diabetes.
- (5) Further acknowledges Diabetes Tasmania is the charity partner for the TMEC Better with Balance Challenge for 2019.
- (6) Further notes that the funds raised will assist in providing ongoing support for those living with diabetes to increase their resilience to live with a chronic disease and to increase diabetes empowerment, and promote awareness in the community about both the prevalence and impact of diabetes.
- (7) Joins the Government in wishing all participants fair winds and smooth going in their Trans Tasmania Challenge endurance events from Penguin to Cockle Creek during November 2019 and to thank all support crew for their efforts. (17 October 2019)

208 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the important contribution of the Break O'Day Woodcraft Guild and Men's Shed and the connections it provides the community.
- (2) Recognises that Tasmania's Men's Sheds provide a safe, supportive environment where men can form friendships, learn and share skills, seek support and advice regarding health and wellbeing issues and participate in projects that benefit the broader community.
- (3) Further acknowledge the support of the Hodgman Liberal Government to the Break O'Day Woodcraft Guild and Men's Shed with a \$4,482 grant under the Tasmanian Men's Shed Association Grants Program to purchase tools and equipment.
- (4) Congratulates Reon Johns, the committee and all those involved for their continued outstanding efforts in providing this much needed, and much appreciated community centre. (17 October 2019)

209 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Gerard and Susan Daly of the Daly Potato Company, for being named the Australian Farmer of the Year 2019.
- (2) Notes that since the award was established 10 years ago the prestigious Australian Farmer of the Year Award has been won by Tasmanian farmers 4 times, Daly Potato Company 2019, Peter and Frances Bender 2018, Matt Dunbabin 2015 and Tim Reid AM 2014.
- (3) Recognises the Daly Potato Company also received the 2019 Award for Excellence in innovation, sponsored by Telstra.
- (4) Further notes, the Daly Potato Company has been using premium fresh potatoes for over 30 years including more recently potato salads and other value added potato products through the Daly Potato Company and vodka through Hellfire Distillery.
- (5) Acknowledges the Hodgman Liberal Government's support of the Daly Potato Company through initiatives such as Find Food Sydney 2019, and inward buyer delegations, including the recent JA Biei delegation from Japan.
- (6) Further recognises Tasmania agriculture, led by innovative farmers like the Daly family, is going from strength to strength with the latest Agri-Food scorecard showing ongoing growth in the primary industry sector.
- (7) Further notes we are on target to grow the annual farm gate value of the agricultural sector to \$10 billion by 2050, with Tasmania's agricultural production increasing in value in 2017 2018 to \$1.60 billion, an increase of 9.1 percent.
- (8) Further congratulates Sally Murfet of Inspire AG who was named the Rural Consultant of the Year. (17 October 2019)

210 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Understands Tasmania's National Parks and Reserves are protected for their outstanding natural and cultural values.
- (2) Acknowledges the Government's Expressions of Interest (EOI) process is conducted in secret, and is a matter of growing concern for Tasmanians across the social, cultural, and political spectrum.
- (3) Notes that the Resource Management and Planning Appeal Tribunal (RMPAT) concluded in the recent Lake Malbena case that "a proper interpretation of... the Scheme only requires... that a Management Plan is in existence; and... an assessment of use in accordance with the Management Plan has been undertaken and approved up to and including Step 7 of the RAA process".
- (4) Further acknowledges this means that a project's compliance with a Management Plan cannot be appealed to RMPAT.
- (5) Further acknowledges this means for a level 1, 2, or 3 Reserve Activity Assessment there is no opportunity for formal community consultation on matters pertaining to compliance with a Management Plan.
- (6) Agrees that, at a minimum, developments in Reserved Areas should be subject to a process that allows for public consultation on compliance with a Management Plan, and that this compliance must be able to be tested in an appeal to RMPAT.
- (7) Calls on the Government to halt the EOI process until a new statutory process that allows for public consultation and an appeal on matters pertaining to compliance with a Management Plan is in place. (29 October 2019)

211 Dr *Broad* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the community is becoming increasingly frustrated with traffic congestion and delayed road safety upgrades.
- (2) Further notes the former Minister for Infrastructure, Rene Hidding, convened a crisis meeting to deal with traffic congestion in February 2016 to identify projects to be fast-tracked to alleviate congestion in Hobart and to finalise a long term plan.
- (3) Further notes the Government's 30 year infrastructure plan contains no projects, no recommendations and no development timelines.
- (4) Condemns the Government's use of expensive consultants as a strategy to delay action on vital infrastructure projects.
- (5) Further notes revelations in the recent Senate Estimates Hearings that the majority of the funding promised for Bass Highway upgrades will not become available until after the next State and Federal elections in 2022 and will stretch out until at least 2028.
- (6) Further notes that after six years of broken promises the Bridgewater Bridge project still does not have an approved business case or design.
- (7) Further notes \$90 million to improve traffic between Hobart and Sorell won't be spent until after the next election.
- (8) Further notes the continually delayed Hobart Airport Interchange project cost has blown out by \$20 million.
- (9) Further notes there has been no action on building a fifth lane on Hobart's Southern Outlet or the underground bus mall.
- (10) Recognises the Liberal Government has no intention of building the promised bridge over the Tamar River.
- (11) Further condemns the Government's continued failure to deliver on their infrastructure election promises. (29 October 2010)

212 Ms O'Byrne to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the success of the Launceston Chamber of Commerce Annual Awards held in Launceston on 26 October 2019.
- (2) Further notes that the night showcased some exciting innovation and practice from local businesses.
- (3) Congratulates all nominees for their hard work.
- (4) Recognizes the following businesses for their outstanding success in winning the following categories:—
 - (a) Building Communities Harvest Launceston Community Farmers Market;
 - (b) Design Excellence ARTAS Architects;
 - (c) Environmental Excellence Star Theatre;

- (5) Applauds local business owners Rebecca and Rod King and their team from Kingthing Marketing on winning the Business of the Year Award.
- (6) Further congratulates long term business leader Don Pitt for being inducted as a Life member of the Chamber.

(7) Further congratulates local businessman and inspiring member of the Launceston community Rod Patterson on his Hall of Fame Award. (29 October 2019)

213 Ms Butler to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the concerns of Westbury residents who do not support a Maximum Security Prison being built on their doorstep.
- (2) Calls on the Government to abandon Westbury as the preferred site for the project.
- (3) Further calls on the Government to release the nine other shortlisted sites to fully inform public debate over alternative sites.
- (4) Requires the Government to consult with shortlisted communities before making an announcement about a new preferred location for the Northern Prison. (29 October 2019)
- 214 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House declares a climate emergency.

215 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the Standard and Poors Global Agency (S&P) has once again endorsed the Hodgman Liberal Government's fiscal management with AA+ (Stable) credit rating, its second highest rating.
- (2) Recognises this Government's experienced management team has received a resounding endorsement from the Agency who stated that our "disciplined approach to containing expenditure will continue to gradually widen operating surpluses....and that "Tasmania's experienced management team and exceptional liquidity coverage continue to underpin the State's credit worthiness."
- (3) Further acknowledges S & P Global expects Tasmania will maintain its "solid fiscal position" and that: "The stable outlook reflects our expectation that Tasmania's strong operating position will offset its larger capital program spend. We expect the State's debt level to remain low compared with its peers."
- (4) Notes S & P Global projects that our economic growth will remain high at 2.75 per cent over the next two years, in line with forecasts in the 2019-20 Budget.
- (5) Further recognises Tasmania is currently the fastest growing economy in Australia and it doesn't just happen by good luck.
- (6) Understands a strong economy is the key to Tasmanians enjoying a better quality of life and our State cannot afford the uncertainty and instability of another Labor-Green deal.
- (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for maintaining the momentum and investing for further growth, ensuring we can deliver our plan to grow the economy, create jobs, invest in essential services, keep Tasmanians safe and protect our Tasmanian way of life. (29 October 2019)

216 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges agriculture is a key pillar of the Tasmanian economy, with the latest Agri-food scorecard confirming 2017-18 was an exceptional year, growing 9.1 per cent to an annual value of \$1.6 billion.
- (2) Recognises 'Tasmania's Agri-Food Scorecard 2017 2018' shows we have what the world wants and the Tasmanian brand is delivering real business outcomes, with record overseas food exports of \$740 million.
- (3) Notes the report shows we are on track to grow the value of Tasmania's agriculture sector to \$10 billion a year by 2050, driving investment in regional areas and creating local jobs.
- (4) Further recognises key contributors include dairy, beef, fruit, and major vegetable crops all recording strong export growth. Each of these products is benefiting from Tasmania's continued GMO free status, which provides access to premium markets across the Globe.
- (5) Further notes we recently launched our Sustainable Agri-Food Plan 2019-23, our blueprint for continued growth, to ensure Tasmania's agriculture sector continues to thrive.
- (6) Understands this Government is continuing to work closely with farmers and rural communities in drought affected areas.

(7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for backing agriculture with \$100 million in the 2019-20 Budget to boost border biosecurity, research and innovation, farm productivity, new market development, reducing on-farm energy costs and the roll out of Tranche 3 irrigation schemes across the State. (29 October 2019)

217 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes in 2020 a new nation leading disability funding approach will be rolled out across Tasmanian Government schools.
- (2) Recognises the approach, Educational Adjustments, comes as a part of the Hodgman Liberal Government's commitment to providing high quality inclusive education for students with a disability.
- (3) Further notes the initiative will make a huge difference for our students by aligning resourcing to individual needs.
- (4) Further recognises approximately 2,000 additional students will now be supported under the new model, and it will also mean more Support Teachers will be available to directly help our students.
- (5) Further notes the move to a needs-based funding model was identified through the 2014 Ministerial Taskforce to support children and young people with disability.
- (6) Understands the needs-based funding will continue to be progressed with an additional \$34 million allocated over the next four years.
- (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for its commitment which is building inclusive school communities focused on ensuring all students with disabilities are supported to learn, contribute and participate. (29 October 2019)

218 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the 'Tasmanian Government Fiscal Sustainability Report', released by Treasury, confirms our finances are strong and the Hodgman Liberal Government long term Plan is working.
- (2) Recognises this Government's Budget is on track to deliver our election commitments, with forecast surpluses across the forward estimates to ensure we have the flexibility to manage cost pressures, such as Health, or unforeseen events.
- (3) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for living within its means and spending less than we earn.
- (4) Further recognises this is in stark contrast to Labor's last four years of government, where expenditures significantly outstripped revenues and the budget was in red.

- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr Woodruff)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs *Rylah*)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio." (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)
- **8** Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)
- **9** Justice Legislation Miscellaneous Amendments Bill 2019 (No. 39 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Justice)
