- 113** Mrs *Greene* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes:—
    - (a) the Launceston Chamber of Commerce Members Connect event on 9 June 2026, which focused on what comes next for Launceston;
    - (b) the Chamber's quick work in bringing business, civic, tourism, community and local leaders together at a time of growing concern for Launceston and northern Tasmania; and
    - (c) the mounting pressure on northern Tasmania, including 7West Media's move to Hobart, Hawthorn's planned departure from Launceston after 2027, Lion's proposal to close the Boag's brewery site, and uncertainty surrounding Liberty Bell Bay and Bell Bay Aluminium.
  - (2) Acknowledges:—
    - (a) the workers, contractors, suppliers, small businesses, families and communities affected by these decisions;
    - (b) the generations of workers who have built northern Tasmania's manufacturing, brewing, tourism, media, sport, events, industrial and small business sectors;
    - (c) Launceston's strengths in food, agritourism, heritage, sport, events, arts, culture and regional visitation; and
    - (d) the leadership shown by the Launceston Chamber of Commerce in moving quickly into practical ideas for Launceston's future.
  - (3) Calls on the Tasmanian Government to:—
    - (a) fund the development of a clear plan for northern Tasmania, in partnership with the Launceston Chamber of Commerce, the Northern Tasmanian Development Corporation (NTDC), industry, tourism bodies, business leaders, local government, the Federal Government and Bass MPs; and
    - (b) use that process to identify how the \$1 million in returned grant funding from Lion should be reinvested for the benefit of Launceston.
  - (4) Recognises that Launceston needs leadership and a practical plan for jobs, investment confidence and growth. (17 June 2026)

- (1) Notes:—
    - (a) concerns that the confidentiality provisions of the Integrity Commission Act 2009 (Tas) may be limiting public discussion, parliamentary scrutiny and informed debate on matters involving elected representatives and other matters of public interest; and
    - (b) concerns about the operation of those provisions where the subject of a complaint, assessment, investigation or other integrity process is a sitting Minister or Member of Parliament, and whether different disclosure, notification or reporting

arrangements should apply to elected office holders, having regard to their public responsibilities and obligations of accountability.

- (2) In accordance with section 24(1)(d) of the Integrity Commission Act 2009 (Tas), refers the following reference to the Joint Standing Committee on Integrity to inquire into and report upon— the operation of the confidentiality provisions of the Integrity Commission Act 2009 (Tas), including, but not limited to, sections 94, 98 and 100, with the following Terms of Reference:—
- (a) whether those provisions strike an appropriate balance between protecting the integrity of investigations, procedural fairness and public accountability;
  - (b) the interaction between investigations conducted by the Integrity Commission and the statutory, administrative and convention-based obligations applying to Ministers, Members of Parliament, Heads of Agency, State Service employees and other public officers;
  - (c) approaches adopted in other Australian jurisdictions to balance procedural fairness, confidentiality, public accountability and transparency in the work of integrity and anti-corruption bodies;
  - (d) identifying any legislative amendments to improve transparency, public confidence and parliamentary accountability while maintaining appropriate protections for investigations and affected persons; and
  - (e) any other matters incidental thereto. (18 June 2026)
