


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

REPORT of the EDUCATION DEPARTMENT for the Year 1886.

*To His Excellency SIR ROBERT GEORGE CROOKSHANK HAMILTON,
Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the
Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the
Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

I HAVE the honor to submit the following Report upon the Education Department of Tasmania for the year 1886.

In many respects this Report must necessarily be unsatisfactory, for two reasons—(1) because I have only had charge of the portfolio of Minister of Education for a very brief period, and am consequently not familiar with the departmental history of the past sixteen months; and (2) because it cannot be said that the Education Act has been properly administered, or ever brought thoroughly into operation.

When the Legislature passed the Education Act it was with the full intention of very considerably extending the powers and functions of the Local School Boards (promoted by the Act into District Boards), and, by dignifying those bodies, to constitute them important factors in the departmental machinery.

Consideration of Section 24 of the Act will show at once how vitally important it was to the proper and efficient conduct of the new system of State Education that these Boards should have been created and in full operation on the 1st January, 1886, when the Act came into force. Apart from the fact that it was to these local authorities that the central controlling body should have looked for counsel and support, there are duties assigned by Section 24 to the District Boards which cannot be effectively, or at all, performed by any one else; yet, notwithstanding this, it was only on the 23rd August, 1886, Delay in that any District Board was appointed, and the following statement shows the number appointment of Boards. of such Boards existing from time to time up to the 28th April:—

leaving 8 to be appointed.

Nor can it be said that when appointments were made they were always of a satisfactory character. At the outset it was resolved by the then Minister of Education that, by a hard-and-fast rule, and without any consideration as to efficiency or for the wishes of the parents of children, the Municipal Councils of the Colony should be *ex officio* District Boards; while, on the other hand, it was constituted an equally inviolable rule that no Minister of Religion or Member of Parliament should have a seat upon a School

Board : that is to say, that some who were elected to positions of trust as Councillors because of their possession of one class of qualification were to be appointed to another office for which they were not qualified, while many who had been most active in the cause of education as Members of Local School Boards were to be excluded, notwithstanding their possession of the necessary qualifications and the confidence of the people, because they had for their special office the guidance of the public conscience or the framing of the people's laws.

Where no Municipal Council existed, the method of appointment adopted was to consult the Stipendiary Magistrate and others supposed to be people of influence, and select seven members, or less, out of the list of possible members so procured.

Failure was, I think, inherent in such a system as this. In one instance the Municipal Council as a body refused to act ; in another instance the Council, having accepted office, subsequently resigned. In very numerous cases the individuals invited to act have declined. At this moment six Boards are unappointed ; and where the Boards have been established it has often been after considerable waste of time in correspondence, and frequently by a haphazard selection of persons nominated by others whose qualifications as competent judges in such a matter were wholly unknown.

It may safely be said that if the election of District Boards had been left to the ratepayers, who in their several localities are chiefly interested in the matter, the Boards would have been elected very much sooner, and with far more satisfaction to the public and the Department. I would therefore urge that the nominee Board system be abolished, and that of elective Boards substituted, at the earliest possible opportunity.

As an example of the failure of the existing Board system, it may be noted that in no single instance has the half-yearly report required by Sect. 24 been sent to the Minister until the current month ; and it affords a striking commentary upon the departmental administration of the Act that this neglect on the part of District Boards was permitted to pass unnoticed.

In regard to the framing of necessary regulations under Section 36 there has also been inexplicable delay. That section empowers the Governor in Council to make Regulations for the following purposes :—(1.) For regulating the terms and conditions upon which school-houses may be used for other than school purposes. (2.) The secular and religious instruction to be given in all schools under the Act. (3.) The system upon which the compulsory standard of education shall be determined. (4.) The drilling and other physical training of children. (5.) The establishment of the Kindergarten method of instruction. (6.) The teaching of the principles of technical education. (7.) The inspection of schools. (8.) The examination and classification of teachers. (9.) The salaries to be paid to teachers. (10.) The scale of fees to be paid by parents. (11.) The exemption of parents from the payment of fees. (12.) The distribution of such fees among the teachers ; and (13.) The granting of railway passes. But, although some of these Regulations were urgently needed, and, in fact, indispensable if the Act was to be properly administered in accordance with the intention of the Legislature, regulations were only made for 5 of these 13 purposes. And of these five, that for the exemption of parents from the payment of fees might, for all practical purposes, have been as well left unmade. For, in respect of the remission of fees, a regulation was made and gazetted whereby it was provided that children under certain conditions as to parentage might be admitted free, or at a reduced school fee : but this regulation was wholly insufficient, inasmuch as it did not prescribe the authority by whom remission or reduction should be ordered, and, in the absence of any provision of this sort from the Act, there is no one competent at the present time to make such order ; consequently all the remissions and reductions made since 1st January, 1886, have been made without legal sanction.

In providing for regulations for the teaching of the principles of Technical Education, the Legislature certainly contemplated some practical outcome in a direction which is very generally regarded with favour, and as to which Tasmania is lamentably deficient and behind the age. Throughout Europe, and in some of the Colonies, Technical Schools have been established. In Europe, where they have existed for many years, their educational results have been unmistakable and most beneficial ; and it cannot but be regretted that the Education Department, having the sanction and authority of Parliament to act, should have failed for so long a period to take any steps in this direction. Precious time has thus been irreparably lost ; but regulations are now under preparation whereby form and substance will be given to this branch of instruction, and Parliament will be asked, in its wisdom, to vote the funds necessary for the effective conduct of the system laid down.

In regard to the elementary teaching of children throughout the Colony, there was Progress of a continuation of that development which has been going on for many years, and which Schools: may be looked for as long as population increases at the present rate. The progress of Schools is shown in the following table for the last 5 years:—

It should be noted that it has been the practice of the Department to reimburse Teachers in the amount of fees remitted or reduced, and that there is neither law nor regulation authorising this.

Free Scholars. A Return of the number of children admitted during the year under Free Certificate is appended. The sum of £268 9s. 11d. was paid by the Department for their instruction. The average number of Free Scholars was 704·25.

It is a noticeable feature of the public education of the Colony that, while the average attendance of Free Scholars steadily and almost progressively declined from 2013 in 1871 to 977 in 1883, there has been in the later years a tendency towards increase of this average, which was 1067 in 1884, and 1098 in 1885.

Schools established. Full-time schools were established at the following places:—Barrington Junction, Formby, Melrose, Maria Island, and Rhyndaston.

Half-time and provisional schools at Back River, Patersonia, Irish Town (Circular Head).

Schools closed. The following schools were closed:—Branxholm, Deddington, and Reedy Marsh.

State Schools Exhibitions. At the Annual Examination for Exhibitions of 1886 twenty-three boys and four girls presented themselves, and, on the recommendation of the Examiners, Exhibitions were awarded as follows. It is hoped that these Exhibitions will be turned to account in the furtherance of technical education.

GENERAL Report for the Year 1886, by JAMES RULE, Esq., Senior Inspector of Schools.

Hobart, 30th May, 1887.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit my Report for the year 1886.

The schools placed under my inspection were those of Hobart and all the Country Districts from Southport to the Scamander River, Mathinna, and the Corners northward, and numbered in all 104. One of these, that established on Maria Island in November, was not visited; all the rest were visited once or oftener, the total number of visits being 280, exclusive of two made specially and three incidentally to schools in Mr. Bourdillon's districts. The number of schools examined for results was 100, the number of children 4307.

The great extent of country to be crossed, and the large number of schools that I had never before visited, account for a want of fulness in some of my Reports of inspection. To complete the work of examining the schools before the end of the year, the incidental examination of candidates, special enquiries in different districts, official correspondence, &c., many long days' marches were necessary, and much of the correspondence had to be made night work. It was not found practicable to render the separate Reports on the examination of schools till February of this year.

The results of the examinations are summarised in the following tables, the first showing the numbers presented by the teachers for examination in the several classes, and the numbers found properly classified; the second showing the revised classification according to the results, and the third a detailed statement of the numbers that reached the full standards of the several classes in the three essential subjects:—

From the third Table it may be gathered that the percentage of pupils who had reached or passed the full standards of Class III. was—in Reading, 27 ; in Writing, 25 ; in Arithmetic, 19 ; in all three subjects, 18.

In consequence of the change in the inspectorial districts I have been unable to estimate the progress of the children individually since their examination in former years.

Reading shows, as usual, the highest percentage of passes ; but in this subject a bare statement of results in figures is not sufficient for the comparison of one school with another, or of the work of one year with that of previous years, since the cultivation of intelligence is not always found concomitant with fluency and correctness, or even with elocutionary display.

In Writing most of the failures noted were the consequence of faulty spelling, the penmanship being generally satisfactory. The failures in spelling are mostly due to a want of sufficient practice in writing from dictation, with judicious modes of correction.

Arithmetic shows the poorest results. It is only in a few schools that this subject is really well taught. Most teachers neglect to give children sufficient mental exercise on concrete numbers leading up to the explanation of general truths. In many schools the work is very mechanical ; and it is common to find the "answer" obtained to a sum totally without meaning to the children. Sometimes the numbers involved are far beyond their powers of conception, even when they are able to read them otherwise than by merely naming the digits. It is seldom that Notation and Numeration are entirely neglected, but equally rare to find this fundamental knowledge properly directed to throw light on the process of "carrying" in Addition and Multiplication, and on what many teachers still persist in describing as "paying back" in Subtraction. Rational teaching in the higher processes of Arithmetic is equally rare.

Geography in most of the schools receives a fair share of the teachers' attention. A few continue to set lessons in text-books, to be learnt by rote with little or no reference to maps ; others confine their teaching to the exercise of pointing out and naming places on the maps, with no explanation or description to connect them with human interests. With both methods children learn little beyond mere words. The first involves an unjustifiable waste of their mental energy. Geography, as it is taught in some of the best schools, is a subject well adapted to develop children'sceptive faculties ; and the lesson affords them a refreshing change after others that require a different kind of mental effort.

Grammar is found on the time-tables of all the schools, except a very few of the smallest. In most it is limited to parsing, and is directed to little useful purpose, only a few teachers giving sufficient attention to the training of their pupils in correct modes of expression in speech and writing.

History is well taught in very few schools. Its real study is beyond the average ability of children at the age for attendance at a State school ; and in teaching the outlines few teachers discriminate between unimportant facts and those that help us to understand the course of human progress. To avoid sectarian bias in teaching the outlines of English and General History requires a little tact ; but the difficulty is not great. Sacred History, as a subject for State schools, presents serious difficulties ; and I consider it unfair to make it obligatory on teachers or on children.

Rhymes and Poetry receive due attention in only a minority of the schools. Most teachers ignore their value even as a means of cultivating clear articulation, and are content to hear children repeat verses in a manner little better than gabble.

It is also in the minority of schools that Object Lessons are attempted. Among text-books on practical teaching there is a wide divergence of opinion shown as to the sequence and methods that should be followed in this part of a teacher's work ; and if he has not himself clear notions on elementary science such books will often lead him astray.

Needlework receives satisfactory attention in most of the schools where a female assistant is employed. The work of several is very good.

In more than half the number of schools Singing by ear is practised, and is generally found conducive to order and cheerfulness. Very few teachers use notes.

Drawing is generally neglected ; but in a few schools where it is taught, fairly satisfactory results are obtained.

Drill is not generally practised, though a few teachers do fair work in this respect..

Under the head of Discipline, it is gratifying to be able to record that fair order is maintained in nearly all the schools. There are, however, wide differences noticeable in the excellence of the general management. Really good results are found only where the teachers are of a sympathetic temperament and show enthusiasm in their work. Method and strictness without these will secure order, but the school will be no better than a machine in its influence on children's moral development. It ought to be remembered that human nature cannot be made perfect in one or two generations, even by teachers with the highest ability and moral culture ; and if the improvement is slow, but sure, we ought to be satisfied. The assertion that the average moral standard of men and women who have been educated in State schools is lower than that of their fellow citizens who have been educated in private or denominational schools is, I believe, wholly untrue.

In former Reports I have laid stress on the imperfect sanitary provisions that were too common in the Northern districts. Since those Reports were rendered there has been a gradual improvement in all parts of the country ; but much still remains to be done. A few schools are held in buildings little better than hovels, which were at first accepted as makeshifts, but were never intended for permanent occupation. I notice that in some of the new schoolrooms the teachers labour under great difficulty in managing the ventilation. They find it impracticable to secure a sufficient change of air from foul to fresh without subjecting themselves or the children to chilling draughts. The usual perforations in the ceiling are bad in this respect, the draught through them being nearly always downward.

*GENERAL REPORT for the Year 1886, by GERARD BOUDILLON, M.A.,
Inspector of Schools.*

Launceston, 4th June, 1887.

SIR,
I HAVE the honor to submit my General Report for the year ending 31st December, 1886.

The year was an exceptional one, the number of Inspectors having been reduced from three to two. The district assigned to me comprised all the schools in the northern half of the Island. I found it impossible to complete even the regular prescribed visits of inspection and examination. To make special visits for particular purposes was, as a rule, out of the question. I was absent from home for official work in the north for 232 days, and travelled 7388 miles. The rest of the year was fully occupied with the usual examinations and office work.

Two hundred and twenty-three visits were paid to the 104 schools that were open for the whole or part of the year. The regular visits of inspection were paid to all the schools, with a few omissions. This left time for the examination of only sixty. The total number of children present at the examinations in these sixty schools was 3066. The subjoined table gives a synopsis of the results in elementary subjects.

These tabular statements must be received with some caution. It does not follow that so large a percentage of children were found placed in classes too high as would appear from a cursory glance at the figures. In some cases children passed in two subjects and failed in the third from nervousness or some other cause, not because the work was really too hard for them. On the whole the results are fairly satisfactory, except in Class III. The passage from Class II. to Class III. marks a crisis in a child's school life. It may be called the *Pons asinorum* of the curriculum of our State schools. Not only are there more facts to be remembered, but also more intellectual effort is required: the work is less mechanical than in the lower classes. In Class III. children have to begin a really intelligent exercise of memory, and also to think for themselves. Out of the whole number examined in this class only 54 per cent. are recorded as having passed in all three subjects. Bad spelling in Dictation produced a considerable number of failures, but a far larger number may be traced to Arithmetic. In reviewing the results in Arithmetic of Class III. obtained in the schools generally, I am disposed to think that the sums given in examination might have been made simpler, and yet have been a fair test of the fitness of children to be in that class. The excellent results obtained in some schools, however, show that the work required was not unreasonable.

Seeing that the larger part of the district was new to me, and that the examinations were not completed, I do not submit any further general remarks on instruction or organisation. Since, however, the annual Report has usually been employed as a means whereby the Inspectors may make observations for the benefit of those teachers who require them, I add some remarks on a subject of some importance,—viz., School Registers.

In the majority of schools but little evidence of gross carelessness or unpunctuality has been observed in the keeping of the Registers. In some the Registers are a pattern of neatness and accuracy. There are teachers, however, who do not appear to realise the importance of this part of their duties, while some go so far as to despise it as mechanical, unintellectual, uninteresting. It would be well for all to bear in mind the following facts:—

1. In the keeping of Registers there is no such thing as the *spirit* of the law. The *letter* is to be observed.
2. No space or column should be left vacant after the prescribed time for filling it in has passed. There is very little worry or trouble, except, perhaps, in large schools, in making all the entries, if they are made punctually. It is the arrears that make the work burdensome.
3. Neglect in this respect may be open to misconstruction. It is all very well for an Inspector, from his personal knowledge of any particular teacher, to feel sure that no dishonesty is intended. But the same view may not be taken at head-quarters, where the facts of the case form the only basis of judgment. Even what are looked upon by some as trifling irregularities, if repeated after caution, will tell upon a teacher's reputation.

4. The marking of the attendance at each school-time is the most important of all the work connected with the Registers. The method of recording the attendance adopted in Tasmania is a judicious one. The time for closing the Registers is fixed by regulation. By this fixed time the name of every child on the rolls is to have some mark placed in the allotted space, whether the child be present or absent. The mark prescribed to denote "present" is a dot,—a smaller mark than any of those used to denote absence, or the cause of absence. Thus, if a child has been duly marked as absent when the roll was called, it is impossible (without forbidden erasure) subsequently to alter the mark of absence into the dot denoting "present." But if absentees are not marked when the roll is called, what is easier, if the teacher be so disposed, than to insert the dot afterwards? There is a temptation thus to mark late-comers as attending. It is, in fact, of more real importance punctually to mark absentees than those who are present. Any teacher in whose Registers the attendance, including both absence and presence, is found not to have been recorded by the appointed time, lays himself open to a suspicion of dishonesty, however incapable he may be in his moral nature of an intentionally dishonest action.

5. To think little of the details of keeping the Registers is not a sign of a great mind, but rather the reverse. The truly great mind perceives what are the essential and important points in each subject with which it has to deal. While, on the one hand, it perceives that in some things too much attention to minutiae tends to obscure a broad and general view, it will also see, on the other hand, that there are matters the main value of which depends on the accuracy of their details. It is a mistake to suppose that the mechanical parts of our duties are unimportant, and that details are necessarily trifles. A teacher whose Registers are kept with accuracy, punctuality, and completeness gives, so far, an indication that he wishes to do his work well.

6. I may add that I am more and more impressed with the desirability of supplying our schools with a log or journal of some kind. At present there is no record in each school of its past history—not even of changes in its management. There are many points on which it is desirable to have information ready to hand in the school. Such a book would contain appointments, grades, promotions of the teachers—notes of repairs and alterations in premises—tabular statement of the results of the last examination—record of special holidays, temporary closing of the school, and any other exceptional occurrence, as well as some other defined facts. All remarks reflecting on the teachers should be rigorously excluded, so that no teacher would have any temptation to let the book *disappear*, when he left the school, instead of handing it on to his successor. It would be possible to use the books supplied for the Inspector's observations for this purpose, if a sheet containing clear detailed instructions were pasted on the fly-leaf.
