



REPORT FOR 1885.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



BOARD OF IMMIGRATION.

REPORT for the Year 1885, and from the 1st January to 30th June, 1886.

SIR,

- 1. The Board of Immigration have the honor to forward their Report, which embraces the period from 1st January, 1885, to 30th June, 1886.
- 2. Under the Act of last Session, 49 Vict. No. 32, the functions of the Board were virtually brought to a close, although the Act creating it (46 Vict. No. 40) remains on the Statute Book. The Fund which the Board was appointed to administer is exhausted; under 49 Vict. No. 31, the issue of Land Certificates and Land Orders to Immigrants paying their own passages has ceased; and the vote for Immigration purposes made last Session was placed under the exclusive control of the Hon. the Chief Secretary. It remains, therefore, for the Board to close its accounts to date and submit its Report.
- 3. During the year 1885 the number of Immigrants arriving under the Assisted Passage System was 582 (including 195 children), being a decrease of 367 persons as compared with the year 1884. During the first half of the year, and again towards its close, the issue of Passage Certificates was altogether suspended, owing to the position of the funds at the disposal of the Board. The issue of tickets, in the Colony, was resumed in May, 1885, especially in favour of the wives, families, and relatives of persons who had already arrived, and on the assurance of the President, the Hon. Chief Secretary, that funds would be provided by Government to recoup the Board for any outlay incurred in this direction. Under this assurance, 27 Passage Tickets were issued, representing 61 persons = $52\frac{1}{2}$ statute adults,—and involving an expenditure of about £1000.
- 4. During the first half of the year 1886, 31 immigrants arrived=24 statute adults, and including 13 children.
- 5. The number of Assisted Passage Certificates issued by the Board during 1885 was 27; viz., 12 family, 13 single males, and 2 single females.
- 6. The total liability of the Board on Passage Certificates now current amounts to £957 12s. Several of these tickets are unlikely to be used.
- 7. The amount paid by applicants for Assisted Passage Certificates during the year was £172 10s., and the sum of £189 was refunded on account of unused certificates.
- 8. In paragraph 10 of the Report for the year 1884 reference was made to the appointment of Mr. Frederick Buck to select and forward one hundred immigrants from Germany. Mr. Buck left Tasmania in October, 1884, the desire being that the immigrants should reach the Colony early in 1885, so as to be available for harvest operations. A special arrangement was made, at Mr. Buck's request, by which his remuneration was fixed at £1 per head on the immigrants forwarded.

On arrival in Germany Mr. Buck found serious impediments placed in his way by the German Government, and he also states that his operations were somewhat retarded by a misunderstanding with the Agent of the Board of Immigration in London as to the provision of funds for defraying the passages of the immigrants. The result was that the immigrants did not leave Hamburg until 5th July, 1885, arriving at Melbourne in September per s.s. *Procida*, and at Hobart per s.s. *Wairarapa* on 17th September, 1885. The numbers were,—adults: males, 39; temales, 27. Children: males, 24; females, 31. Total, 121 souls = 89 statute adults.

9. Mr. Buck returned to Tasmania on 1st March, 1886, and submitted his Report and accounts claiming £544 10s. from the Board for various expenditures on their behalf, occasioned (as represented by him) chiefly by the delays which he had encountered. Against this he credited a sum of £210 10s. received from various sources on Government account, leaving the balance of his claim £344. The Board disputed several of the items in Mr. Buck's claim, and it was referred to the Colonial Auditor, who pointed out that many of the expenditures were not supported by vouchers or sub-vouchers, and that the claim could not be recognised in the form submitted. Eventually the Board requested the Hon. the President, the Hon. the Treasurer, and the Secretary, to examine the accounts, and on 18th May a report was brought up dividing the account into three schedules as under:

In respect of Schedule 2, Mr. Buck suggested that half the amount, £91 5s., should be paid to him forthwith, on his entering into a bond with a sufficient surety to return the sum should he fail to produce vouchers to the satisfaction of the Agent-General in London, the balance of £91 5s. to be paid to him in London on the production of vouchers as aforesaid. The Board agreed to this proposal, and the transaction has been completed.

In respect of Schedule 3, the Board did not consider that Mr. Buck had any bona fide claim, but as he had evidently been put to inconvenience, and had incurred sundry travelling expenses, they resolved, "That a lump sum of £50 be offered to Mr. Buck, without prejudice, in full satisfaction of Schedule No. 3." Mr. Buck accepted this offer, the money was paid, and the transaction closed accordingly.

- 10. The German Immigrants received as above were of a superior class, and are all well located, and giving satisfaction to their Tasmanian employers.
- 11. "Land Certificates," under the 7th Section of the Act 31 Vict. No. 26 were granted to 147 individuals from 1st January, 1885, to 30th June, 1886, entitling them to select 6640 acres of land, These certificates represent 119 male and 85 female adults, and 115 children, a total of 319 souls.
- 12. "Land Orders" under the 5th Section of the Act were issued between same dates, the total nominal value of such orders being £5472. These Land Orders represent 238 adults, and 143 children under 15 years of age.
- 13. By the Act 49 Vict. No. 31, the Acts authorising the issue of Land Certificates and Land Orders were repealed from and after the 1st May, 1886, but the repeal does not affect anything duly done under either of the said Acts before the repealing Act came into force. Instructions were sent to the Agents of the Board in England, and no Land Order Warrants were issued there after February last. Land Certificates continue to be issued (on the advice of the Law Officers of the Crown) only to such persons as paid their own passages and left Europe, with the intention of settling in Tasmania, prior to the 1st May, 1886.
- 14. There are "Land Order Warrants" recorded in the office to the number of 304, the owners of which have not yet applied for or taken out their "Land Orders," but whose legal claim to receive such "Land Orders" is good whenever they choose to apply for the same.
- 15. Since the promulgation of the Regulations of 23rd December, 1882, on the vote of £30,000 under Act 46 Vict. No. 40, immigrants have been introduced as under:—Adults—males, 693; females, 586. Children—males, 410; females, 409. Total souls, 2098 = 1643 statute adults.

The information obtained by the Department from time to time shows that at least 90 cent. of these immigrants remain in the Colony and are doing well. The first shipment arrived in August, 1883, and since then 60 of the immigrants have, in turn, nominated their friends to the number of 174 souls.

- 16. The accounts attached show a balance against the Board at the Treasury of £2930 17s. 10d., but against this the Board have assets amounting to £3892 7s. 7d., which, when realised, will leave a balance of £961 9s. 9d. to credit. The contingent liability upon unused Passage Certificates must be charged against this, unless the Government redeem the promise of the late Chief Secretary referred to in paragraph 3.
- 17. The usual returns for the period embraced in this Report are appended, five relating to the operations of the Board under the Acts of Parllament 31 Vict. No. 26 and 38 Vict. No. 16, two showing the liabilities of the Government and Board on overdue "Bounty Tickets," also the Cash Accounts of the Board, with Digests of the Expenditure in England and Tasmania, and a statement of Assets, &c.
- 18. Statements are also appended showing the Acreage selected and purchased by the holders of "Land Certificates" and "Land Orders" during the period embraced by the Report.
