



ANNUAL REPORT for 1883.

Invalid Depôt, Launceston, 28th January, 1884.

SIR,

I have the honor to submit this, my Annual Report for this Establishment for the year 1883:—

Admissions and Discharges.

Admissions.—The admissions were 2 in excess of the previous year. The daily average was 139.38, 134 being chargeable to Colonial Funds, and 5.38 to Imperial ditto. The daily average for 1882 was $140\frac{1}{2}$.

Discharges.—Four were transferred to the General Hospital, 4 were dealt with under the provisions of 22 Vict. No. 23, and ordered to be removed to the Hospital for Insane, New Norfolk, 7 were convicted at the Police Office for breaches of the Regulations, 1 absconded, and 33 were discharged by approval of the Administrator of Charitable Grants before the period they were ordered to be detained, most of them having obtained suitable employment. In several cases they had to be re-admitted within a very short interval.

Mortality.—The death rate was 10.964 per cent., as against 16.825 for 1882. The average age at death was 72.42, the maximum being 98, and the minimum 59. The united ages of 14 who died was 1110, being an average of 79.28.

Ages.—The average age of inmates was 66.45, exclusive of 1 native under 20 years and 4 under 30.

Civil Conditions of Inmates.—Six natives, 30 free to Colony, 271 free by servitude. Remaining on 31st December—4 natives, 13 free to Colony, and 126 free by servitude.

Religion.—Protestants, 208; Roman Catholics, 99. Remaining on 31st December, 94 Protestants, and 49 Roman Catholics.

Cost.—The gross expenditure for the year was £1968 16s. 1d., being £111 12s. 3d. less than the amount provided for in the Estimates. By the annexed Return it will be observed that the estimated cost of stores, bedding, &c. was £130 8s. 8d. in excess of expenditure. This arose in consequence of the non-receipt of bedding, &c. ordered from England. The cost of provisions was £65 14s. 8d. in excess of the amount as per Estimate, the prices of meat and other articles having increased beyond expectation. I furnish contract prices for 1882 and 1883. The annual cost per head on gross expenditure was £14 2s. 6d., and on net £13 15s. $9\frac{1}{4}d$.; for 1882 the cost was £13 17s. 5d. and £13 10s. $2\frac{1}{2}d$. respectively. The cost of maintenance of inmates of this Institution will bear favourable comparison with a similar institution in Melbourne, where there were 623 inmates on the 31st ultimo.

General Remarks.—The conduct of the inmates has been very satisfactory. Great difficulty was experienced in procuring suitable Wardsmen, most of the inmates being physically incapable of performing the duties attached to those offices. Thanks are due to the ladies and gentlemen who have continued their interest in the welfare of the inmates in providing them with many little comforts; also to W. H. Westbrook, Esq., and those ladies and gentlemen who, during the winter, kindly provided vocal and musical entertainments for the inmates, which were thoroughly enjoyed by the latter. On each occasion of His Excellency visiting Launceston he has kindly supplied, at his own expense, a supply of tobacco to the old men.

Buildings.—The roofs of the Hospital dormitory, kitchen, mess-room, and Resident Overseer's quarters are in a very bad state of repair, and require re-covering. New window sashes are much needed in the dormitories. Great inconvenience arises for the want of additional mess-room accommodation.
