ANNUAL REPORT of the NEW TOWN CHARITABLE INSTITUTION for the Year ended 31st December, 1890.

Sir,

New Town Charitable Institution, 20th May, 1891.

I HAVE the honor to submit the Annual Report of the New Town Charitable Institution from the 1st January to 31st December, 1890.

It will be seen from the accompanying returns that the strength of this establishment on the 31st December was 540—viz., 382 males and 158 females—being an increase of 20 on the previous year, while the average daily number was 592, an increase of three. There were admitted during the year 460 males and 143 females—being au increase of 46 males and 5 females on the admissions for the previous year. The discharges for the year were 350 males and 106 females—being a decrease of 16 males and 10 females on the previous year. The deaths were 95 males and 32 females.

The approximate ages of the inmates remaining in the institution on the 31st December, 1890, are as follows :----

The average age of the males is 71_{12}^{5} ; Females 64_{12}^{1} .

There were during the year 356 cases of sickness, 321 males and 35 females. Of the inmates on the roll during the year—827 males and 296 females—506 could read and write; 113 read only; and 484 could neither read nor write. The birth-places of these inmates were :—

The gross expenditure for the year was £8665 6s. 2d. as compared with £8590 1s. 10d. for 1889. The net expenditure, £8263 3s. 11d. for 1890—£8176 12s. 1d. for 1889. The net cost per head per diem was 9d., or £13 19s. 2d. per annum, as against £13 17s. 8d. for 1889.

Many improvements have been effected during the year, which have added materially to the safety and comfort of the inmates; among them may be mentioned the completion of the fire escapes in the male division, and the iron verandah and balcony in the female division; the gas has been laid on in both buildings. Hydrants and hose have been supplied for use in case of fire and for gardening purposes. A kitchen range has been added to the B division, which enables baked and roast dinners to be given to the inmates. The ground in the enclosure of the female division has been planted with trees, shrubs, and flowers, and grass plots formed. The fumigating room has been rendered fit for use, and the old troughing in the lavatories has been replaced by enamelled washing-basins with plug and tap to each. Crockery plates and mugs have been substituted for tinware formerly in use.

I would like to take this opportunity of thankfully acknowledging the following welcome donations and contributions towards the library and reading-room and for distribution among the inmates during the year:-Donations in money to purchase books, to the extent of £2 5s., by visitors to the Institution. The Mercury, Tasmanian News, Church News, and Catholic Standard, by the proprietors thereof. Several volumes of the Family Herald, Scribner, Harper, and other publications, from Mrs. C. E. Davies. Two bound volumes of Illustrated London News, 1854-56, from Mrs. Willett. Several numbers of The Graphic and Illustrated London News, from Managers of New Town Library, Francis Butler, Esq., H. T. Maning, Esq., and several numbers of the Australasian, Colonist, Tasmanian Mail, and other papers from Mrs. J. H. Innes; copies of the Australian Journal and a quantity of other papers from Mrs. Perkins, of Bothwell; various English and Colonial papers from Messrs. W. W. Eldridge, G. R. Miller, and others ; a lot of papers from the Secretary to the General Post Office. The Matron reports that she has received several papers and periodicals for the female inmates from Lady Young, Lady Wilson, Mrs. T. B. Clarke, and Mrs. A. J. Ogilvie.

Concerts and entertainments were given by friends of the Institution for the amusement of the inmates on an average about once a month. The Garrison Band, under Mr. W. T. Bates, also gave two concerts during the year, which were much appreciated.

The Chaplains have been assiduous in their spiritual duties, and the Sisters of Mercy, the Flower Mission, the Ladies Reading Committee, and other ladies and gentlemen who take an interest in the welfare of the inmates, have continued their visits of charity and kindness. Mrs. Colonel Shelton and other ladies gave their usual annual feast of cakes, fruit, and tobacco to the male inmates, and the Ladies' Reading Committee entertained the female inmates with a feast and concert on the 17th December. Buns, fruit, and tobacco were supplied as usual on Good Friday, through the exertions of Mr. J. W. Johnson.

The Cascade Brewery Company and Mr. G. Nichols, of the Globe Brewery, generously supplied the inmates with beer for their Christmas dinner.

The vegetable garden has been most successfully managed by Mr. Overseer Scully, 34,628 lbs. having been produced and used in the Institution, and the flower borders enriched by gifts of bulbs and chrysanthemum plants by Messrs. J. Baily, J Bidencope, and G. Luckman.

The conduct of the inmates generally has been satisfactory, and the discipline of the Institution has been all that could be desired, through the zealous and efficient aid which I have at all times received from the officers associated with me in the management of this Institution.

I beg to annex extracts from the Visitors' Book, a Statement of the Expenditure, and the usual Statistical Returns.
