

ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

REPORT FOR 1875.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Secretary, and ordered by the House to be printed, September 12, 1876.



Telegraph Department, 11th September, 1876.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor of forwarding my Annual Telegraph Report for presentation to Parliament.

These Returns are now made out for the ordinary financial year terminating on 31st December, as the Cable Company now adopt that more convenient course.

Comparative statements for former years, terminating 30th April and 31st December respectively, can be found by referring to Parliamentary paper H.A., No. 36, 27th July, 1875.

The Report is again most encouraging, presenting the following results as compared with

- 1. Tasmanian Lines.—An increase of 4174 Messages, and £224 19s. 3d. Receipts.
- 2. Tasmanian Lines.—Fees derived from Intercolonial Business.—An increase of 628 Messages, and £53 16s. 1d. Receipts.
- 3. Tasmanian Lines.—Fees derived from European Business.—A decrease of 26 Messages, and £5 11s. Receipts (attributable to the greater proportion of Tasmanian Messages to and from Europe being transmitted through Victorian agencies).
- 4. Intercolonial Business.—An increase of 628 Messages, and £265 13s. 4d. in Receipts.
- 5. Messages "on Public Service only."—A decrease of 65 Messages, and £102 1s. in money value.
- 6. Launceston and Western Railway Business.—Shows a slight decrease on 1874: 498 Paid Messages, £26 6s. 9d.; 88 Messages "on Public Service only," £8 9s. 10d.; Service Messages, &c., £750. For this information I am again indebted to the courtesy of Mr. Lord, the Manager of the Line.
- 7. Total Business.—An increase of 5711 Messages, and £223 19s. 6d. Receipts.

The improvement shown above can scarcely be attributed to the establishment of additional Stations, as the only important changes in that respect were made at a subsequent period.

With the exception of the North West Coast section the Lines have all worked satisfactorily; and with improvements now being made in their insulation, and the introduction of better battery arrangements, they will soon be placed in a more efficient state than they have ever been. It is greatly to be regretted that the North West Coast section has never yet been placed on a fair footing. This Line is a most important branch, but it is quite impossible to realise the extent of its work until it can be placed uninterruptedly at the service of the public.

The Fingal and East Coast Sections, opened early in the current year, have worked well from the first, and reflect much credit on the operators and repairing contractors; as, through their combined exertions, these sections have been singularly free from interruptions usually experienced on new branch Lines worked by inexperienced operators.

Great inconvenience is still experienced for want of a second wire between Hobart Town and Launceston (alluded to in my Report for last year), and serious inconvenience and unavoidable delays must constantly arise in the transmission of important Messages until it is erected. The matter is of vital importance, involving a comparatively small expenditure of £1000 or less.

The duplicate Line which (in accordance with the suggestion made in my Report for last year) has been erected on the Launceston and Western Railway posts from Launceston to Deloraine has proved of the greatest service, placing the Railway Telegraph Line at the sole disposal of the Railway Authorities for the important work of that Department, and enabling ordinary Telegraph business to and from the North West Coast to be sent forward without unnecessary delay.

I have the satisfaction of stating that the officers of the Department have discharged their duties with courtesy, efficiency, and zeal. The number of officially-reported complaints referring to the transmission, delivery, &c. of Messages has been smaller than in any other year,—in no case affecting the unstained integrity of the office with regard to the inviolability of secrecy. In placing these satisfactory facts upon record I would most humbly venture to draw special attention to the inadequate manner in which Telegraph operators in Tasmania are remunerated, and to point out that most of the salaries of our Telegraph Department were fixed before the establishment of Telegraphic communication with Victoria, but that immediately on the opening of the Bass's Straits Cable the office hours were doubled, although no compensatory allowance was made on existing salaries. The duties of a Telegraphist require special skill, constant and careful attention, and involve peculiar responsibility and sacred trust; and yet there are numerous instances in our own Department in which country operators, including ladies of good education, fulfil all these conditions in a highly satisfactory manner, receiving for unremitting attendance from 8-30 a.m. to 9 p.m. a salary yielding a fraction over 1s. 5d. per diem.

Since the publication of last Report a very useful Map showing the Telegraph Circuits of the Colony (ably prepared by Mr. Albert Reid) has been issued from the Lands and Works Department, which will be issued to persons desirous of procuring copies.

Time-gun Signal is still transmitted to all stations at one o'clock every day, and arrangements are now being completed for placing clocks similar to those used in the English Telegraph Offices over the more important of our own country stations, which will doubtless prove a great boon to residents.

On the 21st February last direct communication was established between New Zealand and Australia, a work of great importance to the mercantile community of Tasmania.

The subject of a duplication of the Telegraph Line between Australia and Europe is now occupying the attention of the several Colonial Governments, and its grave importance has been opportunely forced on the notice of commercial communities in consequence of numerous and continued interruptions on the existing Line.

Propositions for the immediate laying of the duplicate Line have been submitted by Captain Audley Coote on behalf of Messrs. Siemens Bros., of London, and also by the Eastern Extension Telegraph Company; and it is earnestly to be hoped that one or other will be adopted immediately.

The Financial Statement of the Tasmanian and Victorian Submarine Cable for the year 1875 is forwarded herewith.
