## **Notices of Motion**

- 70 The Minister for Veterans Affairs to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Recognises that 18 August 2018, was Vietnam Veterans Day, an annual day of remembrance for those who served during the Vietnam War.
  - (2) Notes that this day, originally known as Long Tan Day, commemorates the day in 1966 when the battle of Long Tan was fought by the men of D Company, 6th Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment (6RAR).
  - (3) Further notes that this day, first commemorated in 1969 with the raising of a cross at the battlefield by the men of 6RAR, has since been adopted to cover all veterans who served in the Vietnam War—the longest conflict in Australia's history.
  - (4) Pays tribute to the almost 60,000 Australians who served in Vietnam between May 1962 and April 1975, including 521 who paid the ultimate price and more than 3,000 who were wounded.
  - (5) Acknowledges the service of the approximately 1,800 Tasmanians who served in Vietnam, including 17 who died in their country's service.
  - (6) Further notes commemorative service and wreath-laying ceremonies were held across Tasmania to mark the event, and included the Vietnam Veterans Day Remembrance service at the Hobart Cenotaph, the Vietnam Veterans Commemoration service at Launceston Cenotaph, and the Day Service at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial site at the Cenotaph in St Helens, of which I am a Patron. I thank all the members of the Executive for their efforts in supporting Vietnam veterans on the East Coast over the years.
  - (7) Honours the service and sacrifice of all those who fought for freedom in this conflict and remembers the motto of the VVAA: "Honour the Dead but Fight like Hell for the Living." (22 August 2018)
- 71 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Notes and commends the ingenuity of SRT Logistics for investing in solar panels on an industrial scale for its worksite, working with.
  - (2) Further notes that by partnering with Aurora Energy and BEON Energy Solutions, SRT Logistics developed a customised rooftop solar solution for their distribution warehouses at Launceston and Devonport, investing in over 2,500 panels, with approximately 830kW of capacity and the potential to generate enough power to service 143 homes.
  - (3) That combined, this development is one of the largest commercial solar PV installations in Tasmania, which will empower the company to manage their power costs now and into the future.
  - (4) Further notes that the Tasmanian Government whole-heartedly supports this type of business investment.

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- (5) Commends SRT Logistics for this investment because it is not only significant investment in its business but it is also visionary thinking, in contributing to the development of more clean, affordable, renewable energy in Tasmanian.
- (6) Finally, the House notes that the SRT project assists in the Hodgman Liberal Government's objective of 100 per cent renewable energy in Tasmania by 2022. (22 August 2018)

72 The Minister for Building and Construction to move—That the House:—

- Notes the Australian Institute of Architects Tasmania Chapter, held the 2018 Tasmanian Architecture Awards on 7 July 2018, which attracted a record number of entries, covering 37 projects across 10 categories.
- (2) Further notes these entries showcased Tasmania's talented architecture profession demonstrating a very high quality of designs and workmanship.
- (3) Further notes Tasmania's built infrastructure has long had a reputation of design excellence locally, nationally, and internationally, and the Architecture Awards recognise the finest accomplishments of Tasmanian architects.
- (4) Congratulates all shortlisted projects and winners across all categories, including public architecture, commercial architecture, sustainable architecture, interior architecture, heritage, small project, urban design, educational and residential architecture.

- (6) Further notes, all category projects recognized with an award or named award will proceed to the 2018 National Architecture Awards that will be announced in Melbourne in November 2018.
- (7) Congratulations to all entrants for their hard work and important contribution to the architecture profession in Tasmania. (23 August 2018)
