## **Notices of Motion**

**38** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to improving early childhood education, by rolling out free 3 year old Early Childhood Education.
- (2) Recognises that in support of that commitment to early years education, a Tender has been advertised for Sassafra Primary School, to refurbish and reconfigure the early years area, comprising of:—
  - (a) contemporary early years learning environment including improved indoor-outdoor access;
  - (b) undercover outdoor play; and
  - (c) new toilets.
- (3) Further notes that the above works will compliment some works already completed.
- (4) Acknowledges that in 2018 the Hodgman Liberal Government committed a \$15 million dollar funding package towards new Kindergartens and upgrading of existing Kindergartens.
- (5) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its commitment to excellence in education, to improving lifelong education, and well-being outcomes, through investing in the early years where children learn to communicate, get along with others, and control and adapt their behaviour, emotions and thinking, and where research tells us that the best outcomes for wellbeing are established. (2 May 2019)

**39** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.

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- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (2 May 2019)

**40** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the McCain Potato processing on its recently announced plan to spend \$37 million upgrading its Smithton factory.
- (2) Notes that this upgrade will result in the creation of 17 full time jobs.
- (3) Further notes, that in addition to job creation, 25 new potato products will also be produced at the Smithton plant.
- (4) Acknowledges that increasing the product range produced at the Smithton factory will encourage growers to maintain current levels of supply. McCains currently store approximately 45,000 tonnes of potatoes on-site and 25,000 tonnes off-site. The remainder - about 40,000 tonnes are processed immediately after harvesting.
- (5) Further acknowledges that the McCain investment is a reflection of significant confidence in Tasmanian agribusiness in our regions. (2 May 2019)

**41** The Minister for The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's commitment to reducing the cost of living pressure for Tasmanians and delivering the lowest regulated electricity prices in the nation by 2022 thanks to its Tasmania-First Energy Policy.
- (2) Acknowledges that a key path to reducing cost of living pressures is by improving the energy efficiency of Tasmanian households and businesses.
- (3) Further notes that since 2017 the Tasmanian Energy Efficiency Loan scheme (TEELS) has assisted over 3,800 Tasmanians access funds totalling \$34 million to purchase energy saving options for their home or business.
- (4) Further notes that as of 30 April 2019, TEELS has enabled residential and small business customers to access interest-free loans and purchase energy efficiency products such as heat pumps, double and triple glazing, solar hot water or solar panels.
- (5) Further notes that the Government will continue assisting Tasmanians in reducing their energy usage by investing \$1 million over four years into the No Interest Loans Scheme (NILS), targeted at supporting low-income households.
- (6) Further notes that NILS provides a significant subsidy (of up to 50 per cent) toward the purchase cost for new energy efficient appliances up to a value of \$3,000 with a no interest loan being provided for the remainder of the product cost. (2 May 2019)

**42** The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the recent upgrades to the historic Waddamana Power Station Heritage Site in the Central Highlands.
- (2) Recognises that these staged upgrades will be a drawcard for the region, providing a memorable experience for visitors, who will be able to tour the original turbine hall, experiencing Tasmania's first large scale power scheme.
- (3) Further notes that this refurbished attraction complements the Highlands Power Trail, a self-drive journey through the Great Lake Power Scheme, launched in 2017.
- (4) Further notes the timing of the upgrades with the Central Highlands set for an influx of visitors with the 2019 World Fly Fishing Championships to be held in the region during November/December 2019.
- (5) Further notes that the Championships will put Tasmania's Central Highlands on show to the rest of the world, with three of five events held across this magnificent region.
- (6) Further notes that these and other initiatives will assist the Hodgman Liberal Government in working with local communities to achieve our target of 70% of all visitors to stay overnight in regional areas during their trip to Tasmania by 2022. (2 May 2019)

**43** The Minister for Building and Construction to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the valuable work of Self Help Workplace, which has been providing employment opportunities for people with a disability since 1962.

- (2) Further recognises that Self Help employs more than 50 people and is the largest employer of people with a disability in the Launceston region.
- (3) Notes Self Help's latest venture, Spruce Grounds Maintenance, provides further opportunities for employees to use their skills and connect with the community.
- (4) Further recognises that Self Help Workplace has received \$14,000 funding for the Spruce project through the Charitable Organisations Grants Program as part of the Community Support Levy.
- (5) Further notes that the funding has enabled Self Help to purchase equipment, including the latest safety gear and to provide training.
- (6) Thanks the volunteers and corporate supporters of Self Help Workplace and urges Members to promote the good work of this respected organisation. (2 May 2019)

**44** The Minister for Building and Construction to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the importance of the Flinders Island District High School community and the role it plays in bringing people together.
- (2) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's provision of \$50,000 to the School's Playground Fundraising Committee to create new play equipment and upgrade existing equipment.
- (3) Congratulates the community on the fundraising contribution to this great project.
- (4) Further recognises that the Government's funding is in line with the State's Healthy Tasmania Five Year Strategic Plan to encourage Tasmanians to get healthy and live happier, longer lives no matter where they live.
- (5) Supports grassroots organisations as one of the best ways to increase participation in sport and recreation. (2 May 2019)

**45** The Minister for Building and Construction to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to helping Tasmanians to build by reducing red tape and streamlining building processes.
- (2) Welcomes a new online portal that will make it easier for Tasmanians to access information about their properties and to apply for planning and building permits.
- (3) Notes that the Planning and Building Portal will deliver a single state-wide system that integrates all planning, building and related approvals, and will incorporate features such as:—
  - (a) online access to information and regulatory requirements;
  - (b) online application lodgement, which will allow owners and agents to lodge planning applications and associated documents; and
  - (c) an application tracking service, which will allow applicants to view and track applications from lodgement to determination.
- (4) Further recognises that the Australian and State Governments have committed more than \$9 million to the project, which is due for completion by 2021. (2 May 2019)

**46** The Minister for the Arts to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that the new eight-episode crime drama series, *The Gloaming*, began filming in Hobart on 25 March 2019.
- (2) Notes that *The Gloaming* is the latest creation from Tasmanian producer and writer Vicki Madden, following the success of her last television series, *'The Kettering Incident'*.
- (3) Further notes this world-class production that will have national and international exposure will be led by a stellar cast, including stars Emma Booth, Ewen Leslie and Aaron Pedersen.
- (4) Acknowledges the support of the Hodgman Liberal Government of \$1million through the new Screen Innovation Fund to the series, which is the largest screen production to ever be filmed in Tasmania.
- (5) Further notes that the show, shot entirely in Tasmania, is expected to bring substantial economic benefits to the State with over \$7.5 million to be spent on Tasmanian good and services, including accommodation, catering and transport. (2 May 2019)

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### **56** The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the recent unveiling of the first wind turbine at the Cattle Hill Wind Farm is a clear sign of confidence in our State's renewable energy sector.
- (2) Notes that this is the first of 48 wind turbines to be installed at the site and that, once complete, the facility will produce enough clean energy to power approximately 63,500 Tasmanian homes.
- (3) Further notes that the project is a game changer for the Central Highlands region, currently employing approximately 150 people on site with up to 10 permanent jobs once the farm is completed.
- (4) Further acknowledges Tasmanian businesses that have been engaged with the project including Hazell Bros, Gradco, and Haywards.
- (5) Further notes that this significant development helps underpin the importance of our Battery of the Nation Plan and Project Marinus which have the potential to inject billions into the Tasmanian economy and deliver thousands of local jobs.
- (6) Further notes that Tasmania has what the rest of the nation needs - low cost, reliable and clean energy - and that these projects support the Hodgman Liberal Government's Tasmania-First Energy policy to be 100 per cent self-sufficient in renewables by 2022. (21 May 2019)

### **57** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

## NOTICES OF MOTION AND ORDERS

- (1) Notes that another successful celebration of Tasmania's world-class trout fishing occurred at Trout Weekend held at Liawenee in the Central Highlands on 18-19 May 2019.
- (2) Acknowledges the thousands of people who took the opportunity to attend this annual event, learning about fly fishing techniques, trout cooking demonstrations and celebrating everything that is great about angling.
- (3) Further acknowledges that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to encouraging more people to go fishing through:—
  - (a) a \$300,000 commitment to freeze inland trout licence fees at 2017-18 prices;
  - (b) \$300,000 to build and upgrade new and existing community amenities, including toilets, at ten high-visitation fishing locations around the state; and
  - (c) a range of other initiatives in the State Budget including the Anglers Access Program and funding support to Anglers Alliance Tasmania, which represents Tasmania's 26,000 trout anglers.
- (4) Further notes that the amenities upgrades will not only benefit locals, but also those taking part in the 2019 World Fly Fishing Championship in December 2019 which is expected to attract teams from up to 30 countries bringing an estimated 800 anglers and support crew to the state, with the Government providing \$100,000 to support the event.
- (5) Further notes the announcement on 19 May 2019, that Ken Orr was inducted into the Tasmanian Anglers Hall of Fame—a fitting acknowledge of his decades of service to the angling community.
- (6) Congratulates the Inland Fisheries Service and supporting partners for their hard work and effort in coordinating the 2019 event. (21 May 2019)

**58** Mr *Shelton* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final conformation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (21 May 2019)

**59** Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for their commitment to strengthening the long-term outlook for our mining sector as part of our Plan to Build your Future.
- (2) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government through the Exploration Drilling Grant Initiative (EDGI) is offering grants for co-funded exploration drilling projects.
- (3) Further notes that the aim of EDGI is to provide a stimulus to “greenfield” exploration for all commodities in Tasmania. The 2018-2019 Budget commitment of \$2 million over four years is administered by Mineral Resources Tasmania, and is capped at \$50,000.
- (4) Further notes that in October 2018 ten grants for the first round of EDGI projects were awarded, and applications for the second round have just closed.
- (5) Recognises the Hodgman Liberal Government for promoting mining and exploration in Tasmania to a national and international market.
- (6) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for underpinning a long-term, strong and growing mining sector in the state which is supporting jobs, supporting families and driving economic activity in regional areas. (21 May 2019)

**60** Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to driving a strong agenda on regional growth, education, health, infrastructure and jobs – issues which are so very important to all regions of the state.
- (2) Commends the Regional Australia Institute for the recent Our Regions Rising National Summit, held in Canberra and the release of the Policy Hacks which identified the 4 key challenges regions face.

## NOTICES OF MOTION AND ORDERS

- (3) Further notes the four themes are:—
  - (a) to shift the narrative about our regions so regions are not spoken of as deficient or opposed to our capital city;
  - (b) investing in 'soft' infrastructure-human capital and liveability;
  - (c) governments and regions working together; and
  - (d) empowering regions through flexibility and place-based policy.
- (4) Further notes that regions want to work collaboratively with governments instead of being told what they need using local knowledge and expertise to support policy decisions and help government better understand how regions work.
- (5) Further notes the need to allow for flexible policy delivery in recognition that small, dispersed populations need a different approach than does a large population.
- (6) Further notes a strong, thriving regional Australia supports a strong, thriving nation. Regional Australia is diverse, innovative and closely linked to urban and global marketplaces.
- (7) Congratulates 'Regional Australia Institute – Tasmania' for contributing to these important discussions to enable this furthering of Tasmania's place in bringing together business and all levels of government and community leaders to discuss the crucially important future of regional development. (21 May 2019)

### **61** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government on announcing they will extend the First Home Builders Grant in the upcoming budget.
- (2) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government continues to support our building and construction industry by boosting dwelling construction so that more Tasmanians can build and own their first home.
- (3) Further notes that Tasmania's housing sector remains strong, with lending finance data for new homes in the year to March 2019 growing by 19.2 per cent compared to 2018, the highest in the nation.
- (4) Acknowledges that demand for new housing is high, and the extension to the first home builders grant is just one part of a multi-factored approach to housing stress in Tasmania.
- (5) Further acknowledges that the extension to the grant will have positive flow-on effects for Tasmania's building and construction industry, creating more work and more jobs, and help more Tasmanians into their own home. (21 May 2019)

### **62** The Minister for Women to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania's proud record in regards to the current representation of women in Parliament.
- (2) Further notes the House of Assembly has the highest level of female representation of all States in Australia, and made history by becoming the first Australian State to return a female-majority lower house parliament in 2018.
- (3) Further notes that with the return of the Member for Braddon, Hon. Joan Rylah MP, to the House of Assembly in March 2019, 56 per cent of members are women; and following the May 2019 Legislative Council elections, there is now a female-majority Legislative Council, with 53.33 per cent of members now female.
- (4) Congratulates the Members for Montgomery, Pembroke and Nelson on their election successes which has increased the overall representation of women in the Parliament of Tasmania to a commendable 55 per cent with 22 female members.
- (5) Acknowledges the positive actions of the Liberal Party in pre-selecting female candidates, with two out of the three candidates endorsed by the Liberal Party for the Legislative Council elections being female, and four out of the seven Liberal Party candidates in the 2019 Federal election being female.
- (6) Further notes that following the Liberal Party's Senator the Hon. Wendy Askew's appointment on the 6 March 2019 in the 45<sup>th</sup> Australian Parliament, 47 per cent of Tasmanian Federal parliamentarians were women.
- (7) Further notes that the Liberal Party's target of 50 per cent of candidates to be women by 2022 has been achieved three years early. (21 May 2019)

- (1) Acknowledges that the world is in a state of climate emergency.
- (2) Recognises the critical work of the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.
- (3) Agrees that global temperature rise must be limited to 1.5 degrees to minimise the worst impact of global heating.
- (4) Commends the United Kingdom, Ireland, the ACT Assembly and the five hundred and twenty eight Councils that have recognised the climate emergency.
- (5) Further agrees that Australia and Tasmania must take stronger, sustained action to lower our emissions and adapt to the reality of a world in a state of climate emergency.
- (6) Declares a climate emergency and calls on the Tasmanian Government to adopt strong targets backed by effective measures to reduce Tasmania's emissions and ensure that strong climate adaptation measures are implemented. (21 May 2019)

**64** Ms *Standen* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that there are 1 in 5 people living with disability in Tasmania, the highest rate of any State in Australia.
- (2) Recognises in Tasmania there are currently over 10,000 people who are eligible for support for the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), leaving upwards of 90,000 Tasmanians with disability who are not eligible for NDIS and who rely on services provided by Tasmanian disability support service organisations.
- (3) Understands that under the Bilateral Agreement with the Federal Government, the Hodgman Liberal Government has a clear and undeniable responsibility to provide services for Tasmanians living with a disability and who are not eligible for support under the NDIS.
- (4) Notes that State funding contracts for 18 disability service organisations that provide vital services for people living with disability, their families and carers will expire on 30 June 2019, leaving 90,000 Tasmanians without crucial support.
- (5) Further understands the specialist and critical nature of the work of these organisations, which rely on core funding from the State Government, to do this work.
- (6) Calls on the Minister for Disability Services and Community Development, Hon Jacquie Petrusma MP, to commit to continued funding for these 18 disability support organisations in the State's Budget and provide certainty for people living with disability who rely on these services. (21 May 2019)
