## **Notices of Motion**

TASMANIA

- 56 The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Acknowledges that the recent unveiling of the first wind turbine at the Cattle Hill Wind Farm is a clear sign of confidence in our State's renewable energy sector.
  - (2) Notes that this is the first of 48 wind turbines to be installed at the site and that, once complete, the facility will produce enough clean energy to power approximately 63,500 Tasmanian homes.
  - (3) Further notes that the project is a game changer for the Central Highlands region, currently employing approximately 150 people on site with up to 10 permanent jobs once the farm is completed.
  - (4) Further acknowledges Tasmanian businesses that have been engaged with the project including Hazell Bros, Gradco, and Haywards.
  - (5) Further notes that this significant development helps underpin the importance of our Battery of the Nation Plan and Project Marinus which have the potential to inject billions into the Tasmanian economy and deliver thousands of local jobs.
  - (6) Further notes that Tasmania has what the rest of the nation needs low cost, reliable and clean energy – and that these projects support the Hodgman Liberal Government's Tasmania-First Energy policy to be 100 per cent self-sufficient in renewables by 2022. (21 May 2019)
- 57 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
  - Notes that another successful celebration of Tasmania's world-class trout fishing occurred at Trout Weekend held at Liawenee in the Central Highlands on 18-19 May 2019.
  - (2) Acknowledges the thousands of people who took the opportunity to attend this annual event, learning about fly fishing techniques, trout cooking demonstrations and celebrating everything that is great about angling.
  - (3) Further acknowledges that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to encouraging more people to go fishing through:—
    - (a) a \$300,000 commitment to freeze inland trout licence fees at 2017-18 prices;
    - (b) \$300,000 to build and upgrade new and existing community amenities, including toilets, at ten high-visitation fishing locations around the state; and
    - (c) a range of other initiatives in the State Budget including the Anglers Access Program and funding support to Anglers Alliance Tasmania, which represents Tasmania's 26,000 trout anglers.
  - (4) Further notes that the amenities upgrades will not only benefit locals, but also those taking part in the 2019 World Fly Fishing Championship in December 2019 which is expected to attract teams from up to 30 countries bringing an estimated 800 anglers

and support crew to the state, with the Government providing \$100,000 to support the event.

- (5) Further notes the announcement on 19 May 2019, that Ken Orr was inducted into the Tasmanian Anglers Hall of Fame—a fitting acknowledge of his decades of service to the angling community.
- (6) Congratulates the Inland Fisheries Service and supporting partners for their hard work and effort in coordinating the 2019 event. (21 May 2019)
- 59 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for their commitment to strengthening the long-term outlook for our mining sector as part of our Plan to Build your Future.
  - (2) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government through the Exploration Drilling Grant Initiative (EDGI) is offering grants for co-funded exploration drilling projects.
  - (3) Further notes that the aim of EDGI is to provide a stimulus to "greenfield" exploration for all commodities in Tasmania. The 2018-2019 Budget commitment of \$2 million over four years is administered by Mineral Resources Tasmania, and is capped at \$50,000.
  - (4) Further notes that in October 2018 ten grants for the first round of EDGI projects were awarded, and applications for the second round have just closed.
  - (5) Recognises the Hodgman Liberal Government for promoting mining and exploration in Tasmania to a national and international market.
  - (6) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for underpinning a long-term, strong and growing mining sector in the state which is supporting jobs, supporting families and driving economic activity in regional areas. (21 May 2019)
- 60 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to driving a strong agenda on regional growth, education, health, infrastructure and jobs issues which are so very important to all regions of the state.
  - (2) Commends the Regional Australia Institute for the recent Our Regions Rising National Summit, held in Canberra and the release of the Policy Hacks which identified the 4 key challenges regions face.
  - (3) Further notes the four themes are:—
    - (a) to shift the narrative about our regions so regions are not spoken of as deficient or opposed to our capital city;
    - (b) investing in 'soft' infrastructure-human capital and liveability;
    - (c) governments and regions working together; and
    - (*d*) empowering regions through flexibility and place-based policy.
  - (4) Further notes that regions want to work collaboratively with governments instead of being told what they need using local knowledge and expertise to support policy decisions and help government better understand how regions work.
  - (5) Further notes the need to allow for flexible policy delivery in recognition that small, dispersed populations need a different approach than does a large population.
  - (6) Further notes a strong, thriving regional Australia supports a strong, thriving nation. Regional Australia is diverse, innovative and closely linked to urban and global marketplaces.
  - (7) Congratulates 'Regional Australia Institute Tasmania' for contributing to these important discussions to enable this furthering of Tasmania's place in bringing together business and all levels of government and community leaders to discuss the crucially important future of regional development. (21 May 2019)
- 61 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government on announcing they will extend the First Home Builders Grant in the upcoming budget.
  - (2) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government continues to support our building and construction industry by boosting dwelling construction so that more Tasmanians can build and own their first home.

- (3) Further notes that Tasmania's housing sector remains strong, with lending finance data for new homes in the year to March 2019 growing by 19.2 per cent compared to 2018, the highest in the nation.
- (4) Acknowledges that demand for new housing is high, and the extension to the first home builders grant is just one part of a multi-factored approach to housing stress in Tasmania.
- (5) Further acknowledges that the extension to the grant will have positive flow-on effects for Tasmania's building and construction industry, creating more work and more jobs, and help more Tasmanians into their own home. (21 May 2019)
- 62 The Minister for Women to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Notes Tasmania's proud record in regards to the current representation of women in Parliament.
  - (2) Further notes the House of Assembly has the highest level of female representation of all States in Australia, and made history by becoming the first Australian State to return a female-majority lower house parliament in 2018.
  - (3) Further notes that with the return of the Member for Braddon, Hon. Joan Rylah MP, to the House of Assembly in March 2019, 56 per cent of members are women; and following the May 2019 Legislative Council elections, there is now a female-majority Legislative Council, with 53.33 per cent of members now female.
  - (4) Congratulates the Members for Montgomery, Pembroke and Nelson on their election successes which has increased the overall representation of women in the Parliament of Tasmania to a commendable 55 per cent with 22 female members.
  - (5) Acknowledges the positive actions of the Liberal Party in pre-selecting female candidates, with two out of the three candidates endorsed by the Liberal Party for the Legislative Council elections being female, and four out of the seven Liberal Party candidates in the 2019 Federal election being female.
  - (6) Further notes that following the Liberal Party's Senator the Hon. Wendy Askew's appointment on the 6 March 2019 in the 45<sup>th</sup> Australian Parliament, 47 per cent of Tasmanian Federal parliamentarians were women.
  - (7) Further notes that the Liberal Party's target of 50 per cent of candidates to be women by 2022 has been achieved three years early. (21 May 2019)
- 65 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
  - (1) Notes that the Deloraine Netball Courts were officially opened on 11 May 2019.
  - (2) Recognises that the Hodman Liberal Government supported the Club by providing \$155,000 financial support towards the construction and lighting of the courts.
  - (3) Further notes that the Deloraine Devils Netball Club has grown from a one team club to three junior and 3 senior teams with over 60 members participating in the Northern Tasmanian Netball Association.
  - (4) Further Notes the Deloraine Devils Netball Club host Net Set Go netball clinics in Deloraine and Westbury with over 50 participants in 2018.
  - (5) Commend the Deloraine Devils Netball Club for their collaborative approach from inception to the completion of these courts. Their drive and enthusiasm has brought the community, Local, State and Federal Governments together in partnership.
  - (6) Congratulates Deloraine Devils Netball Club life member Taneil Bloomfield, President Natasha Whiteley and their tireless members and volunteers for their hard work.
  - (7) Further congratulates the Deloraine Devils Netball Club and Meander Valley Council for working together to build on the vision for a Recreation Sports Precinct in Deloraine. (22 May 2019)

66 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the crucial role played by rural women and their valuable contribution to primary industries in Tasmania.
- (2) Commends the winners of two scholarships supporting women in agriculture, announced at this year's Agfest:—
  - (a) Rebekah Frankcombe, winner of the 2019 Tasmanian Women in Agriculture (TWIA) Scholarship; and
  - (b) Chelsea Rayner, winner of the 2019 Tas Alkaloid Scholarship.

#### (3) Notes that:—

- (*a*) Rebekah lives and works on a dairy and cropping farm near Wynyard and has witnessed a reinvention of farming methods and continues to strive to improve farming practices; and
- (b) Chelsea has started her own Simmental stud with her enthusiasm for her work making her an ideal choice to take part in the Marcus Oldham Rural Leadership Program.
- (4) Further notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is providing \$120,000 over four years to TWIA, reflecting our confidence in the TWIA to support and encourage more rural women to take on leadership roles in agriculture.
- (5) Congratulates the recipients of 2019 scholarships and wishes them all the best as they build their skills and become leaders in the Tasmanian agricultural industry. (22 May 2019)
