Notices of Motion

- The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises that the 2020 Telstra Business Women's Awards have been announced today, 30 April 2020.
 - (2) Notes that 2020 celebrates 25 years of these Awards. For a quarter of a century, the Awards program has recognised outstanding women, helped progress their careers and business ideas.
 - (3) Joins with me to congratulate Margaret Williams, CEO of Media Park residential care facility in St Helens, who has been named the 2020 Telstra Tasmanian Woman of the Year.
 - (4) Further congratulates all of the Tasmanian winners as follows:—
 - (a) Alison Flakemore, Director Alison's Garden and Landscape in Lindisfarne, is the Small Business award winner;
 - (b) Lisa McConnon, General Manager, Corporate Services Enwave Australia in St Leonards, is the Medium & Large Business award winner;
 - (c) Catherine Murdoch, Executive Director Northern Cities at Tas OCG, is the Public Sector & Academia award winner; and
 - (d) Rachel Vasicek, Creative Director at Francesca in Hobart, is the Emerging Leader award winner.
 - (5) Understands that the state and territory awards ceremonies were scheduled to take place in March 2020. Thankfully, the awards themselves were still able to proceed, resulting in some very worthy recipients.
 - (6) Thanks and congratulates all women who were nominated for the Awards who are demonstrating outstanding leadership in their fields, and who are transforming the way we do business in Tasmania. (30 April 2020)

280 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Pays tribute to the seven year legacy of the Launceston Airport outgoing General Manager, Paul Hodgen.
- (2) Highlights the significant contributions Paul has made during his tenure. In particular, the overseeing of major infrastructure projects including the construction of a new entrance and car parks, the resurfacing of the runway and the reconfiguration of the terminal which has delivered improved screening facilities and an award-winning dinning and shopping precinct.
- (3) Further highlights that under Paul's leadership, the Launceston Airport has been an award winning airport, winning gold in 2017 and 2018 in the Airports Association National Industry Awards and in the Tasmanian Tourism Awards in 2018 and 2019.
- (4) Recognises the contribution Paul has made in providing Launceston with an airport it can be truly proud of and one that is now recognised as a stand out regional airport.

(5) Thanks Paul for his dedication to the aviation industry over the past 42 years and for his valuable contribution to the Launceston community during the past seven years. (30 April 2020)

281 Ms Ogilvie to move—That the House:—

- (1) Understands that COVID-19 has had a significant and devastating impact on the Tasmanian business community.
- (2) Recognises that Tasmania has the capacity to manage the health and safety of Tasmanians as well as building a pathway to recovery.
- (3) Agrees that economic recovery efforts should be led by Tasmanian businesses and supported by Government.
- (4) Further agrees that an economic recovery taskforce, led by business with an independent chair is essential to enable to Tasmania to recover as strongly as possible. (30 April 2020)

282 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That:-

- (1) A Select Committee be appointed, with power to send for persons and papers and records, to inquire into and report upon preventative health policies in Tasmania with particular reference to:—
 - (a) the progress of the Healthy Tasmania: Five Year Strategic Plan tabled in July 2016:
 - (b) the effectiveness of existing policies aimed at mitigating the health effects of key risk factors including obesity, smoking, alcohol, poor nutrition and low physical activity levels;
 - (c) new and emerging preventative health research, techniques, programs and initiatives successfully operating in other jurisdictions that could be effective in improving the health of Tasmanians; and
 - (d) any other matters incidental thereto.
- (2) The Committee shall consist of six members, being: two from the Government nominated by the Leader of the House; two from the Opposition nominated by the Leader of the Opposition; one from the Tasmanian Greens nominated by the Leader of the Greens; and the Independent Member for Clark.
- (3) The Committee report by 28 February 2021 and should the House not be sitting, a report may be presented to the Speaker of the House, or in her absence, the Chair of Committees, any report so presented is taken to have been presented to the House and ordered to be printed. (30 April 2020)

283 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the global pandemic has caused not just a health crisis, but also an economic crisis.
- (2) Acknowledges that it is essential that we consider what our economic future should look like.
- (3) Recognises that self-sustainability is critical for Tasmania.
- (4) Understands that Tasmania has an opportunity to look at all of our supply chains, to consider whether we are able to do better.
- (5) Further understands that too often we make a procurement decision based on price alone, but we know there is a substantial issue with modern slavery in supply chains that is not visible, but keeps price low.
- (6) Further recognises that exploitation may be detected in garment manufacturing, technology, solar, food and plastics inputs.
- (7) Agrees that we have the opportunity to innovate and clean up our supply chains, to eradicate elements of exploitation, and to re-create a sustainable Tasmanian economy. (30 April 2020)

284 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the COVID-19 epidemic has caused profound global economic and social upheaval.
- (2) Acknowledges the need for significant public and private investment after the global lock-downs are eased to aid economic and societal recovery.

- (3) Agrees a return to business-as-usual is neither possible nor desirable.
- (4) Further agrees there will be an opportunity to invest in socially, environmentally and climate positive industries.
- (5) Further agrees the growth industries of the future are in reskilling, restoration, reforestation and landscape repair; in sustainable design and construction; in resource reuse and manufacturing; in the caring sectors; in the arts; and in strong, effective public services that are well resourced and equitably delivered.
- (6) Further recognises the growing global momentum for rolling out Green New Deals as the economic stimulus measure needed to deliver essential environmental and social outcomes.
- (7) Commits to working collaboratively in the spirit of the emergency response to develop a post-COVID plan for Tasmania that is both sustainable and just for all Tasmanians. (30 April 2020)

285 Ms O'Connor to move—That:—

- (1) A Joint Select Committee, to be known as the COVID-19 Response Committee, be appointed with power to send for persons and papers, with leave to sit during any adjournment of either House, to adjourn from place to place, and to report from time to time, to inquire into and report upon:-
 - (a) all matters relating to COVID-19;
 - (b) the Government's management of the COVID-19 epidemic; and
 - (c) any matters incidental thereto.
- (2) The number of Members to serve on the said Committee on the part of the House be three, being: one nominated by the Leader of the House; one nominated by the Leader of Opposition Business; and one nominated by the Leader of Tasmanian Greens Business.
- (3) The Committee report by 30 June 2021 and should either House not be sitting, any report may be presented to either the President of the Legislative Council or the Speaker of the House of Assembly and any report so presented, is taken to have been presented to both Houses and ordered to be printed.. (30 April 2020)
- Ms O'Connor to move—That the House calls upon either the Honourable Member for Franklin, Hon. Nic Street MP, or the Honourable Member for Lyons, Hon. John Tucker MP, to resign from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Subordinate Legislation to cause a vacancy that may be filled by the Honourable Member for Clark, Hon Cassy O'Connor MP. (6 May 2020)

287 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania's public forests belong to the people of Tasmania.
- (2) Acknowledges the leatherwood tree is found nowhere else in the world but Tasmania.
- (3) Recognises as the climate heats, vegetation dries out and fire becomes more prevalent in the landscape, with burnt rainforest or wet sclerophyll areas regenerating as dry sclerophyll.
- (4) Understands that the 2019 bushfires caused significant loss of leatherwood, severely impacting Tasmanian honey producers.
- (5) Further acknowledges that as a result of those bushfires, Sustainable Timber Tasmania (STT) signed an Memorandum of Understanding with beekeepers to protect significant leatherwood coupes from logging.
- (6) Further notes that Smithton apiarist, Rodney Smith, has had his honey resource and ongoing income impacted by the logging in coupe ME008B, which has continued despite the MOU signed by STT.
- (7) Accepts that for the leatherwood honey industry to continue in warming climate and drying landscape, it needs the support of government and access to a secure, standing leatherwood forest resource.
- (8) Calls on the Minister for Resources and Primary Industries to not only recommit to the MOU with beekeepers to protect Tasmania's finite and dwindling leatherwood resource, but expand that to include an agreement not to burn logged coupes that contain any leatherwood. (6 May 2020)

288 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes COVID-19 has dramatically affected the lives of Tasmanians, particularly in Braddon, through the quarantining of thousands of people, the deaths of 13 Tasmanians and the impact on retail business, tourism and hospitality, borders as well as from home isolation and the effects of social distancing.
- (2) Recognises the high level of compliance by Tasmanians to the 'stay home and save lives' message and the commitment and support for frontline workers including the ADF/Ausmat teams brought to Burnie to enable the deep clean of the two hospitals, re-establishment of services and delivery during the furlough of hospital staff.
- (3) Thanks all frontline workers for their contributions to the care and recovery of the State during these times but especially those who took on extra workloads as a result of the closures of the NW hospitals.
- (4) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Liberal Governments' focus on whole-of-state recovery including the steadfast and measured approach to managing the medical effects of COVID-19 along with the foresight to prime Tasmania for its economic resurgence.
- (5) Further notes the Governments emphasis on a return to economic prosperity by supporting a considered hibernation plan and rebuild.
- (6) Congratulates the Premier Hon. Peter Gutwein MP and the Liberal Government on their strength in leadership, decisive early response to issues and taking expert Tasmanian-specific advice. (6 May 2020)

289 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the International Day of the Midwife was held on 5 March 2020, which recognises and celebrates the important role midwives play and the essential care they provide in our community.
- (2) Further notes the 2020 theme is 'celebrate, demonstrate, mobilise and unite', which focuses on how midwives and women can partner together to mobilise and unite toward a shared goal of gender equality.
- (3) Acknowledges the vital and important work that midwives deliver every day, particularly the significant role they have in improving the health and wellbeing of Tasmanian women.
- (4) Recognises that the celebration is even more significant in 2020 as the World Health Organisation has designated 2020 as the International Year of the Nurse and the Midwife.
- (5) Highlights the International Confederation of Midwives has called on Midwives to become gender champions within their communities and to become stronger partners with women, as protectors and defenders of women's rights.
- (6) Thanks all Tasmanian midwives for their dedication and commitment to Tasmanian women and the community at large. (6 May 2020)

290 The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that Neighbourhood House Week is being held over 8 15 May 2020, with the 2020 theme focusing on Loneliness: the solution is community.
- (2) Notes that one in four Australians are lonely, and this is even higher in some age groups. As humans we thrive on social connection and companionship, when we don't receive this regularly we become lonely and this can have a negative impact on our mental health, physical health and overall happiness and sense of purpose in the world.
- (3) Further notes a quarter of Australians feel lonely on a regular basis, and similar statistics are being found across the world with experts now calling it the "loneliness epidemic".
- (4) Acknowledges the work that Neighbourhood Houses and Centres do across Australia, providing safe, welcoming and inclusive spaces for people of all ages and backgrounds to connect with communities, form friendships and become involved in community projects, programs and groups.
- (5) Encourages people who are feeling lonely or isolated to get in touch with your nearby Neighbourhood House or Centre, to have a friendly chat and see how you can get involved in the programs that are offered. (6 May 2020)

- **291** The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Pays tribute to Neil Grose, the outgoing Executive Officer for the Launceston Chamber of Commerce.
 - (2) Recognises the significant contribution Neil has made during his tenure, with his extensive business knowledge as well as his strong relationship building skills that have strengthened the Launceston business community.
 - (3) Acknowledges that under Neil's proactive and innovative leadership the Launceston Chamber of Commerce has successfully delivered important projects and campaigns that have benefited the city of Launceston in areas such as design quality in the built environment, inner city living, population attraction and skilled migration.
 - (4) Further acknowledges the significant contribution Neil has made towards promoting strong economic growth including his contribution to the Launceston City Deal and through his role as Chairman of the Community and Business Advisory Group.
 - (5) Thanks and congratulates Neil for his dedication to the Launceston Chamber of Commerce and Launceston business community over the past 3 years, and wish him well in his new role as Manager of Business and Economic Recovery at the Meander Valley Council. (6 May 2020)

 - (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
 - (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr Woodruff)
- **5** Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
 - (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
 - (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
 - (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
 - (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
 - (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.

(7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs *Rylah*)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio." (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

- **9** Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.

- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
