Notices of Motion

- 324 Ms *O'Byrne* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes, that COVID-19 job losses have disproportionately affected women and that targeted initiatives will be required to get women back into work.
 - (2) Further notes recommendations 47, 48 and 49 of the Premier's Economic and Social Recovery Advisory Council (PESRAC) Interim Report dealing with the need to increase the employment of women.
 - (3) Further notes the Government has accepted all recommendations of PESRAC and agreed to implement them.
 - (4) Calls upon the Government to follow PESRAC advice and immediately adopt Labor's policy of equal opportunity job applications for the public service to eliminate unconscious bias in recruitment processes. (20 August 2020)

325 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That:—

- (1) A Select Committee, with power to send for persons, papers and records be appointed to inquire into and make recommendations upon preventative health policies in Tasmania with particular reference to:—
 - (a) the progress of the Healthy Tasmania: Five Year Strategic Plan tabled in July 2016;
 - (b) the effectiveness of existing policies aimed at mitigating the health effects of key risk factors including obesity, smoking, alcohol, poor nutrition and low physical activity levels;
 - (c) investigate new and emerging preventative health research, techniques, programs and initiatives successfully operating in other jurisdictions that could be effective in improving the health of Tasmanians; and
 - (d) any other matters incidental thereto.
- (2) The Committee shall consist of six members, being two from the Government nominated by the Leader of the House, two from the Opposition nominated by the Leader of the Opposition, one from the Tasmanian Greens nominated by the Leader of the Greens and the Independent Member for Clark.
- (3) The Committee report by 31 May 2021.
- (4) Should the House not be sitting, a report may be presented to the Speaker of the House, or in their absence, the Clerk of the House, any report so presented is taken to have been published by order of the House of Assembly. (20 August 2020)

326 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That the House:—

 Notes that the global pandemic has caused not just a health crisis, but also an economic crisis.

- (2) Acknowledges that it is essential that we consider what our economic future should look like.
- (3) Recognises that self-sustainability is critical for Tasmania.
- (4) Understands that Tasmania has an opportunity to look at all of our supply chains, to consider whether we are able to do better.
- (5) Further understands that too often we make a procurement decision based on price alone, but we know there is a substantial issue with modern slavery in supply chains that is not visible, but keeps price low.
- (6) Further recognises that exploitation may be detected in garment manufacturing, technology, solar, food and plastics inputs.
- (7) Agrees that we have the opportunity to innovate and clean up our supply chains, to eradicate elements of exploitation, and to re-create a sustainable Tasmanian economy. (20 August 2020)

327 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That the House:—

- Notes that the global pandemic has caused not just a health crisis, but also an economic crisis.
- (2) Acknowledges that it is essential that we consider what our economic future should look like.
- (3) Understands that we have the opportunity presented by the COVID-19 crisis to rethink how we approach infrastructure investment in Tasmania.
- (4) Recognises that Tasmania has strong expertise in ship building and advanced manufacturing.
- (5) Appreciates that now is the time for Tasmanians to get behind Tasmanian businesses and support our local industries to deliver big projects that benefit our communities.
- (6) Agrees that the new the new Spirit ferries should be built in Tasmania, by Tasmanians. (20 August 2020)

328 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises Tasmanians are leaders in renewable energy.
- (2) Understands the Marinus Link Project is an incredible opportunity for Tasmania.
- (3) Acknowledges we have the opportunity to capitalise on our renewable energy expertise and on sell Tasmania's renewable energy to the nation.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the time is right now for Tasmania to assert its dominance in the nation's future energy market.
- (5) Appreciates that Tasmania should take the bold and pragmatic step of ensuring that we own and operate the Marinus cable while ensuring that Tasmanians do not bear the majority of the cost.
- (6) Further appreciates that it is imperative that Tasmanians are the masters of our own energy future, and ownership of this strategic job creating asset is key to this.
- (7) Agrees that the Tasmanian Government should examine all options, including a special purpose vehicle to allow the cable to be jointly owned by Tasmania and Australia. (20 August 2020)

329 Mr *Street* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the COVID-19 pandemic emergency has had a significant effect on employment levels in Tasmania.
- (2) Recognises that, as public leaders, we have a responsibility to do everything we can to support job creation and job security for Tasmanians and to help Tasmania rebuild and recover from the pandemic emergency.
- (3) Notes the Government's approach to investigate local build options for the next Spirit of Tasmania vessels and to look at any ways to maximise Tasmanian jobs and utilise Tasmanian businesses in their replacement.
- (4) Further notes the support for this approach from the Tasmanian Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the Tasmanian branch of the Australian Manufacturing Workers Union (AMWU), as well as the significant interest from major Tasmanian and Australian shipbuilders.
- (5) Further notes the recent public comments from Tasmanian Labor Senator Helen Polley: "The Federal Government, State Governments and businesses should all

- collectively seek to reset supply chains to source from local manufacturers to a partial extent if not completely."
- (6) Urges the Parliament to support Tasmanian businesses, job creation and job security for Tasmanians. (25 August 2020)

330 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that Legacy Week is being held from 30 August to 5 September 2020.
- (2) Notes that Legacy Week, first held in 1942, is the annual national appeal of Legacy Australia, an iconic national charity providing services to Australian families suffering after the incapacitation or death of a spouse or parent, during or after their defence force service.
- (3) Further notes that funds raised during Legacy Week go to helping Legacy care for around 52,000 Australians, including 787 widows and 19 children in southern Tasmania and 875 widows and 17 children across northern Tasmania.
- (4) Further notes that funds raised assist Legacy in providing essential services including counselling, special housing, medical, advocacy and social support to Australian families and also help assist the education and development of the children of our deceased veterans.
- (5) Acknowledges that Legacy Australia grew out of the Remembrance Club, formed in Hobart in 1923 by First World War hero, Tasmanian Major-General Sir John Gellibrand KCB DSO and Bar—something Tasmanians can be proud of.
- (6) Congratulates the staff, Legatees and volunteers of Legacy—including the President of Legacy (Hobart), Mr Rob Grey, Friends of Hobart Legacy and the President of Legacy (Launceston), Mr Russell Hogarth—for their tireless efforts in supporting the families of our incapacitated and deceased veterans.
- (7) Encourages Tasmanians to dig deep and support this important work. (25 August 2020)

331 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that the Tasmanian Abalone Council CEO, Dean Lisson, stepped down at the end of last week, on 21 August 2020.
- (2) Acknowledges Dean Lisson for his 26 years of loyal and dedicated service as CEO and former President of the Council.
- (3) Notes Tasmania's abalone fishery is the world's largest abalone resource, supplying over 25 per cent of total annual global production of wild caught product.
- (4) Further notes the Tasmanian abalone industry had a gross food value of just over \$90 million in 2017-18, with \$85 million of that exported.
- (5) Joins with me in thanking Mr Lisson for his service, covering over a quarter of a century. (25 August 2020)

332 Ms Woodruff to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes on 12 August 2020, the Federal Minister for Environment, Hon. Sussan Ley MP, published in the Mercury the Australian Government's intention to develop a draft bilateral agreement under s. 46 of the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC) with the State of Tasmania.
- (2) Further notes a bilateral agreement under s. 46 allows for actions, or a class of actions, to not require EPBC approval for the purposes of a Part 3 (matters of national environmental significance) provision.
- (3) Understands that a bilateral agreement could easily ensure developments that infringe on world heritage properties and national heritage matters of national significance would effectively no longer require an EPBC approval.
- (4) Further notes a recent court ruling by the Resource Management and Planning Appeal Tribunal (RMPAT), upheld by the Supreme Court, found the Court does not have the jurisdiction to review the Reserve Activity Assessment (RAA) process.
- (5) Further notes the weakness of the current RAA process, and a looming s. 46 bilateral agreement, will soon lead to a situation where large elements of developments in Parks are unappealable and effectively entirely up to the Government's discretion.
- (6) Calls on the Government to not enter into a bilateral agreement under s. 46 of the EPBC Act. (25 August 2020)

333 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Understands many Tasmanians have been hit hard by the economic impact of COVID-19, and are already in dire financial straits.
- (2) Recognises these financial circumstances will only get harder after 30 September 2020, when the Morrison Government cuts JobKeeper and JobSeeker payments.
- (3) Further recognises the vital role residential rental protections have played in providing stability and support for thousands of Tasmanian tenants.
- (4) Notes these protections are due to expire on 30 September 2020.
- (5) Acknowledges the prospect of simultaneous cuts to income support and end to rental protections is frightening and extremely stressful for many Tasmanians, with some tenants already being threatened with a choice of eviction or increased rent.
- Urges the Premier, Hon. Peter Gutwein MP to use the next National Cabinet meeting to advocate for the JobKeeper and JobSeeker payments to continue at their current rate beyond 30 September 2020.
- (7) Calls on the Premier to extend all residential rental protections until 31 December 2020. (25 August 2020)

4 2019 Federal Election: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 22 May 2019 by Mr *Shelton*—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr Woodruff)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.

(7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses.

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio." (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

- **9** Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.

- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania's businesses are now measured as the most confident in the nation, that Tasmania has the best business conditions in the nation and that Tasmanian small businesses are the powerhouse of our economy.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Shadow Treasurer, Hon. David O'Byrne MP's public admission this week that, after five and a half years in Opposition, Labor still has no vision or plan.
