## **NOTICES OF MOTION**

- 1 Mr *Dean* to move That the Energy in Tasmania Report 2016-17 be considered and noted.
- 2 Mr *Dean* to move That the Report of the Integrity Commission No. 4 of 2017: An investigation into allegations of misconduct in the Fox Free Taskforce and Fox Eradication Program, be considered and noted.
- 3 Ms *Armitage* to move That the Report of the Auditor-General No. 2 of 2018-19, Administration of two grant programs by the Department of State Growth, be considered and noted.
- 4 Ms *Forrest* to move That, in order to minimise the harms associated with drug use at Tasmanian festivals and events, this House–
  - (1) Acknowledges that pill testing is a health related matter;
  - (2) Acknowledges that pill testing is an evidence based health service that reduces the risk of illicit drug harm at music festivals and events;
  - (3) Acknowledges that pill testing services do not endorse or provide advice on the safety of illicit drug use and there is no research or evidence to support the view that pill testing increases drug use;
  - (4) Acknowledges the successful results of the two trials in the ACT that demonstrated the effectiveness of pill testing services to change a person's illicit drug behaviour;
  - (5) Acknowledges that pill testing is supported by national bodies including the Royal Australasian College of Physicians, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine, the Rural Doctors Association of Australia, the Australian Medical Association, the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation, the National Australian Pharmacy Students' Association, the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia, the Ambulance Union State Council, the Public Health Association of Australia, Family Drug Support Australia, and the Australian Drug Law Reform Foundation and at the local level, by Tasmanian community organisations including the Youth Network of Tasmania, the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre and Community Legal Centres Tasmania;
  - (6) Notes that despite there being strong support for the introduction of pill testing services across the Tasmanian community, the Government continues to be resistant to reviewing the evidence and/or exploring how a trial would provide health benefits to Tasmanians, particularly our youth;

- (7) Recognises a need for the Department of Health to prepare information and education materials outlining the community and individual health benefits of drug analysis services, to educate and inform the broader Tasmanian community; and
- (8) Calls on the Government to commence the necessary steps to explore how a trial of pill testing could occur during the 2019-20 summer festival season.
- 5 Ms *Rattray* to move That the Right to Information Annual Report 2017-2018 be considered and noted.
- 6 Mr *Finch* to move— That the Legislative Council
  - (1) Notes the impact on several residences fronting the Tamar River at Deviot as a result of landslip during the winter of 2016 which was one of the wettest winters in memory;
  - (2) (a) Acknowledges the extensive and costly damage to property that has occurred, including the demolition of one family home; and
    - (b) Acknowledges the extreme stress and anxiety that affected families have endured.
  - (3) (a) Notes that an expert geo-technical consultant's report found that an active landslip problem was known publicly for some time; and

(b) Is concerned that neither official state geological survey maps nor the Council's planning scheme had rated the risk as prohibitive.

- (4) Questions why planning and building approvals continued to be provided, including for the Deviot landslip properties.
- (5) Appreciates that the three-year wait for the five worst affected Deviot families has been extremely difficult for them in not knowing whether the considerable investment in their homes will ever be realised.
- (6) (a) Notes that the Consultant's report urges both the West Tamar Council and the Government 'to understand and respond to the financial, emotional and physical needs of the affected residents'; and

(b) Notes that precedent for compensation does exist in the areas of Lawrence Vale during the 1950's, Beauty Point in the West Tamar and the Rosetta landslip in Glenorchy; and

- (7) Urges the West Tamar Council and the Government, as a priority, to address and satisfactorily resolve this matter, including appropriate compensation for those properties seriously affected.
- 7 Mr Willie to move— That the Legislative Council
  - (1) Acknowledges the high-stakes culture that has developed around the National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy schools testing system (NAPLAN);
  - (2) Notes that the Victorian, NSW and Queensland governments have agreed to band together and conduct their own 'breakaway' comprehensive review;
  - (3) Is concerned that this year's NAPLAN testing encountered a range of difficulties with students hampered by technological issues in Tasmania and across the country;
  - (4) Acknowledges education expert David Gonski's comments regarding limitations at the classroom level where NAPLAN reports on achievement rather than growth and the results are six months old by the time they are released;
  - (5) Notes that NAPLAN data published on the MySchool website is being used as a school rating tool rather than a measurement of student progress;

- (6) Notes there has been a decade of unhealthy debate on standardised testing with little improvement as a result; and
- (7) Calls on the Tasmanian Government to join the 'breakaway' review that will report back to the Education Council.
