Notices of Motion

- 39** The Minister for Health to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises the importance of DonateLife Week taking place from 28 July 2024 to 4 August 2024, as a time to come together, learn, share stories and celebrate the gift of life that organ and tissue donation represents.
 - (2) Emphasises that organ and tissue donation is a powerful act of kindness and generosity.
 - (3) Considers the real-life scenarios of individuals awaiting transplants, including children, mothers and fathers.
 - (4) Notes:—
 - (a) the shortage of registered donors and the urgent need to raise awareness about the importance of organ and tissue donation;
 - (b) around 48 per cent of Tasmanians are currently registered organ donors, compared to 36 per cent nationally.
 - (5) Promotes the ease of becoming a donor to inform the public that registering as an organ and tissue donor is a simple process that can save multiple lives.
 - (6) Encourages open and honest conversations with family and loved ones about someone's decision to become an organ donor to ensure that these wishes are understood and honoured.
 - (7) Extends gratitude to those who are already registered donors and their selflessness and compassion, which serve as an inspiration to others.
 - (8) Urges all Tasmanians to:—
 - (a) consider organ donation, promoting DonateLife Week as an opportunity to give the gift of life; and
 - (b) register as an organ donor at www.donatelife.gov.au. (31 July 2024)
- 40** Dr Woodruff to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises the threat to lutruwita/Tasmania's communities and environment from climate change and inappropriate development.
 - (2) Notes that Tasmania's State of the Environment Report is a decade overdue, despite being a requirement in the 'State Policies and Projects Act 1993'.
 - (3) Acknowledges the Government had no plan to comply with the statutory requirement before threatened legal action by the Australia Institute and the Environmental Defenders Office.
 - (4) Further notes the already-late 2024 State of the Environment Report has been further delayed by two months, because the Tasmanian Planning Commission doesn't have enough resources to meet the deadline.
 - (5) Further notes the 'Climate Change (State Action) Act 2008' requires an Emissions Reduction and Resilience Plan for the transport sector be developed by 30 November 2024.

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- (6) Recognises this Emissions Reduction and Resilience Plan is more than eight months overdue.
- (7) Further notes that a further five sectoral plans are required in the next four months under the Act, and only a draft Plan for the waste sector has been released.
- (8) Further notes the Tasmanian Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report was expected in mid-2024 and has not been released, despite Tasmania's emissions being recorded in the Government Gazette on 5 June 2024.
- (9) Calls on the Government to recognise the threat of climate change, and release the overdue State of the Environment Report, Transport Sector Emissions Reduction and Resilience Plan and Tasmanian Greenhouse Gas Emissions Report immediately. (31 July 2024)

41 Ms *Brown* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges:—
 - (a) the pressing need for comprehensive and effective strategies to address and prevent family violence within our communities;
 - (b) that family violence remains a pervasive and critical issue affecting communities across Tasmania and the nation; and
 - (c) that addressing family violence requires a coordinated and multi-faceted approach, incorporating prevention, support, and intervention strategies to ensure the safety and well-being of Tasmanians.
- (2) Recognises:—
 - (a) the profound and detrimental impact of family violence on individuals, families, and society, including significant physical, emotional, and psychological harm; and
 - (b) the failure of the minority Liberal Government to adequately protect Tasmanian women and children from gendered violence over the past decade, despite the urgency of the issue.
- (3) Calls on the Government to make the prevention of family violence a top priority by committing to allocate the resources necessary to organisations working against family violence and ensuring that these organisations have the support needed to effectively carry out their vital work.
