



ANNUAL REPORT, 1884.

The sixteenth Annual Report of the Hobart Girls' Industrial School, Military Barracks, presented by the Lady President and Ladies Committee, again places on record another year of good, efficient, and remunerative work performed by the girls of that Institution, under the careful supervision and direction of the Matron and Teachers.

The health of the children throughout the year has continued to be good.

The Ladies' Committee desire to thank the Rev. H. C. Hancock, who gives to the girls weekly religious instruction; and also to the several ladies who take so much interest in the Sunday school.

His Excellency the Governor, Sir George Cumine Strahan, in accordance with his promise, sent (£5) five pounds for prizes to be divided amongst five girls who were successful candidates in cookery, and the thanks of the Institution are due to him for his liberality.

To Mr. James Henry, for his kindness in teaching the children singing, and to the friends who have sent liberal donations of cake, fruit, and vegetables, the President and Ladies' Committee desire to tender their grateful acknowledgments.

The proceeds of the industry of the children shows a great advance upon former years, they having earned the large sum of £173 5s. 11d., an increase of £40 9s. 8d. over the preceding year.

The subscriptions have, it is to be regretted, fallen short of the former years, and it is to be hoped that the friends of the Institution will come forward and make up the sum as before.

The year has been altogether an uneventful one, but steady and continuous work has been performed by the children during that period, which should have its influence upon their future life, and fit them, by God's blessing, to become useful and upright women.

The Ladies Committee have to express their deep regret in the loss of Mr. R. A. Mather, who died in October last, and whose active and kindly interest in all matters connected with the Institution will be much missed, and they desire to place on record their testimony to the loss the Institution has sustained in his decease.
