

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### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1898.

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SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honour to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during 1898.

Sixteen Board and one hundred and one Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and nursing staff by the frequent donations of fruit, flowers, books, periodicals, and the daily papers.

The balcony and fire-escape, main building, is at last completed, and proves a decided acquisition to the Institution.

During the year the resources of the Hospital were taxed to the utmost, and a complete break-down of the nursing staff was but narrowly averted. Extra assistance had to be obtained locally and from Sydney, and, owing to the unusual amount of sickness which prevailed generally throughout the Colonies, it was with much trouble that the required help was procured.

It was with difficulty that the large number of cases admitted to the Institution were treated. Extra beds had to be placed in all the wards, and even then it was necessary to utilize the recreation-room and the separate compartments or cells to accommodate the cases. To afford some idea of the pressure of work, it may be stated that at one time there were 154 patients under treatment, and of this number 124 were typhoid fever cases.

The total number of cases treated was 1403, far in excess of any previous year, and, consequently, the expenditure was greater, viz., £7349 8s., but still considerably below the cost during the "fever epidemic" of 1887, when the expenditure was £8451 16s. 8d. for 1209 cases.

Owing to the exceptional increase in the number of patients treated, and the necessity for obtaining extra nursing assistance, the funds placed at the disposal of the Board, despite every means taken to economise, proved insufficient to the extent of £666 18s. 9d., and application had to be made for this additional sum in order to settle the year's account.

In 1898 1303 cases were treated in the Hospital; this year, 1403, of which number 116 proved fatal, 28 deaths occurring within 72 hours after admission. The average stay of patients in Hospital was  $25\frac{1}{2}$  days, as against  $24\frac{1}{2}$  days in the preceding year. Of the 1403 cases treated, 545 came from country districts.

As will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been successfully performed during the year, and the Board of Management has much pleasure in recording its high appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Officers have discharged their onerous duties, the increased number of critical cases treated entailing much additional anxiety and work.

In June last the attention of the Government was fully drawn to the absolute necessity of having the wards, bath-rooms, &c. of the main building placed in a sanitary condition, as, owing to the large number of infectious cases therein treated, and the general decay of the woodwork in the wards and lavatories, &c., it was found that the patients and nurses were exposed to risks and dangers which should not exist. After what seemed to the Board unnecessary delay, tenders for the repairs were invited by the Public Works Department, and the successful contractor started work on 3rd October, but, owing to having to wait from time to time for material which should have been in readiness, the repairs are not yet fully completed; but when this is the case, the Hospital will be in a sound sanitary condition, and will compare most favourably with similar institutions.

The net average cost per patient was £4 4s., as compared with £3 13s. 6½d. in 1898. The fees recovered from patients amounted to £822 9s. 3d., being an increase of £67 19s. 10d. over the collections made in the preceding year. The fees remaining on the books for collection at 31st December amounted to £70 3s.
