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

GENERAL HOSPITAL, LAUNCESTON.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1899.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management of the above-named Hospital for the year 1899.

1. Messrs. G. T. Collins, J. C. Ferguson, and W. Perrin retired from the Board of Management, and were unanimously re-elected.
2. Fifteen Board and thirty-nine Committee meetings were held during the year.
3. On 30th November, the House Surgeon, A. Norman M'Arthur, M.R.C.S., &c. resigned his position, W. B. Heyward, M.B., Ch.B., being appointed to the vacancy.
4. A course of Lectures to the Nurses, in Physiology, was delivered by the Surgeon-Superintendent, and in Nursing by the Lady Superintendent. The usual examinations in Nursing were held during the year, with the result that five Nurses gained the Certificate of the Launceston Hospital Training School. Two of them, Nurses Smith and Oakes, having obtained First Class Honours and the maximum marks in Conduct, gained the Hospital Badge. Nurse M'Dowall was the first winner of "The William Barnes Prize." The health of the Nursing Staff has, on the whole, been good. One of the Staff, Nurse Roberts, died during the year.
5. The necessity for a Bacteriological Laboratory is very urgent. A suitable site in the Hospital Grounds has been selected. It is to be hoped that, with some assistance from the Board's funds, the Government will be enabled to see its way clear towards the erection of this important work.
6. The work of laying out the grounds of the Nurses' Home is being proceeded with. Difficulties have arisen in consequence of the subsidence of part of the hill at the north-western angle. Steps are being taken to have this radically dealt with.
7. The Isolation Wards for Infectious Diseases have proved to be as useful as was anticipated. Trouble has arisen owing to the subsidence of the foundations at several points, leading, amongst other things, to leakages in the drains. At two points the foundations have been underpinned. The drainage has been relaid, and cut off from the Main Hospital drain. The outhouses to the south of the Mortuary have been connected with this new drain, which has a good fall to the corner of Charles and Howick streets.
8. In the Dental Department it is satisfactory to note the steady continuance of the work in this branch of surgery.
The setting apart of a Special Ward for Dental Surgery, and the addition of another operating chair for the use of students, have greatly facilitated the work.
Some minor improvements will be necessary in order to make the Department more complete.
In the School of Dentistry the usual clinical instruction has been given. Courses of Lectures have been delivered by the Medical Officers and Mr. A. Lucadou-Wells.
9. During the year the Board of Management has been put to a great deal of expense, owing to non-restoration of the Drying-room of the Laundry, which had been destroyed by fire in the previous year. The erection of a new Drying-room was commenced towards the close of the year, and should soon be completed.
10. Several restorations of Salaries of officials have been made, in keeping with those of Civil Servants in other Departments.
11. For the purpose of properly equipping the Operating Theatre with modern appliances, the Board of Management voted £350 from its private funds. Two small rooms have been erected adjacent to the Theatre, for special purposes, and the work of improvement is being proceeded with.

12. In July a case of suspected small-pox was brought to the Hospital. As it proved to be probably a case of atypical chicken-pox, the case was isolated, and treated in the Infectious Diseases Wards. No case of small-pox has been seen since.

13. The following improvements have been carried out during the year:—

The furnishing of the quarters of the House Surgeon has been completed.

The full complement of beds for the Hospital has been made up by obtaining the necessary number of the Lawson Tait patent bedsteads.

Grates have been obtained for all the wards of the Hospital, and the open fireplaces done away with.

A room has been allotted to the Dispenser for the purposes of a sitting-room.

Electric light has been installed in the outhouses at the Isolation Wards.

The roofs of the Nurses' Home and of the Operating Theatre have been repaired.

The cupboard for splints has been enlarged.

The kitchen and men's mess-room have been re-painted.

At the Reception House the hall, bedroom, and kitchen have been painted. The lavatories, w.cs., pantries, and halls at the north end of the building have been painted.

A gate has been put in the railing of the verandah of the Children's Wards.

The hood over the kitchen boiler has been altered so as to act more satisfactorily.

The main drain was repaired, owing to blockage by roots. A man-hole was erected over it. Other repairs to smaller drains were effected.

The brickwork around the boiler was repaired and bolted together.

The boiler at the Nurses' Home has been re-set.

Decayed beams over the hot-water channel were replaced.

The flush tank at the men's w.cs. was repaired, and an enclosure made around the urinal.

The railings of verandahs and balconies have been repaired.

Linoleum has been laid in the Lodge.

The Dispenser's bedroom has been painted and papered.

A new paling fence has been erected at the Surgeon-Superintendent's residence along French-street.

The capping of the fence along Mulgrave-street has been repaired and re-painted.

14. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness to the patients and staff: During the year several performances were given by private individuals from this and other colonies, for the entertainment of the patients, and were much appreciated.

15. The Samaritan Fund is being utilised to assist deserving and indigent patients in obtaining any articles necessary to their comfort and health when leaving the Hospital, to enable convalescent patients to have a necessary change, or to provide travelling expenses in order that they may return to their homes.

16. The quality of the provisions, &c. supplied to the Hospital, has, with few temporary exceptions, been good.

17. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
