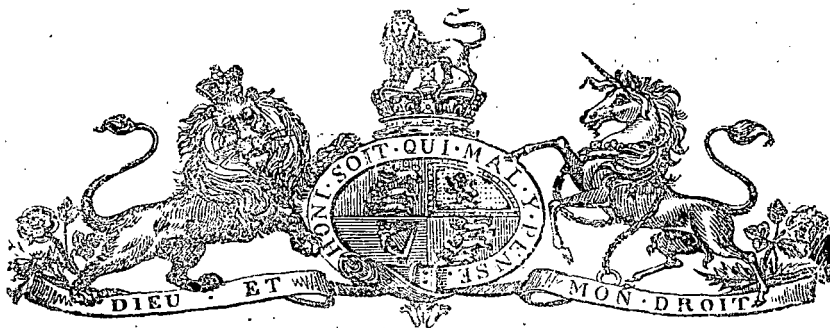

SIMILAR letter to the President of the Commissioners Hospital for Insane, Cascades.

Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, 6th May, 1879.

SIR,

I HAVE now the honor to reply to your letter of the 24th March last, requesting a report for the information of the Government "whether any, and if so how many, of the present inmates of this Hospital are in such a mental condition as would admit of their being maintained in an Invalid Dépôt," which I referred to the Commissioners, at their meeting on the 1st April ultimo, who then appointed a sub-committee consisting of the Honorable Drs. Butler and Agnew, with the Medical Superintendent, to examine the whole of the patients, and who on the 3rd instant presented their report as follows to the Commissioners, which was then adopted:—

"The Committee appointed to examine the patients in the New Norfolk Asylum to ascertain the proportionate numbers who could be removed and adequately cared for in an Invalid Dépôt have the honor to report that Dr. Agnew, Dr. Butler, and the Superintendent, in conjunction with Mr. Tarleton, carefully examined all the patients and found that only six patients could be so removed without danger to themselves or others. The age of these individuals and their debility render it absolutely necessary that great attention should be paid them, and their long residence in the Asylum and knowledge of the officers makes it a much easier task to maintain discipline and supervision. That although this number might be transferred in the event of absolute necessity, the Committee cannot recommend it, as it would be absolute cruelty to the poor people, and, in their opinion, entail increased supervision and proportional medical charge."

SIR,

WITH reference to your letter of the 6th May, on the subject of the possible removal of some of the patients in the New Norfolk Hospital for the Insane to an Invalid Depôt, I have the honor to request that you will be good enough to inform me whether, if the Government established a special ward in the Invalid Depôts for the reception of Imbeciles, where they could be safely and comfortably provided for, and duly looked after, the Commissioners would be prepared to modify their views, and thus, by transferring the harmless imbeciles to another establishment, facilitate the earlier concentration of all cases requiring restraint in one Institution.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to request that you will be good enough to cause the Government to be furnished with a nominal list of the insane persons now maintained in the Hospital at the Cascades, stating the age, civil condition, and, if formerly a convict, the offence, date of conviction, and sentence.

The Government are also desirous to receive a report on the present mental condition of each patient, distinguishing those that require restraint, or are liable to become violent at times, or whose conduct and habits necessitate special supervision, from those who are merely imbecile, and whose welfare could be equally well secured in an Invalid Depôt, if the Government provide an Imbecile Ward for their special reception.

The Government are desirous to take steps for the early concentration of all insane persons who require restraint and special supervision in one establishment, and the removal of harmless imbeciles to another Institution would materially facilitate and hasten the necessary arrangements.

EXTRACT from the proceedings of a meeting of the Commissioners, held at the Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, on the 1st day of July, 1879.

LETTER from the Honorable Colonial Secretary, on the subject of removal of Imbeciles to an Invalid Dépôt, read, when it was resolved: "That the Commissioners will be prepared to advise the Government, so soon as they are informed of the arrangements for the removal to another Hospital, in accordance with Section 23 of the Act 22 Victoria, No. 23, of the class of patients alluded to in the letter of the Hon. Dr. Crowther *pro Colonial Secretary.*"

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 3rd instant, conveying copy of a Resolution of the Commissioners with reference to the possible removal of imbecile patients to an Invalid Dépôt.

In my letter of the 25th June last, I specified the class of inmates of the Hospital for the Insane which the Government were desirous to remove to an Invalid Dépôt, and that a special ward would be established for their reception.

Of course such ward would have to be proclaimed a Hospital for Insane under the Act, and their supervision would have to be provided for under a body of Commissioners.

The details of the necessary arrangements would be subject to the approval of the Commissioners, but until the Government are made aware of the probable number that could be removed, it would be impossible to enter into the consideration of such details.

The Government earnestly desire the co-operation of the Commissioners in their endeavour to effect the concentration of all those cases requiring restraint and special treatment in one Institution, and to avoid all unnecessary expense in the erection of buildings for their accommodation, and they entertain hopes that by the removal of harmless imbeciles the attainment of the objects in view will be materially facilitated.
