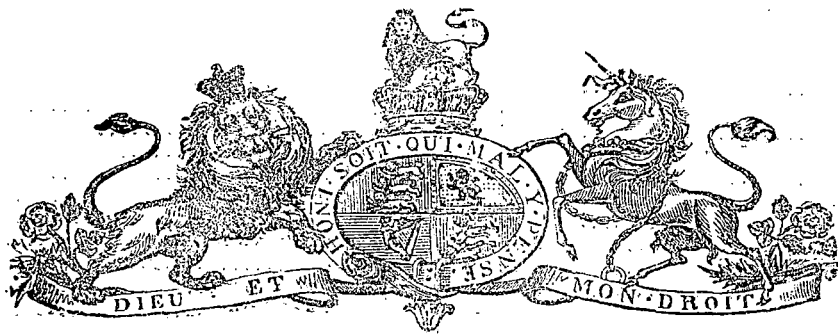

HOBART TOWN INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1875.

THE work of the School has been carried on during the past year with fair success, and its present condition affords abundant reason for thankfulness. The Matron and Schoolmistress have continued to discharge their duties to the satisfaction of the Committee.

No arrangements have yet been made for procuring a permanent site and more suitable buildings; but an outlay of the capital available for this purpose is still contemplated.

The Committee have much pleasure in recording their thanks to Mrs. Weld for accepting the office of Patroness, and becoming a fellow-worker with them in promoting the efficiency of the Institution.

Eight girls have been sent to service during the year, and the Committee have the satisfaction of knowing that they, as well as others trained in the School, are at present conducting themselves well. They also receive assurances from time to time that the benefits of discipline and instruction enjoyed in the School are afterwards gratefully remembered by many.

A girl who had been sent to service was re-admitted on account of her serious illness. During a long sickness she received unremitting kindness and attention from the Matron and the other inmates of the School, as well as pastoral care from the Rev. Canon Bromby. After much suffering, endured very patiently, her "end was peace." The Committee have also to thank Dr. Benjafield for his kindness in visiting the above case, as well as many other instances during the past year.

The objects of this Institution are so important, and its work is so conducive to the best interests of the community, that the Committee appeal with confidence to all benevolent persons for a continuance of sympathy and support in furtherance of its interests.
