Notices of Motion

- Ms *O'Connor* to move— That the number of Members to serve on the Joint Sessional Workplace Culture Oversight Committee on the part of the House of Assembly be extended to 5. (13 September 2022)
- 35 Mr *Young* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises the importance of investing in infrastructure to stimulate economic growth and support jobs.
 - (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Government is delivering a record \$5.6 billion infrastructure program over four years, to build thriving communities, to harness our competitive advantages and create more opportunities for Tasmanians in every corner of our State. This includes billions of dollars invested in housing, health facilities and our schools.
 - (3) Welcomes the Tasmanian Government's commitment to an arts, entertainment and sporting precinct at Macquarie Point which will help diversify our economy, activate public transport, and transform Hobart into a cultural, entertainment and sporting capital to rival any on mainland Australia.
 - (4) Notes:—
 - (a) that a recent Pricewaterhouse Coopers report shows that a new 23,000 seat stadium at Macquarie Point would create 4,200 jobs during construction and maintain 950 jobs a year during operation.
 - (b) that the proposed stadium would generate \$300 million in additional economic activity during construction and a further \$85 million each year when completed, and \$162 million in consumption due to a significant spike in the visitor economy.
 - (5) Supports continued investment in infrastructure to further grow Tasmania's economy, which in turn enables the Government to invest more in essential services. (27 September 2022)
- 36 Ms Finlay to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that:
 - the Tasmanian salmon industry is Tasmania's biggest primary industry and has grown to a processed food value of \$1.154 billion (2019/2020), and further spends around \$500 million per annum on the supply of goods and services from Tasmanian businesses;
 - (b) Tasmanian salmon and trout farming creates 2,292 direct full-time equivalent jobs and more than 10,000 indirect full-time jobs, creating highly skilled, well paid pathways particularly in regional Tasmania; and

- (c) while supplying just 1.6 per cent of the world salmon supply, the Tasmanian Salmon industry is the largest fishery in Australia by both volume and economic value.
- (2) Notes:—
 - (a) that the 12-month moratorium on no net increase in leased farming areas in Tasmanian waters was promised to be lifted in September 2022;
 - (b) that the 10-year Salmon Plan Discussion Paper Q&A states "in relation to no net increase in total leasable area for finfish farming will still apply... until the new plan is finalised and takes effect"; and
 - (c) there is therefore confusion surrounding the promise to lift the moratorium, with questions being raised by industry, suggesting that it is in fact still in place, just under another name.
- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff, MP to:—
 - (a) clearly outline for Tasmanians and those working in the industry whether, as promised, the moratorium has in fact been lifted;
 - (b) outline for Tasmanians and those working in the industry whether the moratorium has in fact been extended until the release of the 10-year salmon plan, and continues to exist under a different name; and
 - (c) confirm that the release of the 10-year salmon plan has now been deferred. (27 September 2022)

Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—

- (1) Supports effective measures to minimise the harm caused by gambling, particularly Electronic Gaming Machines (EGMS).
- (2) Notes:—
 - (a) the recent, comprehensive investigation of harm minimisation technologies facial recognition and player card gaming undertaken by the Tasmanian Liquor and Gaming Commission;
 - (b) the Tasmanian Greens called for a mandatory card-based system with precommitment features, global expenditure limits, financial assessment for increasing expenditure limits, inbuilt budget tools, mandated break features, eventual expansion to include other gambling products (including online gambling), and examination of gambling-related court diversion programs or other justice system interventions; and
 - (c) that, in response to the recommendations of the Liquor and Gaming Commission, the Rockliff Government has agreed to introduce a mandatory card-based system with pre-commitment features, global expenditure limits, financial assessment for increasing expenditure limits, and mandated break features.
- (3) Acknowledges that while Members may have different views on the precise details of an EGM card-based system, there is much in the new harm minimisation framework that can be agreed on.
- (4) Congratulates Government, and particularly the responsible Minister, the Treasurer, Hon Michael Ferguson MP on commitments made in response to the Liquor and Gaming Commission's report.
- (5) Calls on all Parties and Members to commit to not abolish, or in any way weaken, the harm reduction measures contained within the EGM card-based system, should they form government after the next state election. (27 September 2022)

38 Dr *Woodruff* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises Julian Assange is an Australian citizen and a journalist with WikiLeaks who aided in exposing possible war crimes and civilian casualties in the release of documents which included Afghanistan War logs in 2010 and Guantanamo Bay files in 2011, supplied to WikiLeaks by Chelsea Manning, a former U.S. Army intelligence analyst.
- (2) Notes that Mr Assange has been subject to isolation and imprisoned for 10 years.
- (3) Recognises Mr Assange's impending prosecution by the United States of America constitutes a serious attack on the fundamental democratic freedoms of the press.
- (4) Further notes:—

- (a) allegations that the CIA illegally spied on US citizens while they visited Assange in the Ecuadorian embassy; and
- (b) reports former US security officials have alleged that in 2017, following WikiLeaks' publication of details around a series of CIA hacking tools, CIA director Mike Pompeo and top agency leaders developed plans to have Assange murdered.
- (6) Calls on:—
 - (a) the President of the United States, Hon Joe Biden, to intervene in the extradition and prosecution of Mr Assange, and instruct the US Attorney-General and US Department of Justice to withdraw all charges; and
 - (b) the Prime Minister of Australia, the Hon Anthony Albanese, MP and Minister for Foreign Affairs, Hon Senator Penny Wong, to write to the President of the United States, Hon Joe Biden and the US Ambassador to Australia, Ms Caroline Kennedy, to express concern regarding Mr Assange's prosecution. (27 September 2022)

Ms O'Byrne to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that Tasmanian school staff have done an extraordinary job throughout the Pandemic to minimise disruptions to learning and to support Tasmanian students.
- (2) Notes:—
 - (a) that Tasmanian teachers are the lowest paid in the country;
 - (b) concern that the Government hasn't addressed workload, staff shortages and competitive pay to retain teachers and keep up with the cost of living in its public sector offer; and
 - (c) that stop work action is a last resort for teachers and support staff, who are trying to improve education outcomes but need the support of Government.
- (3) Acknowledges industrial action by school staff is supported by parent associations and education stakeholders to lift learning outcomes.
- (4) Further notes the Liberal Government is prepared to spend \$375 million on a Hobart AFL stadium when the State's NAPLAN results are the worst they have ever been and too many Tasmanian children are struggling with reading, writing and numeracy.
- (5) Calls on the Liberal Government to support school staff so Tasmanian children can reach the expected standards in literacy and numeracy and engage in their learning. (27 September 2022)

40 Ms White to move—That:—

- (1) A Select Committee be appointed with power to send for persons, papers and records, to inquire into and report upon the Tasmanian Liberal Government's plan to build a new stadium at Macquarie Point, including the:—
 - (a) cost of building the stadium;
 - (b) ongoing costs of maintaining and operating a stadium;
 - (c) constructability of a stadium at Macquarie Point;
 - (d) compatibility of a stadium with the endorsed Macquarie Point Site Development Plan;
 - (e) Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff's claim that the stadium would help pay for Tasmania's health and education systems; and
 - (f) any other matter incidental thereto.
- (2) The Committee shall consist of five members, being:—
 - (a) two from the Government nominated by the Leader of the House;
 - (b) Dr Broad; and
 - (c) Ms O'Connor MP; and
 - (d) the Mover
- (3) The Committee report by 22 November 2022. (27 September 2022)

41 Ms White to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) public sector workers deliver critical services relied on by Tasmanians every day; and

- (b) inflation in Tasmania is increasing at 6.5%.
- (2) Agrees that:—
 - a wage increase that does not increase at the same rate as inflation is a wage cut in real terms;
 - (b) public sector workers deserve a wage increase that keeps up with the increase in cost of living;
 - (c) recruitment and retention of public sector workers is critical in being able to deliver public services needed by Tasmanians; and
 - (d) paying a comparably lower wage to other states and territories impacts negatively on recruitment and retention of public sector workers, and in turn, delivery of services in Tasmania.
- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff, MP to recognise the real value of public sector workers to Tasmania, and to treat them with the respect they deserve in wage negotiations. (27 September 2022)
- 42 Ms *Dow* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) Tasmania is in the grip of a health crisis;
 - (b) Tasmanian health care workers are at breaking point;
 - (c) Tasmania effectively has a part time Health Minister;
 - (d) the Launceston General Hospital (LGH) has the worst bed block in the country; and
 - (e) the Tasmanian Government has its priorities all wrong.
 - (2) Further notes that:—
 - (a) over 9,000 Tasmanians are waiting for necessary elective surgery;
 - (b) over 55,000 Tasmanians are on the "hidden waiting list" to see a specialist;
 - (c) ambulance response times in Tasmania have increased to an all-time high of 15 minutes:
 - (d) Tasmanians are not being seen in clinically recommended time frames at our emergency departments; and
 - (e) the Government has not funded the \$580m upgrade of the LGH promised at the last election.
 - (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff to get his priorities right, fund the LGH upgrade and invest in fixing the health crisis instead of funding a \$750m stadium in Hobart. (27 September 2022)
