- 190** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Chudleigh Memorial Hall & Park celebrated its 60th Anniversary on 14 September 2019 with a community barbeque.
 - (2) Further notes that the Hall was built in 1954 to both honour the living and in memory of the fallen from both War One and World War Two.
 - (3) Further notes the Hall includes a playground, recreation space, gardens, sheltered BBQ and picnic areas, public toilets and visitor information.
 - (4) Acknowledges the facilities support both the local community and travelers and is the only such public area in Chudleigh.
 - (5) Congratulates the Chudleigh Memorial Hall Committee on their tireless efforts to manage and maintain the Hall and its wonderful spaces.
 - (6) Further congratulates all involved for their hard work in celebrating such a wonderful community space. (25 September 2019)
- 191** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—
- (1) Acknowledges that the vegetable processor in Simplot's Devonport factory will play a central role in an Australian Government investigation using renewables for process heating in manufacturing or helping to reduce emissions in our manufacturing industry.
 - (2) Notes that the North West coast processor will be one of only five sites chosen nationally to progress to a full feasibility study and will be complete by the end of 2019.
 - (3) Recognises the site will test commercially available technologies that have significant potential to optimise the application of process heating in manufacturing, while increasing the uptake of renewable energy.
 - (4) Recognises process heating accounts for the largest share of onsite energy use in Australian manufacturing and that low temperature processes offer the best opportunity for displacing fossil fuel with renewably powered alternatives.
 - (5) Further notes by switching to renewable energy technologies, industries like Simplot can significantly reduce their reliance on traditional forms of energy, save and reduce their operating costs.
 - (6) Further notes that if the project proves to be feasible, the site would then be eligible to apply to ARENA for Federal funding to implement the renewable energy measures.
 - (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government as it continues to progress opportunities for our businesses and industries that see a strategic advantage in sourcing their energy from Tasmania's renewable sources, while delivering on the lowest emissions in the country and our target of 100% renewable energy by 2022. (25 September 2019)

- 192** Mrs Rylah to move—That the House:—

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- (1) Notes the Tasmanian Export Awards are the State's highest recognition of excellence of Tasmanian companies exporting goods and services.
- (2) Records the 26th Tasmanian Export Awards were held on the 19 September 2019 where our world class exporters were recognised for their achievements.
- (3) Acknowledges that the Tasmanian Export Awards give Tasmanian exporters the recognition for their significant contribution to our economy, through job creation, economic growth and the associated increased prosperity in our community.
- (4) Recognises the prestigious Tasmanian Export Awards give our exporters State distinction and the opportunity to compete at the national Export Awards held in Canberra in December 2019.
- (5) Further notes that the Awards provide our producers with a platform to build their businesses' profile in state, national and international markets.
- (6) Further acknowledges that, according to the latest data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics, Tasmanian producers have exported \$3.71 billion worth of goods in the last financial year.
- (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for the 'Tasmanian Trade Strategy 2019-2025' which positions Tasmanians to be globally competitive, assists in expanding industry capability, empowers Tasmanian producers to expand their presence on a global market and attract investments and create jobs. (25 September 2019)

193 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the Burnie Port is a key player in our State's economy, noting that ninety-nine per cent of goods originating or terminating here are shipped.
- (2) Notes Burnie is one of Tasmania's most important facilities, handling the highest volume of cargo in our State, with 5.44 million tonnes shipped during 2017-18 as well as cruise ship visitations.
- (3) Further acknowledges the Hodgman Liberal Government for its investment of \$1.74 million for the a mooring dolphin which enables cruise ships up to 315 metres in length enter the Port of Burnie.
- (4) Further notes that the 2019-2020 cruise season is expected to welcome a total of 130 cruise ships to Tasmania, of which 39 vessels will visit the port of Burnie.
- (5) Recognises the port of Burnie not only manages 42.4 per cent of our State's total exports but is crucial for Tasmania's growing mining industry and forestry, with the vast majority of products exported from this facility.
- (6) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for its 10 year Infrastructure Pipeline which includes a \$40 million investment into the critically important bulk minerals ship-loader. This upgrade is strongly supported by the Tasmanian Minerals, Manufacturing and Energy Council. The Council state it is a priority that will provide the West Coast miners with a reliable export supply chain.
- (7) Condemns the Labor opposition for not supporting the replacement of this fundamental piece of infrastructure for our mining sector. (25 September 2019)

194 Ms *Standen* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the organisers and people of all ages who participated in the Global Climate Strike on 20 September 2019.
- (2) Condemns the Morrison Liberal Government for ignoring the concerns of young people and the wider community who are demanding stronger action on climate change.
- (3) Welcomes Federal Labor's commitment to implement the Paris agreement, reduce the rate of global warming, move to net zero emissions by 2050 and set medium-term emissions reduction targets that are consistent with these principles and guided by the best available scientific and economic advice.
- (4) Acknowledges that Tasmania has an opportunity through the exporting of renewable energy to make a major contribution to reducing national emissions.
- (5) Supports renewable energy projects including Robbins Island Wind Farm provided it meets all the necessary approvals.
- (6) Calls on the Government to report twice yearly to the Parliament on progress to meet strong targets backed by effective measures to reduce Tasmania's emissions and ensure that strong climate adaptation measures are implemented. (25 September 2019)

- (1) Recognises that 27 September 2019 is National Police Remembrance Day.
 - (2) Notes that Remembrance Day is a sobering reminder of the potential dangers that police officers sometimes face while trying to protect our communities.
 - (3) Further notes that a service to honour the fallen members of Tasmania Police will be held at the Tasmania Police Academy on Friday 27 September 2019.
 - (4) Remembers and pays tribute to the memory of all police officers who have lost their lives and their families that have lost a loved one serving the Tasmanian community. They have all undertaken important duties that have contributed to making our communities a safer place to live and have made the ultimate sacrifice in keeping others safe.
 - (5) Further notes that Remembrance Day is also a time to reflect on the hard work and dedication of all Tasmanian Police Officers and the contribution that they make to Tasmania. (26 September 2019)

- 6** Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

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- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Government's continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs Rylah)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- “(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio.” (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

7 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

8 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.

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- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)
