- 92** Ms *Woodruff* to move—That the House, in accordance with section 47 of the Acts Interpretation Act 1931, disallows the Clarence City Council – Public Places By-Law (No. 1 of 2018) laid upon the Table of the House on Tuesday 12 June 2018. (18 September 2018)
- 94** Ms *O'Byrne* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes that Australia is still lagging behind other nations in representation of women in parliament.
 - (2) Further notes:—
 - (a) that achieving this goal has been further hampered by recent events concerning alleged bullying and shaming of women in Parliament;
 - (b) the comments by the former most senior Liberal party woman in the country, Hon Julie Bishop MP regarding women in leadership;
 - (c) the disparaging comments regarding women in parliament by Senator the Hon. Eric Abetz;
 - (d) the Tasmanian Parliament has a 50 % representation of women but that this is largely due to Labor, Independents and minor parties; and
 - (e) the risk that the ability to encourage women's participation in parliament is hampered by the current treatment of elected women.
 - (3) Investigates gender awareness training for all Members. (18 September 2018)
- 95** Mr *Hidding* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Tasmanian Labor Party's rule "appointments to electorate or ministerial offices of State and Federal members of the Parliamentary Labor Party must be members of the Party, and a financial member of the relevant Union".
 - (2) Further notes that to get a taxpayer-funded job with the Labor Party you need to have paid membership fees to the Labor Party and the Unions, maintain that membership for the period of their employment, and obey the rules of both organisations.
 - (3) Further notes that the Labor Party rules effectively enforcing compulsory union and party membership are a potential breach of Federal and/or State legislation.
 - (4) Calls on the Labor Party to act immediately to remove this discriminatory requirement from its Tasmanian Labor Party rules. (18 September 2018)
- 96** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Pays tribute to the Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association (TFGA) for its 70 years of service to rural and regional Tasmania.
 - (2) Recognises the TFGA's powerful and effective voice for the farming sector and the vision it shares with this Government for agriculture.

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- (3) Understands that there is no greater supporter of Tasmanian farmers than the Hodgman Liberal Government.
- (4) Notes that the Government is backing the TFGA's mission to provide a voice for farmers to ensure the growth, sustainability and profitability of our agriculture sector including:—
 - (a) investing \$150 million in an AgriFood Plan; and
 - (b) focusing on growing the value of agriculture to \$10 billion by 2050.
- (5) Further notes the TFGA's leadership in working with governments to create lasting policy change and a vibrant future for the agriculture sector.
- (6) Calls on all Members of the House to work with the TFGA to help build future opportunities and build on Tasmania's unique position in the world. (18 September 2018)

97 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the international reputation of Tasmania's trout fishery.
- (2) Appreciates that Tasmania's inland fisheries attracts more than 26,000 recreational anglers each year, including 5,000 from interstate and overseas.
- (3) Recognises that the Hodgman Liberal Government understands the importance of fishing tourism and, at the same time, is ensuring trout fishing remains a valued tradition for generations of Tasmanians by:—
 - (a) making it cheaper to go trout fishing by freezing licence fees for the next four years;
 - (b) supporting peak group Anglers Alliance Tasmania through the Anglers Access Program by investing \$215,000 over four years to improve community amenities at high visitation waters; and
 - (c) working with Anglers Alliance Tasmania and Trout Guides and Lodges Tasmania to further market and promote angling tourism.
- (4) Supports the Tasmanian Inland Recreational Fishery Management Plan 2018-28 that is helping to grow and develop recreational trout fishing by providing better opportunities for anglers, assess fishery performance and manage fish stocks for future generations.
- (5) Further recognises that Tasmania's strong reputation for trout fishing will be further enhanced when the World Fly Fishing Championships will be held in our State in December 2019. (18 September 2018)

98 The Minister for Veterans Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that Saturday, 15 September 2018, was Battle of Britain Day, an annual day of remembrance for those who fought and died in the Battle of Britain, history's first entirely aerial campaign and a strategic turning point of the Second World War.
- (2) Notes that the Battle occurred over the United Kingdom between 10 July 1940 and 31 October 1940 between the air forces of Nazi Germany and the then British Empire and Commonwealth.
- (3) Further notes that Allied success in the Battle was pivotal in seeing the planned seaborne invasion of the United Kingdom by Hitler's Germany cancelled, allowing the British Isles to eventually become the springboard from which the invasion of occupied Europe was performed, leading to the liberation of millions under Nazi oppression.
- (4) Pays tribute to 'The Few', as Winston Churchill immortally named the fighter pilots fighting in the skies over Britain, for their service, courage and sacrifice, including more than thirty Australians, 14 of whom died in the Battle including Flight Lieutenant Stuart Walch, of Hobart, who attended the Hutchins School before joining the RAAF.
- (5) Acknowledges that over the past weekend 15/16 September 2018, a memorial service commemorating the Battle was held at St David's Cathedral and a wreath laying service at the Hobart Cenotaph with representatives from the Australian Defence Force, foreign militaries, ex-service organisations and all levels of Government attending. (18 September 2018)

99 The Minister for Veterans Affairs to move—That the House:—

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- (1) Recognises that Friday, September 14, 2018 was Australian Peacekeepers Day, an annual day of remembrance for Australian military and police personnel who have served in peacekeeping operations across the globe.
- (2) Notes that this day is the 72nd anniversary of the United Nations' first peacekeeping mission in 1947—an operation which consisted of four Australian military officers on the UN Good Offices Commission in the then Dutch East Indies, now known as Indonesia.
- (3) Further notes that since this date, over 75,000 Australian defence and Police Force personnel have participated in 77 operations in 65 different countries.
- (4) Commend our Tasmanian peacekeepers and their families for their service and the invaluable contribution they have made toward achieving peace in areas of need.
- (5) Acknowledges the members of the Australian Peacekeepers and Peacemakers Veteran's Association – Tasmania Division.
- (6) Pays tribute to the 3,767 multi-national personnel who have died on UN peacekeeping operations since 1948. (18 September 2018)

100 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the team behind the Launceston Night Market, which is providing an exciting opportunity for locals and visitors to socialise and share a quality experience.
- (2) Thanks market organisers Natasha Nieuwhof and Corey Baker for inspiring the community with the night market vision.
- (3) Notes that the venture is inspired by night markets from around the world and is designed to celebrate food and beverages and local producers and musicians.
- (4) Urges Tasmanians to experience the market and encourage visitors to do the same, noting the dates for the Spring/Summer market series:—
 - (a) 5 October 2018;
 - (b) 2 November 2018;
 - (c) 7 December 2018;
 - (d) 8 February 2019; and
 - (e) 8 March 2019.
- (5) Acknowledges the support the market receives from the City of Launceston Events and Tourism team and Environmental Services.
- (6) Further notes the Launceston Night Market is held within Civic Square, which has recently been revitalised as part of Launceston's City Deal vision.
- (7) Further notes that the City Deal is energising Launceston and making the city an even better place to live, work and be part of the community. (19 September 2018)

101 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the importance of cycle tourism as one of Tasmania's strongest competitive advantages.
- (2) Supports the Hodgman Liberal Government's Cycle Tourism Strategy, which is growing the sector, creating jobs and highlighting the benefits that cycling brings to Tasmania.
- (3) Further notes the Government is working with industry, stakeholders and Local and Federal Governments to draw from the growth in cycling tourism.
- (4) Further notes the Cycle Tourism Strategy is guiding the development of Tasmania's cycling tracks and trails, growing and promoting experiences and events.
- (5) Further supports community cycling events, like Central Launceston Rotary's Sally's Ride Tamar Valley Challenge, which is promoting the benefits of cycling and working to attract interstate visitors.
- (6) Further supports current and future cycle tourism ventures such as Blue Derby, Maydena Bike Park, the St Helens Mountain Bike Trail Network and Stacked Loop Network.
- (7) Further notes the Cycle Tourism Strategy is working to improve safety for all cyclists and supports the Government's goal to make Tasmania home to the healthiest population in the nation by 2025. (19 September 2018)

102 The Minister for Veterans Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on Friday, 7 September 2018, the keys to an old DPI/PWE shack were officially handed over to the Returned and Services League (RSL) Tasmania and that

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the shack will be renovated by the veteran community to be used by post-Vietnam military veterans.

- (2) Further notes the shack will assist veterans with their recovery post-service, both during the construction and once complete and operational.
- (3) Commends the Vietnam Veterans who have indicated their willingness to assist the younger veterans with their renovations.
- (4) Congratulates Ex-Service organisations for their work in providing advocacy and care for all cohorts of the Veterans community, to assist Veterans in re-assimilating back into civilian life post-service.
- (5) Acknowledges the committee members appointed by RSL Tasmania State Executive to oversee the renovation and management of the shack.
- (6) Further acknowledges our 10,500 Tasmanian ex-service men and women, their service and sacrifice must be remembered.
- (7) Further notes the Tasmanian Government is a proud supporter of our Veteran's community and has contributed \$100,000 towards supporting the renovation project. (19 September 2018)

103 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Volunteering Tasmania is entering its 25th year of operating in Tasmania.
- (2) Acknowledges that as the leading voice for volunteers and volunteer-involving organisations, Volunteering Tasmania works to strengthen the sector and promotes the benefits of volunteering and its value in transforming and enriching Tasmanian communities.
- (3) Further notes that over six million Australians and—on average—four out of every five Tasmanian adults volunteer, donating around 7.1 million hours in Tasmania alone over the last twelve months.
- (4) Further notes that, according to the State of Volunteering report, volunteering provided a total benefit of \$4.9 billion to the Tasmanian economy, with Tasmanian employers enjoying \$2.1 billion of productivity benefits as a result of their employees volunteering.
- (5) Commends Volunteering Tasmania's Staff and volunteers, including their Board of volunteers for their passion and dedication to the organisation.
- (6) Congratulates Lisa Schimanski on her appointment as the new Chief Executive Officer of Volunteering Tasmania. (19 September 2018)
