



Dear Sir,-



I have conferred with the Clerk of the House on the subject, and Mr. Reid points out that the only accounts referred to by the Auditor-General in his communication to you which relate to the House of Assembly are in connection with Semi-Public Bills, in regard to which there might be expenses for reporting evidence, witnesses expenses, or other charges, and Standing Order No. 278 provides that the Local Body promoting a Semi-Public Bill is required to give to the Clerk of the House a written Guarantee for the payment to the Treasurer of the State of any expenses in connection with such Bill. So far, however, there have been no other expenses beyond printing with regard to any Semi-Public Bill. Any such Bill is printed by the Government Printer upon the authority of the Clerk's initials and when the Bill is disposed of the Printer sends his claim to the Clerk of the House, who, under the Guarantee held by him, requests the payment of the account by the Local Body concerned. Mr. Reid informs me that, except perhaps in the height of the Session, any such demand is sent to the Local Body concerned as soon as the claim reaches him from the Government Printer, and immediately upon receipt of the cheque from the local Body it is paid to the Printer and the latter's receipt forwarded to such Body.

I have requested the Clerk of the House to expedite as much as possible in the future the receipt of any amounts due to the Treasurer on account of Semi-Public Bills. So far as the Hobart Corporation is concerned Mr. Reid suggests that it would conduce to more prompt settlement if the Corporation were requested to send cheques to Government Departments, instead of expecting them to be collected.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25th instant relating to certain powers proposed to be given to the Clerk of the House while acting as Chairman in connection with the Election of Speaker.

In reply I may say that I am not aware of the Clerk of the House having been invested with any such powers as regards the maintenance of Order in any Parliament in the British Dominions. Our usage here lately has been for the choice of the Speaker to be decided at a private meeting of all the Members summoned at the instance of the Premier, by which we avoid any unpleasantness in the House itself, and the Member then chosen is elected unopposed in the usual way when the House meets. But I think it is quite reasonable, and indeed desirable, that the Clerk should be clothed, as Presiding Officer, with all the powers of the Speaker for the maintenance of Order, should the necessity arise, as clearly the House should be in a position to protect itself.

As regards the Closure, when our Standing Orders were revised in 1912, Sir Elliott Lewis and I included in the Draft Standing Orders provision for the Application of the Closure, but when they came before the House for consideration, this Standing Order was amended in the direction of making its application dependent on the Speaker, or Chairman, being of opinion that the Question had been sufficiently debated, but the Standing Order, so amended, was negatived by the House on division by one vote. I was the means of bringing the matter up again in 1919 in the same form, as I was desirous that the House should have power under its own Standing Orders to protect itself, instead of having, if the necessity arose, to follow the practice of the House of Commons, but the proposal again failed to meet with the support of a majority of the House.






