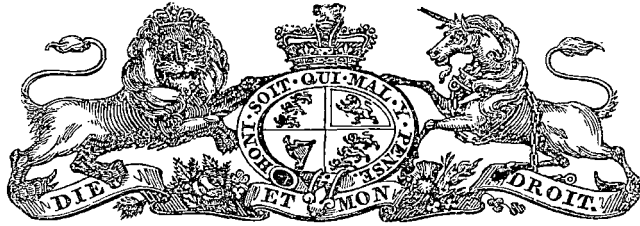

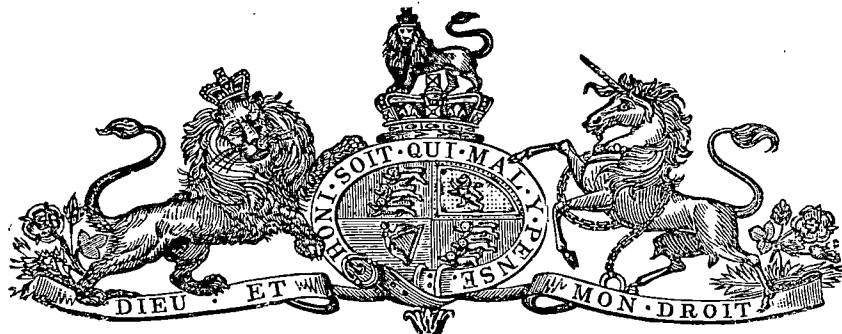

ANNUAL REPORT, 1900.

To His Excellency the Honourable SIR JOHN STOKELL DODDS, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government in and over the State of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THE Council of the University of Tasmania, in conformity with the provisions of "The Tasmanian University Act," has the honour to report, for the information of Your Excellency in Council, the proceedings of the University for the year 1900.

I.—PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS.

Junior Public Examination.

The Tenth Examination under the Regulations of the Junior Public Examination was held at Hobart and Launceston, and also at Ulverstone, Longford, Devonport, Deloraine, Westbury, Franklin, and Zeehan, as Local Centres under Local Committees. The Examination lasted from the 19th to the 26th November, both dates inclusive, and was under the following Examiners:—Acting-Professor E. G. Hogg, M.A., Rev. J. Oberlin Harris, M.A., Rev. H. D. Atkinson, B.A., Messrs. C. J. H. Chepmell, M.A., A. W. Garrett, B.A., F. M. Young, B.A., W. H. Hudspeth, B.A., H. Nicholls, LL.B., G. W. Damman, M.B., S. M'Burney, Mus. Doc., L. Dechaineux.

Including single-subject candidates, who are no longer separately recorded, there were 202 entries, and 200 candidates actually presented themselves. 110 passed the Examination as a whole, 28 being placed in the First Class, and 82 in the Second, while the single-subjects list contains 84 names.

Senior Public Examination.

The Tenth Examination under the Regulations of the Senior Public Examination began at Hobart and Launceston on the 19th, and ended on the 26th November. Candidates

were also examined at the Local Centres of Ulverstone, Longford, Devonport, Deloraine, and Franklin.

Sixty-eight candidates presented themselves, of whom 34 satisfied the Examiners on the whole Examination. Of these, 10 were placed in the First Class, 11 in the Second, and 13 in the Third.

Three candidates who had previously passed the Examination were examined in separate subjects, and the Single Subjects List contains 30 names. One candidate, entering for a single subject, failed to pass therein.

Class Lists.

Class Lists of the Senior and Junior Public Examinations were published on Commemoration Day, and have appeared in the Calendar.

The total number of candidates examined, including those who entered for single subjects, was 268.

II.—EXAMINATIONS FOR DEGREES.

Ordinary Examinations.

On the 8th, 10th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, and 17th November, there were held the Ordinary Examinations for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws. The Examiners were the Professors and Instructors of the University, with the following coadjutors for the B.A. and B.Sc. subjects:—Professors E. Bensly, M.A. (Adelaide); E. J. Nanson, M.A. (Melbourne); H. Laurie, LL.D. (Melbourne); Orme Masson, D.Sc. (Melbourne); M. W. MacCallum, M.A. (Sydney); and, for the Law subjects, Professor J. W. Salmond, M.A., (Adelaide); Mr. Justice Clark, and F. Lodge, B.A.

For the Examinations for the Degrees of B.A. and B.Sc. there were in all 22 candidates—17 from Hobart, 5 from Launceston. Of these, 16 then passed their several examinations. There were also 3 candidates in single subjects, all of whom satisfied the Examiners.

For the Bachelor of Laws Examination there were in all 16 candidates examined—13 from Hobart and 3 from Launceston—12 of whom satisfied the Examiners.

Forty candidates in all presented themselves at the Degree Examinations. The names of the candidates who passed, and the classes in which Credit candidates were placed, are set forth in the Class Lists annexed to this Report.

Supplementary Examinations.

V.—LECTURES DELIVERED AT THE UNIVERSITY.

The number of Lectures delivered at the University throughout the Academic year averaged 75 in each week. In addition to the Lectures delivered at the University, the Professors have continued to pay weekly visits to Launceston to deliver lectures and give students assistance and direction in their several courses of study. Additional teaching was given during the year by Mr. H. C. Kingsmill, M.A., and Monsieur

C. V. C. Naverne, the former giving instruction in Mathematics weekly, under the Professor in that subject, and the latter in Modern Languages, also weekly. The number of Students attending under the University Professors and Instructors at Hobart and Launceston was, in the last term, 51.

X. THE SENATE.

The Senate held three meetings during the year.

The Council regrets to have to place on record its sense of the loss sustained through the death of the Rev. Francis Hales, B.A., Archdeacon of Launceston, who had held the office of Warden of the Senate since November, 1896. Archdeacon Hales was, in that year, admitted *ad eundem gradum* in this University on the fiftieth anniversary of his graduation at Trinity College, Dublin, and always took a warm interest in the promotion of higher education in the Colony, and in the general extension of the advantages of University training. As his successor the Senate unanimously elected Mr. G. W. Waterhouse, B.A., who is also a Launceston Member of the Senate and former Member of the Council.

Regulations making provision for a course of Examinations in Pure and Applied Science, leading up to the rank of Associate in Science, were passed by the Council and Senate in the month of December. The main object of the institution of this course of Examination is, as previously announced, to widen the educational range of the University on its Science side, with ultimate reference to qualifications for the profession of Mining Engineering. The scheme was more particularly designed for those who desire to qualify themselves in some department of scientific industry, but are not at present in a position to take up a regular course of study at the University.

The subjects of the first Examination comprise most of the mathematical and science subjects of the Senior Public Examination, which were revised and re-defined in anticipation of the general revision of the existing Regulations. After mastering the elements of these pure science subjects, the student is encouraged to take up, at the Second Examination, applied science subjects, of which laboratory work forms a prominent feature, and in which there will be courses of University lectures open to all who are within reach of them.

The Council confidently looks forward to the co-operation of the managers of all Technical Schools and Schools of Mines, in encouraging the attendance at these Examinations of all persons who are looking forward to professional employment in, or connected with, the Mining Industry.

XII.—PROFESSORSHIP OF MINING ENGINEERING.

The Council having been placed in a position to increase the Professional Staff of the University by the establishment of a Chair of Mining Engineering, invited applications for the same. The number of applications for the appointment was nineteen.

A careful consideration of the qualifications of the respective candidates resulted in the election of Mr. R. Neil Smith, M.A., B.C.E., as the first Professor of Mining Engineering.

XIII. PARLIAMENTARY APPROPRIATION.

The appropriation of the undiminished grant for 1900, of £4000 provided for by the "Tasmanian University Act," enabled the Council, as above said, to make provision for a Chair of Mining, and for such equipment of the Physical and Chemical Laboratories as will probably suffice for present necessities.
